A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO OCEAN RESOURCES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I
2	SECTION 1. Section 171-58.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
3	amended to read as follows:
4	"§171-58.5 Prohibitions. The mining or taking of sand,
5	dead coral or coral rubble, rocks, soil, or other marine
6	deposits seaward from the shoreline is prohibited with the
7	following exceptions:
8	(1) The <u>inadvertent</u> taking from seaward of the shoreline
9	of [such] these materials, [not in excess of one
10	gallon per person per day for reasonable, personal,
11	noncommercial use; such as those inadvertently
12 .	carried away on the body, and on clothes, toys,
13	recreational equipment, and bags, not to exceed one
14	gallon per person per day;
15	(2) For the replenishment or protection of public
16	shoreline areas and adjacent public lands seaward of
17	the shoreline, or construction or maintenance of state
18	approved lagoons, harbors, launching ramps, or

1		navigational channels with a permit authorized under
2		chapter 183C;
3	(3)	The clearing of [such] these materials from existing
4		drainage pipes and canals and from the mouths of
5		streams including clearing for the purposes under
6		section 46-11.5; provided that the sand removed shall
7		be placed on adjacent areas unless this placement
8		would result in significant turbidity; [ex]
9	(4)	The cleaning of areas seaward of the shoreline for
10		state or county maintenance purposes including the
11		purposes under section 46-12; provided that the sand
12		removed shall be placed on adjacent areas unless
13		[such] the placement would result in significant
14		turbidity[-];
15	<u>(5)</u>	The exercise of traditional cultural practices as
16		authorized by law or as permitted by the department
17		pursuant to article XII, section 7, of the Hawaii
18		state constitution; or
19	<u>(6)</u>	For the response to a public emergency or a state or
20		local disaster."
21	SECT	ION 2. Section 205A-44, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
22	amended by	y amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

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1	" (a)	The mining or taking of sand, dead coral or coral
2	rubble, r	ocks, soil, or other beach or marine deposits from the
3	shoreline	area is prohibited with the following exceptions:
4	(1)	The <u>inadvertent</u> taking from the shoreline area of the
5		materials, [not in excess of one gallon per person per
6		day, for reasonable, personal, noncommercial use,
7		provided that stricter provisions may be established
8		by the counties; such as those inadvertently carried
9		away on the body, and on clothes, toys, recreational
10		equipment, and bags, not to exceed one gallon per
11		person per day;
12	(2)	Where the mining or taking is authorized by a variance
13		pursuant to this part;
14	(3)	The clearing of [the] these materials from existing
15		drainage pipes and canals and from the mouths of
16		streams including clearing for the purposes under
17		section 46-11.5; provided that the sand removed shall
18		be placed on adjacent areas unless [such] the
19		placement would result in significant turbidity; [or]
20	(4)	The cleaning of the shoreline area for state or county
21		maintenance purposes, including the clearing for
22		purposes under section 46-12; provided that the sand

1		removed shall be placed on adjacent areas unless the
· 2		placement would result in significant turbidity[-];
3	<u>(5)</u>	The taking of driftwood, shells, beach glass, glass
4		floats, or seaweed;
5	<u>(6)</u>	The exercise of traditional cultural practices as
6		authorized by law or as permitted by the department
7		pursuant to article XII, section 7, of the Hawaii
8		state constitution; or
9	<u>(7)</u>	For the response to a public emergency or a state or
10		local disaster."
11	SECT	ION 3. Chapter 171, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
12	amended by	y adding two new sections to be appropriately

14	" <u>§17</u>	1- Traditional names of kanaka maoli fishponds, or
15	loko iʻa.	(a) Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary,
16	the board	shall provide preference to the retention of the
17	tradition	al name of a kanaka maoli fishpond or loko i'a, when
18	issuing l	eases for public land suitable for reconstruction,
19	restoration	on, repair, or use of kanaka maoli fishponds or loko
20	i'a. The	board shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 to
21	effectuate	e this section.

