A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PROCUREMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that current difficult 2 economic conditions warrant the use of incentives to help create 3 job growth and stimulate the State's economy. The legislature 4 also finds that the process for procuring state contracts is 5 often cumbersome. The legislature further finds that incentives 6 in the procurement process would lead to more companies bidding 7 for state contracts. This would give the State a broader 8 network of contractors to choose from and would possibly 9 expedite the progress of rebuilding Hawaii's economy and 10 workforce by having a number of companies working on various 11 state projects. 12 The purpose of this Act is to create price preferences for 13 bids and proposals submitted to procuring agencies by Hawaii 14 small businesses, veterans, and service-disabled veterans. 15 SECTION 2. Section 103D-903, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 16 amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows:

- 5 The rules adopted pursuant to this section shall include
- 6 rules for verifying the status and eligibility of veterans and
- 7 service-disabled veterans.
- 8 (b) As used in this section:
- 9 "Hawaii small business" means a small business as defined
- 10 in section 103D-901, that:
- 11 (1) Has its principal place of business or ancillary
- 12 headquarters located within the State;
- 13 (2) Employs a work force consisting of not less than
- 14 thirty-five per cent of employees who reside within
- 15 the State; and
- 16 (3) Employs fewer than fifty employees.
- 17 "Service-disabled veteran" means a veteran who has a
- 18 service-connected disability compensable under title 38 United
- 19 States Code section 1110 or 1131 and who meets any other
- 20 applicable qualifications established by rule.
- 21 "Veteran" means any person who has served in any of the
- 22 armed services of the United States in any war or campaign in

- 1 which the United States was engaged, whose service has been
- 2 verified by the:
- 3 (1) United States Department of Veterans Affairs;
- 4 (2) United States Department of Defense;
- 5 (3) United States Coast Guard; or
- 6 (4) National Guard,
- 7 and who meets any other applicable qualifications established by
- 8 rule.
- 9 "Veteran-owned business" and "service-disabled veteran-
- 10 owned business" means a business entity of which fifty-one per
- 11 cent or more is owned by a veteran or service-disabled veteran,
- 12 respectively."
- 13 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 14 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 15 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2112.

Report Title:

Procurement; Small Businesses; Veterans; Disabled Veterans

Description:

Authorizes the chief procurement officer to establish the goal that at least three percent of the State's annual purchasing expenditures be awarded to veteran-owned businesses. Requires the procurement policy board to adopt rules that include a five percent preference for small businesses, a seven percent preference for veteran-owned businesses, and a nine percent preference for service-disabled veteran-owned businesses. Effective July 1, 2112. (HB2318 HD2)
