A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AGRICULTURE.

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BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that it is an important
2	priority to encourage beekeeping operations of all sizes
3	throughout the State to ensure the continued viability of
4	honeybee stocks both in managed apiaries and in the wild. Honey
5	bees are a primary pollinator of food crops essential for many
6	agricultural and horticultural operations. However, honeybee
7	populations are declining at a rapid rate due to disease and
8	predators. Varroa mites, small hive beetles, and nosema have
9	decimated honeybee populations throughout Hawaii and the
10	mainland United States.
11	The legislature further finds that the best way to make
12	beekeeping an attractive proposition in Hawaii is to make it
13	easier and financially viable for beekeepers to legally extract,
14	bottle, and sell their honey by minimizing the administrative
15	and bureaucratic requirements in ways that will not affect
16	public safety. Honey is antiseptic, antibiotic, antifungal, and
17	antibacterial it never spoils and does not host harmful

- 1 artisanal honey in Hawaii, and beekeepers will overcome today's
- 2 difficult environmental obstacles to farming bees if they can
- 3 successfully sell their honey.
- 4 Most small beekeepers cannot successfully navigate the
- 5 current regulatory hurdles required to operate a certified food-
- 6 processing establishment on their own premises for the
- 7 extraction and bottling of honey. Currently, if located in
- 8 remote areas without chlorinated county water, beekeepers are
- 9 required to carry the frames of honey away from their farms in
- 10 bee boxes to an existing certified kitchen, a practice that can
- 11 endanger healthy bees. Many have given up beekeeping, and
- 12 others game the system by utilizing paper commissary agreements
- 13 to fulfill the regulatory hurdle.
- 14 The purpose of this Act is to encourage beekeeping
- 15 operations in the State by exempting honey producers from
- 16 processing the product in a certified honey house or food-
- 17 processing establishment; provided that certain requirements are
- 18 met.
- 19 SECTION 2. Chapter 328, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 20 amended by adding a new section to part IVA to be appropriately
- 21 designated and to read as follows:

1	"§328- Honey producers without access to municipal				
2	water; exemption. (a) A producer of raw unprocessed or				
3	processed honey, as defined in sections 147-21 and 147-51,				
4	respectively, who does not have access to municipal water				
5	supplies or infrastructure, shall not be required to process				
6	honey in a food-processing establishment certified by the				
7	department of health if the honey producer:				
8	(1) Uses water that has been treated to meet or exceed				
9	state and federal drinking water standards;				
10	(2) Prepares the honey adjacent to permanent or temporary				
1,1	hand-washing facilities; and				
12	(3) Complies with rules adopted by the department of				
13	health to protect the health and safety of the public.				
14	(b) The honey producer shall test the water used for				
15	processing honey no less than once a month and shall maintain				
16	water quality records for a period of no less than two years.				
17	The honey producer shall make those records available to the				
18	department upon request."				
19	SECTION 3. Section 328-79, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is				
20	amended to read as follows:				
21	"[+]§328-79[+] Home-based agricultural producer of honey;				
22	exemption. A home-based agricultural producer of honey shall

18			produced and processed." in clear and conspicuous
19			print[-]; and
20		<u>(F)</u>	The statement, "This honey was not produced or
21			packaged in a department inspected facility." in
22			clear and conspicuous print."

- 3 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Report Title:

Agricultural Products; Honey; Exemption

Description:

Exempts honey producers who do not have access to municipal water supplies or infrastructure from processing the honey in a food processing establishment certified by the department of health if certain requirements are met. Increases the threshold for honey production, for which certain producers of honey are exempt from the requirement that honey be processed in a certified honey house or food processing establishment; provided that the producer meets certain labeling requirements.
