A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PRIVACY RIGHTS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that there is a need for
2	consumers and businesses to make informed decisions when hiring
3	persons who are governed under the professional and vocational
4	licensing laws of the State. The legislature also finds that it
5	is important for consumers to have information to help them in
6	hiring honest and trustworthy licensed individuals. One of the
7	tools available to assist consumers in learning whether
8	complaints have been filed against licensees is a website that
9	is maintained by the State's regulated industries complaints
10	office.
11	On the other side of the issue regarding the disclosure of
12	those records for the public good, the legislature acknowledges
13	that licensees have a privacy right and a due process right to
14	contest complaints and to minimize premature disclosure of
15	complaints that are baseless, unfounded, or unjustified.
16	Baseless complaints against a licensee can quickly cause serious

damage to an honest licensee's business in situations when a

licensee has not had the opportunity to fully contest the

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- 1 allegations contained in the complaint. Thus, complaints might
- 2 be disclosed before there is any conclusive evidence of
- 3 wrongdoing by a licensee and before the licensee has had an
- 4 opportunity to fully contest the complaint.
- 5 The legislature is cognizant that if the regulated
- 6 industries complaints office is forced to wait until conclusive
- 7 evidence of wrongdoing is available before disclosing the
- 8 licensees' complaint records, many years may pass and many
- 9 consumers may be unjustly harmed by unscrupulous licensees in
- 10 the interim. Because it is not uncommon for corrupt and
- 11 dishonest licensees to cause harm quickly to many members of the
- 12 public, unnecessary harm might be done to the public if the
- 13 complaints are not timely disclosed.
- 14 Thus, the legislature is presented with the dilemma as to
- 15 when complaints against licensees should be disclosed to the
- 16 public to serve the public good, and when the privacy rights of
- 17 licensees should be protected.
- 18 The purpose of this Act is to create a complaints
- 19 disclosure task force to study the optimal timing and conditions
- 20 for disclosure of complaints against licensees and to use a
- 21 balanced approach regarding the timing of the disclosure of

- 1 complaints against persons licensed under title 25, Hawaii
- 2 Revised Statutes.
- 3 SECTION 2. (a) The director of commerce and consumer
- 4 affairs shall establish, in coordination with the senate
- 5 president and the speaker of the house of representatives, the
- 6 complaints disclosure task force within the department of
- 7 commerce and consumer affairs for administrative purposes. The
- 8 task force shall research, assess, plan, and evaluate the
- 9 following:
- 10 (1) The feasibility, benefits, and drawbacks of disclosing
- a complaint against a licensee as currently practiced
- by the regulated industries complaints office; waiting
- 13 to disclose those complaints until after the licensee
- has fully contested the complaint, whether by means of
- a decision by a licensing board, a circuit court, or
- an appellate court; or disclosing the complaint
- sometime between the current practice and an appellate
- 18 court's decision on the complaint;
- 19 (2) The most effective means of protecting the public's
- 20 right to know about dishonest, deceitful, and careless
- 21 licensees and permitting disclosure of a complaint
- versus a licensee's privacy rights and the entitlement

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2		disclosure of unwarranted complaints;
3	(3)	How other states manage complaints and address the
4		timing for the disclosure of complaints against
5		licensees to the public, including when and under what
6		conditions information is expunged from an official
7		website listing consumer complaints; and
8	(4)	Whether legislation, and what legislation, if any, is
9		needed to address issues of timing and the conditions
10		for the disclosure of complaints against licensees and
11		the privacy rights of licensees.
12	(b)	The complaints disclosure task force shall be convened
13	and chair	ed by the complaints and enforcement officer or the
14	complaint	s and enforcement officer's designee of the regulated
15	industrie	s complaints office. The task force shall comprise
16	nine memb	ers, as follows:
17	(1)	The complaints and enforcement officer or the
18		complaints and enforcement officer's designee of the
19		regulated industries complaints office;
20	(2)	One member who is a dentist licensed in the State, who
21		shall be appointed by the senate president;

1	(3)	One member who is a real estate broker or salesperson
2		licensed in the State, who shall be appointed by the
3		speaker of the house;
4	(4)	Three members who shall be appointed by the senate
5		president, provided that all members shall be licensed
6		under title 25, Hawaii Revised Statutes; and
7	(5)	Three members who shall be appointed by the speaker of
8		the house, provided that all members shall be licensed
9		under title 25, Hawaii Revised Statutes;
10	provided	that none of the task force members shall be from the
11	same prof	ession or occupation.
12	The	task force members shall serve without compensation.
13	No task f	orce member shall be made subject to chapter 84, Hawaii
14	Revised S	tatutes, solely because of that member's participation
15	as a memb	er of the task force.
16	(c)	The task force shall be dissolved on June 30, 2013.
17	SECT	ION 3. The complaints disclosure task force shall
18	submit a	report of its findings and recommendations, including
19	any propo	sed legislation, to the legislature no later than

twenty days before the convening of the regular session of 2014.

SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on January 7, 2059.

Professional and Vocational Licenses; Complaints; Privacy Interests

Description:

Establishes the Complaints Disclosure Task Force within the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs to research, assess, plan, and evaluate the appropriate timing for the public disclosure of complaints against individuals holding professional or vocational licenses. Dissolves the task force on June 30, 2013. Requires a report of findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature prior to the 2014 Regular Session. Effective January 7, 2059. (HB2298 HD2)
