## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AGRICULTURE.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature supports the department of
- 2 agriculture's goal of integrating programs in order to develop
- 3 Hawaii's agriculture and food security. Hawaii's agriculture
- 4 has transitioned from sugar and pineapple to diversified
- 5 agriculture and now faces such complexities as diversified
- 6 export markets, increased pest pressure, and global
- 7 competitiveness, as well as concerns regarding sustainability,
- 8 food safety, food security, and self-sufficiency. The
- 9 legislature recognizes that a coordinated effort by agriculture,
- 10 the transportation industry, research organizations, federal and
- 11 state agencies, and private sector businesses is necessary to
- 12 address these needs.
- 13 Therefore, the purpose of this Act is to establish the
- 14 agricultural development and food security program to encompass
- 15 all aspects of agriculture from farm-to-market. The farm-to-
- 16 market concept, although linear, includes interrelationships
- 17 between private and public sectors to develop and improve

1	agricultu	re in the State. The goals of the proposed concept are
2	to:	
3	(1)	Position the agricultural industry to be sustainable
4		and to achieve critical mass;
5	(2)	Increase the availability of locally grown and
6		produced commodities in the market place;
7	(3)	Expand agricultural exports to domestic and foreign
8		countries, and re-establish Hawaii as a global leader
9		in agriculture and agriculture technologies;
10	(4)	Develop sustainable practices that ensure self-
11		sufficiency in crop production; and
12	(5)	Protect Hawaii's agriculture, environment, and natural
13		resources.
14	The :	program will provide an overall direction overseen by
15	the depar	tment of agriculture to develop agriculture in areas
16	including	farm inputs, agricultural infrastructure, labor,
17	biosecuri	ty, food safety, sustainability, market development,
18	and resear	rch and development. The department of agriculture is
19	the gover	nment agency best positioned, though not necessarily
20	adequatel	y resourced, to oversee the development of agriculture,
21	with acti	ve participation from the agricultural industry,

- 1 tropical agriculture and human resources, public and private
- 2 research entities, and other federal and state agencies.
- 3 The concept of farm-to-market impacts agricultural lands,
- 4 water treatment, pest management programs, food safety,
- 5 distribution and biosecurity systems, industry and market
- 6 development, and policy issues.
- 7 This Act authorizes the department of agriculture to
- 8 develop, coordinate, fund, and integrate new and existing
- 9 programs, facilities, and projects to promote the development of
- 10 agriculture and food security within the State.
- 11 SECTION 2. Chapter 141, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 12 amended by adding two new sections to be appropriately
- 13 designated and to read as follows:
- 14 "\$141-A Agricultural development and food security
- 15 program; establishment. There is established within the
- 16 department of agriculture an agricultural development and food
- 17 security program that shall:
- 18 (1) Provide oversight, administration, coordination,
- revenue development, and funding to develop Hawaii's
- 20 agriculture industry from farm-to-market;
- 21 (2) Interface with private, public-private, and public
- 22 organizations and agencies to work toward the goals

1		and objectives of the agricultural development and
2		food security program; and
3	<u>(3)</u>	Comport with other relevant state laws; provided that
4		the agricultural development and food security program
5		is consistent with federal law.
6	<u>§141</u>	-B Objectives of the agricultural development and food
7	security :	program. The objectives of the agricultural
8	developme	nt and food security program shall be to:
9	(1)	Increase agriculture sustainability and improve the
10		economic viability of the State's agriculture industry
11		including development of data to measure progress;
12	(2)	Develop and implement programs to assist farm,
13		nursery, and livestock production;
14	<u>(3)</u>	Coordinate, fund, and establish agriculture industry
15		development programs;
16	(4)	Develop and implement programs to increase
17		agricultural exports to domestic and foreign
18		countries;
19	<u>(5)</u>	Establish Hawaii as a global leader in agriculture and
20		agriculture technologies;
21	<u>(6)</u>	Develop and implement concepts and programs to expand
22		the locally grown share of the State's market;

