A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE BOILER AND ELEVATOR SAFETY LAW.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 39/, Hawall Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
3	and to read as follows:
4	"§397- Boiler and elevator special fund; establishment;
5	purposes. (a) There is established in the state treasury a
6	fund to be known as the boiler and elevator special fund into
7	which shall be deposited all fees collected pursuant to section
8	397-5 and any interest and investment moneys earned on any
9	moneys in the fund.
10	(b) The purpose of the special fund is to provide for
11	sufficient operating costs to carry out the purpose of this
12	chapter. Funds may be used for:
13	(1) Personnel and operating expenses;
14	(2) Staff training and staff certification fees and
15	expenses;

1	(3) Preparation and dissemination of public information on

5	SECTION 3. The director may establish ten (10) additional
6	positions, subject to chapters 76 and 89 of the Hawaii Revised
7	Statutes, to carry out the purposes of chapter 397. The
8	positions may include a branch manager, up to the equivalent of
9	six full-time elevator inspectors, one boiler inspector, and two
10	office assistants.
11	SECTION 4. To enable the hiring and retention of qualified
12	inspectors and supervisory personnel, the director shall have
13	the authority to set compensation and incentives and other
14	working conditions that may differ from that administered by the
15	department of human resources development. The appropriate
16	collective bargaining unit shall be consulted prior to
17	implementing any changes to working conditions.
18	SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
19	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$1,000,000 or so much
20	thereof as may be necessary, for fiscal year 2012-2013, as start
21	up funds to be deposited to the credit of the boiler and
22	elevator special fund.

1	SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the boiler and
2	elevator special fund the sum of \$2,900,000 or so much thereof
3	as may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 to be used for the
4	purposes of this Act.
5	SECTION 7. The sum appropriated shall be expended by the
6	department of labor and industrial relations for the purposes of
7	this Act.
8	SECTION 8. New statutory material is underscored.
9	Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed and stricken.
10	SECTION 9. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2012.

Report Title:

Boiler and Elevator Safety Law; Special Fund

Description:

Establishes the Boiler and Elevator Special Fund for the purpose of collecting and depositing the fees charged for permits, inspections, and certificates of boilers, pressure systems elevators and kindred equipment, and amusement rides to provide sufficient operating funds for the Boiler and Elevator Inspection Branch.

JUSTIFICATION SHEET

DEPARTMENT: Labor and Industrial Relations

TITLE: A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE BOILER AND

ELEVATOR SAFETY LAW.

PURPOSE: To establish the boiler and elevator special

fund to provide a mechanism for self-

sufficiency that will enable the program to

hire and retain sufficient qualified personnel and be able to carry out the permitting and inspection of boilers, pressure systems, amusement rides, and elevators and kindred equipment for public

safety purposes.

MEANS: Add a new section to chapter 397, Hawaii

Revised Statutes, and amend section 397-5,

Hawaii Revised Statutes.

JUSTIFICATION: The Boiler and Elevator Inspection Branch of

the Hawaii Occupational Safety and Health Division has the duty to periodically inspect and issue permits and certificates for boilers,

pressure systems, amusement rides, and

elevators and kindred equipment. Currently, approximately 75 percent of the elevators in this state and 50 percent of the boilers are operating without a current operating permit because their inspections are overdue or their permits are delayed. Moreover, there is a backlog in performing critical load tests on

elevators, internal inspections of escalators,

and inspections of amusement rides.

The department believes that by increasing its funding it will be able to increase its staff of inspectors, thereby relieving this potentially dangerous situation. Failure to address this staffing situation will ultimately affect the State's commerce and development because of the department's inability to timely review new installations and alteration plans of elevators and boilers, as well as perform timely periodic inspections of this equipment.

Lastly, failure to perform these necessary inspections could potentially lead to elevator accidents or boiler explosions resulting in property damage or personal injury or death.

In the past the Legislature cut vacant positions in the department's inspection staff. These vacant positions arose due to the disparity between what the State paid its inspection staff and what the private sector paid for similar positions. The persistent pay differential and consequential cutting of positions resulted in the gradual reduction of the inspection staff such that today there are insufficient inspectors and support staff to perform the required number of inspections and issue timely permits needed by building owners and managers. The bill also includes language to authorize ten additional positions and authorizes the director to set compensation and flexible working conditions, to minimize the pay disparity and be able to attract and retain qualified inspectors.

The department proposes to create a Boiler and Elevator Special Fund that will be funded by fees collected from the inspection, permitting and other services performed on boilers, pressure systems, elevators and kindred equipment, and amusement rides. The moneys deposited into the special fund will be used to pay for increased inspectors and staffing. The special fund will ensure the continuous and appropriate funding of inspectors and staff, thereby insulating the inspection program from the effects of periodic automatic budget and position cuts.

Impact on the public: There will be a positive impact on the public in four ways: (1) public safety will be improved because elevators and kindred equipment, and boilers and pressure vessels will be inspected in accordance with acceptable national standards, (2) developers will be able to obtain building permits, occupancy permits, and permits to operate on a timely basis and

thus be able to recover costs and move to the next project, (3) contractors will be able to better plan for ongoing and future construction projects and put unemployed workers back to work, and (4) building and business operating costs will go down as timely permits to operate will be issued thereby assuring building insurers that the equipment are safe to operate.

Impact on the department and other agencies:
Public buildings will receive permits to
operate on a timely basis, assuring the public
that the equipment currently meets acceptable
national standards, and public projects will be
able to proceed on a timely basis.

GENERAL FUND:

\$1,000,000 in appropriations is being deposited into the boiler and elevator special fund for start-up costs, until the program revenue sustains the program. The department will pay back the general fund loan over a period of five years.
