A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AGING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I			
2	SECTION 1. In 1965, the Older Americans Act established a			
3	delivery system of services and supports for older adults. In			
4	1975, this service delivery system was codified into the Hawaii			
5	Revised Statutes. With guidance from the United States			
6	Administration on Aging and the Centers for Medicare and			
7	Medicaid Services, the state executive office on aging and the			
8	county offices on aging are currently making sweeping changes to			
9	transform this system to reflect current and future needs of			
10	older adults and people with disabilities.			
11	The purpose of this Act is to build a statewide system of			
12	support for Hawaii's older adults and their family caregivers			
13	by:			
14	(1) Enhancing the delivery of home- and community-based			
15	services through the kupuna care program; and			
16	(2) Engaging seniors in community activities, encouraging			
17	healthy aging, and assisting older adults living with			
18	Alzheimer's disease and related dementia.			

1 2 SECTION 2. According to the executive office on aging, the 3 elderly population in Hawaii is one of the fastest growing 4 segments of the population in the country. Between 1990 and 5 2000, the number of persons aged sixty and older increased by 6 nineteen per cent, compared to a nationwide increase of nine per 7 Studies conducted by the executive office on aging and 8 the four county area agencies on aging have indicated that the 9 elderly in Hawaii have a significant need for assistance in 10 various areas and this need is outpacing the ability to provide 11 assistance. Significant issues that arise with elderly people 12 include health status, changes in family structure (caregivers), 13 social security stability for the future, fear of health care 14 burdens (financial stability), and changes in public 15 responsibility. Case management and needs assessments of older 16 adults are required to mold programs and services to meet the 17 needs of the elderly community. As Hawaii's culture and values 18 revolve around family, most caregiving of the elderly in Hawaii 19 is provided by family members, which poses financial hardships 20 for these family members. Financial stability and burden are 21 the main issues for the elderly and their caregivers and 22 Long-term care services are expensive and the high 2012-0818 SB2320 SD1 SMA.doc

- 1 cost of services may lead to changes in living arrangements and
- 2 family households, especially in Hawaii.
- The State's kupuna care program (kupuna care) was
- 4 established in 1999 to address the needs of the aging population
- 5 and the issues arising from those needs. The program is home-
- 6 and community-based, designed to address the increasing need for
- 7 affordable long-term care and the desire of the elderly to age
- 8 in place. The program provides funding for services to
- 9 populations who are not eligible for medicaid, but cannot afford
- 10 services or insurance on their own. Therefore, the program has
- 11 no financial eligibility criteria and services are free to
- 12 clients, although consumers are asked to make voluntary
- 13 donations to the service provider. Kupuna care is an
- 14 alternative to traditional long-term care options, which are
- 15 often more costly, and the program fills an important gap in
- 16 assistance for the elderly in Hawaii.
- 17 The purpose of this part is to appropriate funds for the
- 18 kupuna care program.
- 19 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 20 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$4,200,000 or so much
- 21 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 for the

- 1 kupuna care program; provided that the sum appropriated shall be
- 2 in addition to the executive office on aging's base budget.
- 3 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 4 health for the purposes of this part.
- 5 PART III
- 6 SECTION 4. The legislature finds that multi-service senior
- 7 centers offer a wide selection of daily events and activities,
- 8 classes, intergenerational opportunities, computer education,
- 9 cultural activities, fitness and health programs, and social
- 10 services for Hawaii's older adults. Senior centers are a venue
- 11 for older adults to socialize in a safe and healthy environment,
- 12 thus enabling participants to remain active and engaged in the
- 13 community.
- 14 Another opportunity to engage seniors is through health
- 15 promotion activities. Hawaii's healthy aging partnership
- 16 program is a statewide coalition established in 2003 to improve
- 17 the well-being of older adults by adapting evidence-based health
- 18 promotion programs to our multi-cultural population.
- In spite of the evidence-based programs that keep older
- 20 adults healthy and independent, among the more common diseases
- 21 that Hawaii's elderly battle are Alzheimer's disease and related
- 22 dementia. Six out of ten people with Alzheimer's disease and



- 1 related dementia will wander during the course of their illness.
- 2 Wandering can be dangerous and sometimes fatal, and causes
- 3 stress among caregivers and family members.
- 4 The legislature finds that there are registration services
- 5 through which individuals who wander can be more easily located,
- 6 identified, and returned safely to their families. These
- 7 services also aid police and other first responders in the safe
- 8 return of the elderly who are found but who cannot remember
- 9 essential contact information.
- 10 The purpose of this part is to appropriate funds for the
- 11 following:
- 12 (1) The healthy aging partnership program;
- 13 (2) Senior centers; and
- (3) Support and promote participation in elder
- registration services.
- 16 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
- 17 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$426,722 or so much
- 18 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 for the
- 19 healthy aging partnership program.
- The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 21 health's executive office on aging for the purposes of this
- 22 part.

1	SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general				
2	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$285,000 or so much				
3	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 to provide

5	Statutes, for senior centers and to be distributed as follows:				
6	(1) Catholic Charities Hawaii for the				
7	Lanakila multi-purpose senior center \$175,000

11	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of

16	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 as a				
17	grant, pursuant to chapter 42F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to the				
18	Alzheimer's Association, Aloha Chapter, to:				
19	(1) Establish a wanderer's registration service to protect				
20	individuals with Alzheimer's disease and related				
21	dementia;

1	(2)	Conduct targeted outreach throughout the State to
2		increase enrollment in the national wanderer's
3		registry and offer scholarships and subsidies to low-
4		income families, as defined by the United States
5		Department of Health and Human Services' 2011 poverty
6		guidelines for Hawaii, who want to enroll in the
7		registry;
8	(3)	Conduct annual training for first responders and other
9		community members to increase awareness and provide
10		ongoing education on best practices for search and
11		rescue efforts for people with dementia; and
12	(4)	When authorized by the family, issue customized
13		updates and information through social media to
14		provide alerts to community members and assist with
15		search and rescue efforts.
16	The	sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
17	health's	executive office on aging for the purposes of this
