BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to assist law
enforcement authorities in their responsibilities by:

(1) Requiring timely reporting by a parent, guardian

- (1) Requiring timely reporting by a parent, guardian, or other person having the care, custody, or control of a child in the event of the death of a child or of a missing child, and establishing violations as a felony offense; and
- (2) Establishing a felony offense in the event a parent, guardian, or other person having the care, custody, or control of a child gives false information to lawenforcement authorities conducting a missing person investigation or a felony criminal investigation involving a child in the care of the parent, guardian, or other person.
- SECTION 2. Chapter 577, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to read as follows:

Report Title:

Children; Missing; Child Death; Reporting; Felony Offenses

Description:

Requires a parent, guardian, or other person having the care, custody, or control of a child to report the death of a child or location of the corpse of a child to law enforcement within an unspecified number of hours after learning of the death or location of the corpse; requires a parent, guardian, or other person to report the missing child to law enforcement within twenty-four hours after the parent, guardian, or other person obtains knowledge that the child is missing; establishes unspecified felony offenses for reporting violations and for giving false information to law enforcement authorities conducting a missing person investigation or a felony criminal investigation involving a child.
