### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FOOD BEARING TREES.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- SECTION 1. Chapter 46, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended
  by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to
  read as follows:

  "\$46- Limitation on liability. A county shall not be
- 1 liable for any injury to any person arising from the person's
  harvesting from food bearing trees planted pursuant to section

  344-4, on lands owned or controlled by the county, unless the
  injury results from gross negligence on the part of the county."

  SECTION 2. Chapter 171, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to read as follows:
- "S171- Limitation on liability. The State shall not be
  liable for any injury to any person arising from the person's
  harvesting from food bearing trees planted pursuant to section
  344-4, on lands owned or controlled by the State, unless the
- 16 injury results from gross negligence on the part of the State."
- 17 SECTION 3. Section 344-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
