## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE WEED AND SEED PROGRAM.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that weed and seed is a
- 2 program administered by the United States Attorney's Office in
- 3 partnership with the YMCA of Honolulu. Initiated in the country
- 4 in 1992, weed and seed is a comprehensive multi-agency approach
- to law enforcement, crime prevention, and community 5
- revitalization. Although no longer funded by the United States 6
- 7 Department of Justice, weed and seed is a recognized "brand
- name" in Hawaii, having been in existence since 1998. 8
- 9 legislature finds that it is a robust program, doing substantial
- 10 good in our communities.
- 11 The weed and seed program is a collaborative effort among
- 12 law enforcement agencies at the federal, state, and county
- levels; social service agencies; private businesses; faith-based 13
- organizations; the public sector, including city, state, and 14
- 15 federal departments; schools; nonprofit organizations; and
- 16 residents to reclaim, restore, and rebuild communities.

Prevention, intervention, and treatment programs; and 2 (3) 3 (4)Neighborhood restoration. The weed and seed program works with local law enforcement to 4 prevent, control, and reduce violent crime, drug abuse, and gang 5 6 activity in targeted neighborhoods by "weeding" out the criminal 7 element in the community. Community policing involves having police officers work closely with community residents to develop 8 solutions to violent and drug-related crimes. "Seeding" the 9 community involves collaboration among various human services 10 organizations to implement prevention, intervention treatment, 11 12 and neighborhood revitalization projects, programs, and 13 activities. 14 The legislature also finds that the State has benefited greatly from weed and seed, based on programs at sites on Oahu 15 that encompass Kalihi-Palama, Chinatown, Downtown Honolulu, Ala 16 Moana, Sheridan, McCully, Waipahu, and Ewa Beach. Since the 17 implementation of the program, crime in those areas has 18 decreased significantly. The legislature further finds that the 19 20 program's success warrants the continued operation of weed and seed in these communities, and envisions expanding it to other 21 22 communities in the future.

5	(2)	Appropriate funds to maintain current operations of	
6		the weed and seed program and expand the weed and seed	
7		program into other areas of the State.	
8	SECTION 2. Chapter 371, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
9	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated		
10	and to read as follows:		
11	" <u>§37</u>	1- Weed and seed program. (a) There is established	
12	within th	e department the weed and seed program to reduce crime	
13	and impro	ve the quality of life for residents and neighborhoods	
14	in the State. The weed and seed program shall be a		
15	collaborative effort among community residents, law enforcement		
16	agencies,	social service providers, educators, area businesses,	
17	and other	resource agencies and support organizations to:	
18	<u>(1)</u> ,	Create, initiate, implement, and support responsible	
19		community-based activities, projects, and services	

1	(2) Engage members of the community to encourage the		
2	development and maintenance of economic and social		
3	well-being; and		
4	(3) Teach and model collaborative efforts that focus on		
5	sustainable results.	•	
6	(b) No later than twenty days prior to the convening of		
7	each regular session of the legislature, the department shall		
8	submit a report to the legislature and the governor on its		
9	activities relating to the weed and seed program, including		
10	projects completed or ongoing, funds expended, and other		
11	relevant data or information on the program."		
12	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general		
13	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so muc	ch:	
14	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 to		
15	maintain the weed and seed program in areas currently designated		
16	for the weed and seed program and to expand the weed and seed		
17	program into other areas of the State.		
18	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of		
19	labor and industrial relations for the purposes of this Act.		
20	SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored.

SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2012.
