A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE AGING AND DISABILITY RESOURCE CENTERS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the aging and
- 2 disability resource centers initiative is a collaborative
- 3 federal and state multi-agency effort with the support of the
- 4 counties led by the United States Administration on Aging and
- 5 Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services to streamline access
- 6 to long-term supports and services for older adults, all persons
- 7 with disabilities, family caregivers, and providers.
- 8 Aging and disability resource centers are designed to
- 9 address the frustrations many consumers and their families
- 10 experience when they need to obtain information and access to
- 11 long-term supports and services. In many communities, long-term
- 12 supports and services are administered by multiple agencies,
- 13 both public and private, and have complex, fragmented, and often
- 14 duplicative intake, assessment, and eligibility functions.
- 15 Figuring out how to obtain long-term supports and services can
- 16 be difficult. A single, coordinated system of information and
- 17 access for all persons seeking long-term supports and services

- 1 minimizes confusion, enhances individual choice, and fosters
- 2 informed decision-making. It also improves the ability of state
- 3 and county governments to manage resources and monitor program
- 4 quality through centralized data collection and evaluation which
- 5 will result in the ability to target existing resources where
- 6 most needed, better estimate future need, and develop long-term
- 7 strategies for sustainability.
- 8 Aging and disability resource centers use two broad
- 9 strategies to divert persons from unnecessary and costly long-
- 10 term institutional care and ensure that short-term institutional
- 11 stays do not become permanent:
- 12 (1) Intervening with options counseling; and
- 13 (2) Expediting eligibility determination processes for
- 14 home and community-based services.
- 15 Aging and disability resource centers serve a critical role in
- 16 improving the ability of state and county governments to
- 17 effectively manage the long-term supports and services system,
- 18 monitor program quality, and measure responsiveness of state and
- 19 county systems of care.
- 20 The purpose of this Act is to establish the aging and
- 21 disability resource center program under the coordination of the
- 22 executive office on aging.

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- 1 SECTION 2. Chapter 349, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 2 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and
- 3 to read as follows:
- 4 "PART . AGING AND DISABILITY RESOURCES CENTERS
- 5 §349- Definitions. As used in this part, unless the
- 6 context otherwise requires:
- 7 "Aging and disability resource center" means an entity
- 8 established by the State as part of the state system of long-
- 9 term care serving as a highly visible and trusted source where
- 10 people of all incomes and ages can get information on the full
- 11 range of long-term support options and a single point of entry
- 12 for access to public long-term support programs and benefits.
- "Area agency on aging" means the agency in each county
- 14 designated by the executive office on aging, under the Older
- 15 Americans Act section 305(a)(2)(A), to facilitate the area-wide
- 16 development and implementation of a comprehensive, coordinated
- 17 system for providing long-term care in home and community-based
- 18 setting, in a manner responsive to the needs and preferences of
- 19 older individuals and their family caregivers.
- 20 "Dementia" means a group of symptoms affecting intellectual
- 21 and social abilities severely enough to interfere with daily
- 22 functioning.

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- 1 "Developmental disability" means a lifelong disability
- 2 attributable to mental or physical impairments, manifested prior
- 3 to age 18.
- 4 "Family caregivers" means a spouse, adult child, other
- 5 relative, partner or friend who has a personal relationship
- 6 with, and provides a broad range of unpaid assistance for an
- 7 older adult with a chronic or disabling condition.
- 8 "Informal caregiver" means a person who provides care for
- 9 an older adult or person with a disability who needs long-term
- 10 supports and services, but does not receive compensation.
- "Intellectual disability" means a general disorder
- 12 characterized by significantly impaired cognitive functioning
- 13 and deficits in two or more adaptive behaviors that appears
- 14 before adulthood.
- 15 "Long-term supports and services" means the broad range of
- 16 assistance and care needed by older persons or persons with
- 17 physical or mental disabilities who have lost or never acquired
- 18 the ability to function independently.
- 19 "Options counseling" means an interactive decision-support
- 20 process whereby consumers, family members, and significant
- 21 others are supported in their deliberations to determine
- 22 appropriate long-term care choices in the context of a

- 1 consumer's needs, preferences, values, and individual
- 2 circumstances.
- 3 "Physical disability" means the broad range of disabilities
- 4 including orthopedic, neuromuscular, cardiovascular and
- 5 pulmonary disorders, which may be congenital or a result of
- 6 aging or injury.
- 7 "Severe mental illness" means one of several diseases that
- 8 affect the brain, and significantly functionally impair an
- 9 individual for an indefinite period of time.
- 10 §349- Aging and disability resource center program;
- 11 established. (a) There is established a statewide aging and
- 12 disability resource center program with sites in each county to
- 13 streamline access to long-term supports and services by
- 14 integrating the full range of long-term supports and services
- 15 into a single, coordinated system.
- 16 (b) The aging and disability resource center shall be the
- 17 single point of entry, available in every county, where persons
- 18 of all ages, incomes, and disabilities may access information in
- 19 a person-centered manner on the full range of long-term support
- 20 and service options, including:
- 21 (1) Federal, state, and county revenue-funded programs and
- 22 services including, but not limited to, those funded

1		by medicaid, medicare, Older Americans Act, the
2		Veterans Administration, and Kupuna Care;
3	(2)	A centralized application process for publically
4		funded long-term supports and services;
5	(3)	Privately administered programs and services;
6	(4)	Supports and services for persons with Alzheimer's
7		disease and other related dementias;
8	(5)	Transportation services;
9	(6)	Housing options;
10	(7)	Elder person's rights protection;
11	(8)	Hospital and nursing home discharge planning and care
12		transition;
13	(9)	Health, prevention, and wellness programs;
14	(10)	Support for grandparents raising grandchildren and
15		other relatives age fifty-five years or older caring
16		for children; and
17	(11)	Informal and family caregiver support services.
18	(c)	The aging and disability resource centers shall target
19	delivery	of services to:
20	(1)	Persons sixty years of age and older;

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1	(2)	Persons of any age with physical disabilities, serious	
2		mental illness, dementia, and developmental or	
3		intellectual disabilities;	
4	(3)	Informal and family caregivers providing assistance to	
5		persons needing long-term supports and services;	
6	(4)	Professionals seeking long-term supports and services	
7		on behalf of their clients; and	
8	(5)	Persons planning for their future long-term supports	
9		and service needs.	
10	(d)	The executive office on aging shall coordinate the	
11	implementation of the statewide aging and disability resource		
12	center program.		
13	(e)	The area agencies on aging shall implement the	
14	statewide	aging and disability resource center program within	
15	their respective geographic service areas."		
16	SECT	ION 3. There is appropriated out of the general	
17	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much		
18	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2013-2014 to		
19	establish the aging and disability resource centers in each		
20	county.		

- 1 SECTION 4. The sum appropriated shall be expended by the
- 2 executive office on aging for the purposes of this Act.
- 3 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Aging and Disability Resource Centers; Executive Office on Aging; Appropriation

Description:

Creates a statewide Aging and Disability Resource Center Program to streamline access to long-term support and services for older adults, persons with disabilities, and family caregivers. Requires the Executive Office on Aging to coordinate and implement the Program. Appropriates money to establish the Aging and Disability Resource Centers. (HB2517 HD1)

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
