A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE WEED AND SEED PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that weed and seed is a 2 program administered by the United States Attorney's Office in 3 partnership with the Young Men's Christian Association of 4 Honolulu. Initiated in the country in 1991, weed and seed is a 5 comprehensive multi-agency approach to law enforcement, crime 6 prevention, and community revitalization. Although no longer 7 funded by the United States Department of Justice, weed and seed 8 is a recognized "brand name" in Hawaii, having been in existence since 1998. The legislature finds that it is a robust program, 9 10 doing substantial good in our communities. 11 The weed and seed program is a collaborative effort among 12 law enforcement agencies at the federal, state, and county 13 levels; social service agencies; private businesses; faith-based 14 organizations; the public sector, including city, state, and federal departments; schools; nonprofit organizations; and 15

residents to reclaim, restore, and rebuild communities.

    The weed and seed program works with local law enforcement to
6
    prevent, control, and reduce violent crime, drug abuse, and gang
7
    activity in targeted neighborhoods by "weeding" out the criminal
8
    element in the community. Community policing involves having
9
    police officers work closely with community residents to develop
10
    solutions to violent and drug-related crimes. "Seeding" the
11
    community involves collaboration among various human services
12
    organizations to implement prevention, intervention and
13
    treatment, and neighborhood revitalization projects, programs,
14
    and activities.

         The legislature also finds that the State has benefited
    greatly from weed and seed, based on programs at sites on Oahu
16
17
    that encompass Kalihi-Palama, Chinatown, Downtown Honolulu, Ala
18
    Moana, Sheridan, McCully, Waipahu, and Ewa Beach. Since the

    implementation of the program, crime in those areas has

decreased significantly. The legislature further finds that the

program's success warrants the continued operation of weed and

- 3 The purpose of this Act is to:
- 4 (1) Permanently establish the weed and seed program within the department of labor and industrial relations;
- 6 (2) Appropriate funds for a grant to the Young Men's
- 7 Christian Association of Honolulu to support the
- 8 operations of the weed and seed program through the
- 9 office of community services of the department of
- 10 labor and industrial relations; and
- 11 (3) Appropriate funds to maintain current operations of
- the weed and seed program and expand the weed and seed
- program into other areas of the State.
- 14 SECTION 2. Chapter 371, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 15 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 16 and to read as follows:
- 17 "§371- Weed and seed program; establishment. (a) There
- 18 is established within the department the weed and seed program
- 19 to reduce crime and improve the quality of life for residents
- 20 and neighborhoods in the State. The weed and seed program shall
- 21 be a collaborative effort among community residents, law
- 22 enforcement agencies, social service providers, educators, area

17	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general	
18	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much	
19	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 as a grant	
20	pursuant to chapter 42F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to the Young	
21	Men's Christian Association of Honolulu to support the	
22	operations of the weed and seed program on the island of Oahu.	



- 1 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the office of
- 2 community services of the department of labor and industrial
- 3 relations for the purposes of this Act.
- 4 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
- 5 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 6 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 to
- 7 maintain the weed and seed program in areas currently designated
- 8 for the weed and seed program and to expand the weed and seed
- 9 program into other areas of the State.
- 10 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 11 labor and industrial relations for the purposes of this Act.
- 12 SECTION 5. New statutory material is underscored.
- 13 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on January 7, 2059.