- 2 fishponds" or "loko i'a" have the same meaning as "Hawaiian
- 3 fishponds" as defined in section 183B-1.
- 4 §171- Lease preferences; Hawaiian fishponds or loko i'a.
- 5 (a) Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, the board
- 6 shall provide preferences for the reconstruction, restoration,
- 7 repair, or use of Hawaiian fishponds, generally referred to as
- 8 loko i'a and subject to chapter 183B, when issuing leases for
- 9 state land suitable for Hawaiian fishponds.
- 10 (b) The board shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 to
- 11 effectuate this section, including rules to streamline the
- 12 application approval process for applicants for leases for the
- 13 purpose of reconstruction, restoration, repair, or use of
- 14 Hawaiian fishponds or loko i'a.
- 15 (c) No lease for public land containing an existing
- 16 Hawaiian fishpond or loko i'a or the site of an identifiable
- 17 historic Hawaiian fishpond or loko i'a shall be granted if the
- 18 terms of the lease preclude or foreclose the reconstruction,
- 19 restoration, repair, or use of the fishpond or site as a
- 20 Hawaiian fishpond or loko i'a.

5	SECT	TION 4. Chapter 183B, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
6	amended b	y adding a new section to be appropriately designated
7	and to re	ad as follows:
8	" <u>§18</u>	3B- East Honolulu fishpond heritage area;
9	establish	ed. (a) The department of land and natural resources
10	shall est	ablish the east Honolulu fishpond heritage area to:
11	<u>(1)</u>	Preserve existing Hawaiian fishponds and related
12		cultural and historical sites, including traditional
13		fishpond structures, including traditional rock walls,
14		fishpond gates, and auwai, while making it permissible
15		and desirable to repair, strengthen, and maintain
16		these structures;
17	(2)	Preserve existing native Hawaiian fish and fish
18		habitat, plants and plant habitat, and endangered
19		birds that presently inhabit the area;
20	<u>(3)</u>	Preserve existing spring water sources, on the surface
21		and underground, from harmful alterations or
22		development; and

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1	(4) Preserve customary and traditional uses of fishponds
2	in the fishpond heritage area.
3	(b) The department of land and natural resources shall
4	consult as necessary with appropriate federal, state, and county
5	agencies and community members to implement this section.
6	(c) For purposes of this section, "east Honolulu fishpond
7	heritage area" encompasses the following parcels:
, 8	(1) The Kalauhaihai fishpond, identified by tax map key
9	numbers 3-7-002:018 and 3-7-002-77;
10	(2) The state-owned portion of Kanewai fishpond,
11	identified by tax map key number 3-8-002-030; and
12	(3) The land identified by tax map key number 3-8-002-
13	<u>027.</u> "
14	SECTION 5. All Hawaiian fishponds held as public lands
15	under the jurisdiction of the department of land and natural
16	resources shall be held in trust and transferred to a Native
17	Hawaiian government upon the establishment of such a government.

19	SECTION 6. If any provision of this Act, or the
20	application thereof to any person or circumstance, is held
21	invalid, the invalidity does not affect other provisions or
22	applications of the Act that can be given effect without the
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- 1 invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions
- 2 of this Act are severable.
- 3 SECTION 7. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 4 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 5 SECTION 8. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Report Title:

Sand Removal; Beach or Marine Deposits; DLNR; State Leases; Hawaiian Fishponds

Description:

Clarifies the prohibition against removal of sand and beach or marine deposits, except for materials inadvertently taken, not to exceed one gallon per person per day. Creates exemptions for public emergencies and traditional cultural practices. Directs the Department of Land and Natural Resources to establish the east Honolulu fishpond heritage area. Provides state lease preferences for the reconstruction, restoration, repair, or use of Hawaiian and kanaka maoli fishponds. Creates a preference for the use of traditional names of Hawaiian fishponds. (SB2305 HD1)

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