1	<u>(7)</u>	Support and assist in developing a farm-to-school
2		program;
3	(8)	Develop and implement research and technology transfer
4		programs for varietals, treatment, pest control,
5		diagnostics, farm inputs, and other relevant matters;
6	<u>(9)</u>	Support and coordinate with other programs within the
7		department of agriculture on projects related to
8		issues such as infrastructure development,
9		biosecurity, and food safety;
10	(10)	Ensure the product integrity of agricultural
11		commodities branded as made in Hawaii to protect
12		Hawaii's identity as a producer; and
13	(11)	Review, coordinate, update, oversee, and comment on
14		government policies that affect the State's
15		agriculture and food security."
16	SECT	ION 3. Section 141-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
17	amended to	read as follows:
18	"§14:	1-2 Rules. Subject to chapter 91 the department of
19	agricultu	re shall adopt, amend, and repeal rules not
20	inconsiste	ent with law, for and concerning:
21	(1)	The introduction, transportation, and propagation of
22	·	trees, shrubs, herbs, and other plants;

1	(2)	The quarantine, inspection, fumigation, disinfection,
2		destruction, or exclusion, either upon introduction
3		into the State, or at any time or place within the
4		State, of any nursery-stock, tree, shrub, herb, vine,
5		cut-flower, cutting, graft, scion, bud, seed, leaf,
6		root, or rhizome; any nut, fruit, or vegetable; any
7		grain, cereal, or legume in the natural or raw state;
8		any moss, hay, straw, dry-grass, or other forage; any
9		unmanufactured log, limb, or timber; or any other
10		plant growth or plant product unprocessed or in the
11		raw state; any sand, soil, or earth; any live bird,
12		reptile, insect, or other animal, in any stage of
13		development, that is in addition to the so-called
14		domestic animals, which are provided for in section
15		142-2; and any box, barrel, crate, or other containers
16		in which the articles, substances, or objects have
17		been transported or contained, and any packing
18		material used in connection therewith, that is or may
19		be diseased or infested with insects or likely to
20		assist in the transmission or dissemination of any
21		insect or plant disease injurious, harmful, or
22		detrimental, or likely to become injurious, harmful,

or detrimental to the agricultural or horticultural
industries or the forests of the State, or that is or
may be in itself injurious, harmful, or detrimental to
the same (included therein may be rules governing the
transportation of any of the articles, substances, or
objects enumerated above in this section between
different localities on any one of the islands within
the State);

any or all foreign countries or from other parts of the United States, or the shipment from one island within the State to another island therein, or the transportation from one part or locality of any island to another part or locality of the same island, of any specific article, substance, or object or class of articles, substances, or objects, among those enumerated above in this section, that is diseased or infested with insects or likely to assist in the transmission or dissemination of any insect or plant disease injurious, harmful, or detrimental or likely to be injurious, harmful, or detrimental to the agricultural or horticultural industries, or the

1		forests of the State, or that is or may be in itself
2		injurious, harmful, or detrimental to the same;
3	(4)	The preparation by cargo carriers of manifests of
4		cargo transported into the State or between islands of
5		the State and the submission of the manifests to the
6		department; [and]
7	(5)	The manner in which agricultural product promotion and
8		research activities may be undertaken, after
9		coordinating with the agribusiness development
10		corporation[-]; and
11	<u>(6)</u>	The implementation and promotion of the agricultural
12		development and food security program.
13	All :	rules adopted under this section shall have the force
14	and effec	t of law."
15	SECT	ION 4. Section 141-10, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
16	amended by	y amending subsection (c) to read as follows:
17	"(C)	Subject to legislative appropriation, moneys in the
18	special fo	und may be expended for the following purposes:
19	(1)	The awarding of grants to farmers for agricultural
20		production or processing activity;
21	(2)	The acquisition of real property for agricultural
22		production or processing activity;

1	(3)	The improvement of real property, dams, reservoirs,
2		irrigation systems, and transportation networks
3		necessary to promote agricultural production or
4		processing activity, including investigative studies
5		to identify and assess necessary improvements to dams,
6		reservoirs, irrigation systems, and transportation
7		networks;
8	(4)	The purchase of equipment necessary for agricultural
9		production or processing activity;
10	(5)	The conduct of research on and testing of agricultural
11		products and markets;
12	(6)	The funding of agricultural inspector positions within
13		the department of agriculture;
14	(7)	The promotion and marketing of agricultural products
15		grown or raised in the State;
16	(8)	Water quality testing and improvement; [and]
17	(9)	The promotion and implementation of the agricultural
18		development and food security program; and
19	[ <del>-(9)</del> -]	(10) Any other activity intended to increase
20		agricultural production or processing that may lead to
21		reduced importation of food, fodder, or feed from
22		outside the State."

- 1 SECTION 5. In codifying the new sections added by section
- 2 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
- 3 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
- 4 the new sections in this Act.
- 5 SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 6 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 7 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
