A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO STATE EMPLOYMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Section 76-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:

3 "(b) The civil service to which this chapter applies shall

4 comprise all positions in the State now existing or hereafter

established and embrace all personal services performed for the

6 State, except the following:

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- (1) Commissioned and enlisted personnel of the Hawaii national guard as such, and positions in the Hawaii national guard that are required by state or federal laws or regulations or orders of the national guard to be filled from those commissioned or enlisted personnel;
- (2) Positions filled by persons employed by contract where the director of human resources development has certified that the service is special or unique or is essential to the public interest and that, because of circumstances surrounding its fulfillment, personnel to perform the service cannot be obtained through

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1		normal civil service recruitment procedures. Any such
2		contract may be for any period not exceeding one year;
3	(3)	Positions that must be filled without delay to comply
4		with a court order or decree if the director
5		determines that recruitment through normal recruitment
6		civil service procedures would result in delay or
7		noncompliance, such as the Felix-Cayetano consent
8		decree;
9	(4)	Positions filled by the legislature or by either house
10		or any committee thereof;
11	(5)	Employees in the office of the governor and office of
12		the lieutenant governor, and household employees at
13		Washington Place;
14	(6)	Positions filled by popular vote;
15	(7)	Department heads, officers, and members of any board,
16		commission, or other state agency whose appointments
17		are made by the governor or are required by law to be
18		confirmed by the senate;
19	(8)	Judges, referees, receivers, masters, jurors, notaries
20		public, land court examiners, court commissioners, and
21		attorneys appointed by a state court for a special
22		temporary service.

One bailiff for the chief justice of the supreme court
who shall have the powers and duties of a court
officer and bailiff under section 606-14; one
secretary or clerk for each justice of the supreme
court, each judge of the intermediate appellate court,
and each judge of the circuit court; one secretary for
the judicial council; one deputy administrative
director of the courts; three law clerks for the chief
justice of the supreme court, two law clerks for each
associate justice of the supreme court and each judge
of the intermediate appellate court, one law clerk for
each judge of the circuit court, two additional law
clerks for the civil administrative judge of the
circuit court of the first circuit, two additional law
clerks for the criminal administrative judge of the
circuit court of the first circuit, one additional law
clerk for the senior judge of the family court of the
first circuit, two additional law clerks for the civil
motions judge of the circuit court of the first
circuit, two additional law clerks for the criminal
motions judge of the circuit court of the first
circuit, and two law clerks for the administrative

15			graduate student positions shall not be included
16			as positions under this subparagraph;
17	(14)	A cu	stodian or guide at Iolani Palace, the Royal
18		Maus	oleum, and Hulihee Palace;
19	(15)	Posi	tions filled by persons employed on a fee,
20		cont	ract, or piecework basis, who may lawfully perform
21		thei	r duties concurrently with their private business
22		or p	rofession or other private employment and whose

1		duties require only a portion of their time, if it is
2		impracticable to ascertain or anticipate the portion
3		of time to be devoted to the service of the State;
4	(16)	Positions of first deputies or first assistants of
5		each department head appointed under or in the manner
6		provided in section 6, article V, of the Hawaii State
7		Constitution; three additional deputies or assistants
8		either in charge of the highways, harbors, and
9		airports divisions or other functions within the
10		department of transportation as may be assigned by the
11		director of transportation, with the approval of the
12		governor; four additional deputies in the department
13		of health, each in charge of one of the following:
14		behavioral health, environmental health, hospitals,
15		and health resources administration, including other
16		functions within the department as may be assigned by
17		the director of health, with the approval of the
18		governor; an administrative assistant to the state
19		librarian; and an administrative assistant to the
20		superintendent of education;
21	(17)	Positions specifically exempted from this part by any
22		other law; provided that all of the positions defined

1		by paragraph (9) shall be included in the position
2		classification plan;
3	(18)	Positions in the state foster grandparent program and
4		positions for temporary employment of senior citizens
5		in occupations in which there is a severe personnel
6	÷	shortage or in special projects;
7	(19)	Household employees at the official residence of the
8		president of the University of Hawaii;
9	(20)	Employees in the department of education engaged in
10		the supervision of students during meal periods in the
11		distribution, collection, and counting of meal
12		tickets, and in the cleaning of classrooms after
13		school hours on a less than half-time basis;
14	(21)	Employees hired under the tenant hire program of the
15		Hawaii public housing authority; provided that not
16		more than twenty-six per cent of the authority's work
17		force in any housing project maintained or operated by
18		the authority shall be hired under the tenant hire
19		program;
20	(22)	Positions of the federally funded expanded food and
21		nutrition program of the University of Hawaii that

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1		require the hiring of nutrition program assistants who		
2		live in the areas they serve;		
3	(23)	Positions filled by [severely handicapped] persons		
4		with severe disabilities who are certified by the		
5		state vocational rehabilitation office that they are		
6		able to perform safely the duties of the positions;		
7	(24)	The sheriff;		
8	(25)	A gender and other fairness coordinator hired by the		
9		judiciary; and		
10	(26)	Positions in the Hawaii national guard youth and adult		
11		education programs.		
12	The	director shall determine the applicability of this		
13	section t	o specific positions.		
14	Nothing in this section shall be deemed to affect the civil			
15	service status of any incumbent as it existed on July 1, 1955."			
16	SECTION 2. Section 78-2.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is			
17	amended to read as follows:			
18	" [+]	§78-2.6[+] Prospective employees; suitability for		
19	public em	ployment. All prospective employees, regardless of the		
20	positions they will assume, shall demonstrate their suitability			
21	for public employment by:			

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1	(\(\(\)	Passing a pre-employment controlled substance drug		
2		test if required by the employing jurisdiction; and		
3	(2)	Attesting that during the three-year period		
4		immediately preceding the date of application for		
5		employment, the person was not convicted of any		
6		controlled substance-related offense.		
7	If an app	licant fails to meet the suitability requirements of		
8	the employ	ying jurisdiction, the applicant shall be disqualified		
9	from furt	her employment consideration or deemed ineligible for		
10	appointment under section 76-29 on the basis of unsuitability			
11	for public	c employment.		
12	Notw	ithstanding paragraph (2), for positions described in		
13	section 7	6-16(b)(13)(C), an applicant shall not be automatically		
14	disqualif	ied from employment based on a controlled substance-		
15	related o	ffense; provided that reasonable safeguards are in		
16	place to	protect employees and the public."		
17	SECT	ION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed		
18	and strick	ken. New statutory material is underscored.		
19	SECT	ION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.		

Report Title:

Civil Service; Exemptions; State Employment

Description:

Clarifies exemptions from civil service for federally funded work experience programs and temporary public service employment; allows persons with criminal conviction to participate in such programs provided reasonable safeguards are in place. Requires graduate student positions to continue to be filled via civil service requirements. (HB2572 HD1)

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
