### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HUMAN TRAFFICKING.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that human trafficking is
- 2 not just a problem in other countries. Cases of human
- 3 trafficking have been reported in all fifty states, Washington
- 4 D.C., and some territories of the United States. Trafficking
- 5 can involve school-age children, particularly those not living
- 6 with their parents, who are vulnerable to coerced labor
- 7 exploitation, domestic servitude, or commercial sexual
- 8 exploitation.
- 9 The purpose of this Act is to help combat human trafficking
- 10 by raising awareness in Hawaii's public schools so that
- 11 employees, teachers, counselors, parents, and other students can
- 12 identify victims and report suspected incidences of human
- 13 trafficking.
- 14 SECTION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 15 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 16 and to read as follows:
- 17 "\$302A- Additional licensure requirements. In addition
- 18 to the licensure requirements of section 302A-805, beginning on

3	SECTION 4. (a) The department of education, in
4	collaboration with the department of human services and experts
5	in the field of human trafficking, shall develop, as part of the
6	department of education's health curriculum, content on human
7	trafficking. Such content shall include methods used to lure
8	children into trafficking, identification of trafficking
9	victims, the treatment of victims of human trafficking by
10	traffickers, strategies that assist in preventing the human
11	trafficking of children, and resource information on human
12	trafficking.
13	(b) The curriculum required by subsection (a) shall be
14	included in the department of education's health education
15	curriculum by the 2012-2013 school year.
16	SECTION 5. New statutory material is underscored.
17	SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Human Trafficking; Education

#### Description:

Requires teachers to take a minimum of two hours of training on human trafficking in order to obtain or renew a license from the Hawaii teacher standards board. Requires the department of education, in collaboration with the department of human services, to provide training for employees of the department of education on human trafficking. Requires the department of human services to provide the department of education with resource materials on human trafficking. Requires the department of education to include content on human trafficking as part of its health education curriculum.
