A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AGING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I		
2	SECTION 1. In 1965, the Older Americans Act established a		
3	system to provide services and supports for older adults. With		
4	guidance from the United States Administration on Aging and the		
5	Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, the department of		
6	health's executive office on aging and the county offices on		
7	aging are currently making sweeping changes to transform the		
8	system in Hawaii to reflect current and future needs of older		
9	adults, including those with disabilities.		
10	The purpose of this Act is to build a statewide system of		
11	support for Hawaii's older adults and their family caregivers		
12	by:		
13	(1) Enhancing the delivery of home- and community-based		
14	services through the kupuna care program;		
15	(2) Statutorily establishing the kupuna care program under		
16	the executive office on aging; and		

1	(3) Engaging seniors in community activities, encouraging
2	healthy aging, and assisting older adults living with
3	Alzheimer's disease and related dementia.
4	PART II
5	SECTION 2. According to the executive office on aging, the
6	elderly population in Hawaii is one of the fastest growing
7	segments of the population in the country. Between 1990 and
8	2000, the number of persons aged sixty and older increased by
9	nineteen per cent, compared to a nationwide increase of nine per
10	cent. Studies conducted by the executive office on aging and
11	the four county agencies on aging have indicated that the
12	elderly in Hawaii have a significant need for assistance in
13	various areas and this need is outpacing the ability to provide
14	assistance. Significant issues that arise with elderly people
15	include health status, changes in family structure (caregivers),
16	social security stability for the future, fear of health care
17	burdens (financial stability), and changes in public
18	responsibility. Case management and needs assessments of older
19	adults are required to develop programs and services that meet
20	the needs of the elderly. As Hawaii's culture and values
21	revolve around the family, caregiving of the elderly in Hawaii

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- 1 is often provided by family members, which poses financial
- 2 hardships for family members. Financial stability and burden
- 3 are the main issues for the elderly and their caregivers and
- 4 families. Long-term care services are expensive and the high
- 5 cost of services may lead to changes in living arrangements and
- 6 family households, especially in Hawaii.
- 7 The State's kupuna care program (kupuna care) was
- 8 established in 1999 to address the needs of the aging population
- 9 and the issues arising from those needs. The program is home-
- 10 and community-based, designed to address the increasing need for
- 11 affordable long-term care and the desire of the elderly to age
- 12 in place. The program provides funding for services to
- 13 populations who are not eligible for medicaid, but cannot afford
- 14 services or insurance on their own. The program has no
- 15 financial eligibility criteria and services are free to clients,
- 16 although clients are asked to make voluntary donations to the
- 17 service provider. The kupuna care program is an alternative to
- 18 traditional long-term care options and fills an important gap in
- 19 assistance for the elderly in Hawaii.

The purpose of this part is to statutorily establish the 1 kupuna care program within the executive office on aging and 2 appropriate funds for the program. 3 4 SECTION 3. Chapter 349, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 5 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 6 and to read as follows: Kupuna care program. (a) There is established 7 "§349the kupuna care program within the executive office on aging. 8 9 The kupuna care program shall provide affordable and quality home- and community-based services that are person-centered and 10 11 consumer-directed for adults that are sixty years of age and older and family caregivers. 12 13 (b) The kupuna care program shall be available in every county as a function of the aging and disability resource 14 15 centers. (c) As used in this section, unless the context otherwise 16 17 requires: "Aging and disability resource centers" means an entity 18 19 established by the State as part of the state system of long-

term care, serving as a highly visible and trusted source, where

people of all incomes and ages can get information on the full

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- 1 range of long-term support options, and a single point of entry
- 2 for access to public long-term support programs and benefits.
- "Family caregivers" means a spouse, adult child, other
- 4 relative, partner, or friend who has a personal relationship
- 5 with, and provides a broad range of unpaid assistance for, an
- 6 older adult with a chronic or disabling condition.
- 7 (d) The director shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91
- 8 necessary for the purposes of this section."
- 9 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
- 10 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 11 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 for the
- 12 kupuna care program; provided that the sum appropriated shall be
- 13 in addition to the executive office on aging's base budget.
- 14 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 15 health for the purposes of this part.
- 16 PART III
- 17 SECTION 5. The legislature finds that multi-service senior
- 18 centers offer a wide selection of daily events and activities,
- 19 classes, intergenerational opportunities, computer education,
- 20 cultural activities, fitness and health programs, and social
- 21 services for Hawaii's older adults. Senior centers are a venue

- 1 for older adults to socialize in a safe and healthy environment,
- 2 thus enabling participants to remain active and engaged in the
- 3 community.
- 4 Another opportunity to engage seniors is through health
- 5 promotion activities. Hawaii's healthy aging partnership
- 6 program is a statewide coalition established in 2003 to improve
- 7 the well-being of older adults by adapting evidence-based health
- 8 promotion programs to the State's multi-cultural population.
- 9 Hawaii's elderly commonly battle Alzheimer's disease and
- 10 related dementia. Six out of ten people with Alzheimer's
- 11 disease and related dementia will wander during the course of
- 12 their illness. Wandering can be dangerous and sometimes fatal,
- 13 and causes stress among caregivers and family members.
- 14 The legislature finds that there are registration services
- 15 through which individuals who wander can be more easily located,
- 16 identified, and returned safely to their families. These
- 17 services also aid police and other first responders to secure
- 18 the safe return of the elderly who are found but who cannot
- 19 remember essential contact information.
- 20 The purpose of this part is to appropriate funds for the
- 21 following:

1	(1) The healthy aging partnership program;
2	(2) Senior centers; and
3	(3) The support and promotion of elder registration
4	services.
5	SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general
6	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
7	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 for
8	the healthy aging partnership program of the department of
9	health's executive office on aging
10	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
11	health for the purposes of this part.
12	SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of the general
13	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
14	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 to provide
15	funding for grants, pursuant to chapter 42F, Hawaii Revised
16	Statutes, for senior centers and to be distributed as follows:
17	(1) Catholic Charities Hawaii for the
18	Lanakila multi-purpose senior center \$
19	(2) Moiliili Community Center for the
20	Moiliili senior center \$
21	(3) Waikiki Community Center \$

1	The	sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
2	health fo	r the purposes of this part.
3	SECT	ION 8. There is appropriated out of the general
4	revenues	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
5	thereof a	s may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 as a
6	grant, pu	rsuant to chapter 42F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to the
7	Alzheimer	's Association, Aloha Chapter, to:
8	(1)	Establish a wanderer's registration service to protect
9		individuals with Alzheimer's disease and related
10		dementia;
11	(2)	Conduct targeted outreach throughout the State to
12		increase enrollment in the national wanderer's
13		registry and offer scholarships and subsidies to low-
14		income families, as defined by the United States
15		Department of Health and Human Services' 2011 poverty
16		guidelines for Hawaii, who want to enroll in the
17		registry;
18	(3)	Conduct annual training for first responders and other
19		community members to increase awareness and provide
20		ongoing education on best practices for search and
21	•	rescue efforts for people with dementia; and

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1	(4) When authorized by the family, issue customized
2	updates and information through social media to
3	provide alerts to the community and assist with search
4	and rescue efforts.
5	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
6	health for the purposes of this part.
7	PART IV
8	SECTION 9. New statutory material is underscored.
9	SECTION 10. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2012.
