A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FUNDING FOR WATERSHED PROTECTION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the State has a
- 2 compelling interest in protecting its precious natural
- 3 environment. Several countries and international and domestic
- 4 cities have successfully implemented laws that have reduced non-
- 5 reusable checkout bag usage and used the fees to protect the
- 6 environment. A significant reduction of non-reusable checkout
- 7 bag waste and litter in Hawaii would likely benefit the public's
- 8 health and welfare because the people of Hawaii depend on our
- 9 natural environment for economic, social, and cultural reasons.
- 10 The legislature also finds that the production and disposal
- 11 of non-reusable checkout bags should be mitigated by additional
- 12 funding to reduce water quality damage, deforestation, and
- 13 climate change. Improper disposal of bags, particularly plastic
- 14 bags, pollutes Hawaii's streams and coral reefs and strangles
- 15 and starves endangered marine animals. Increasing the resilience
- 16 of marine ecosystems to the threat posed by pollution requires
- 17 litter removal, strengthening water quality measures, and
- 18 reducing erosion and sedimentation of reefs.

- 1 The purpose of this Act is to reduce the adverse impact of
- 2 non-reusable checkout bag waste on Hawaii's precious and unique
- 3 natural environment by establishing an offset fee for the
- 4 distribution of single-use checkout bags to fund programs to
- 5 improve water quality and resilience to climate change.
- 6 SECTION 2. Chapter 342H, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 7 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and
- 8 to read as follows:
- 9 "PART . SINGLE-USE CHECKOUT BAG FEE
- 10 §342H-A Definitions. As used in this part, unless the
- 11 context otherwise requires:
- 12 "Business" means any commercial enterprise or
- 13 establishment, including sole proprietorships, joint ventures,
- 14 partnerships, and corporations, or any other legally cognizable
- 15 entity, and includes all employees of the business or any
- 16 independent contractors associated with the business.
- 17 "Department" means the department of land and natural
- 18 resources.
- 19 "Mil" means one thousandth of an inch.
- 20 "Reusable bag" means a bag with handles that is
- 21 specifically designed and manufactured for multiple reuse and is
- 22 made of:

17	any customer p	articipating in federally approved nutrition
18	assistance pro	grams, including the supplemental nutrition

- 3 (c) Nothing in this part shall preclude businesses from
- 4 making reusable bags available for sale to customers.
- 5 (d) A business may retain twenty per cent of the fees
- 6 collected from January 1, 2013, until December 31, 2013, and ten
- 7 per cent of the fees collected thereafter, that shall be subject
- **8** to chapters 235 and 237.
- 9 §342H-C Remittance of fees. (a) No later than the last
- 10 day of each month, each business subject to the requirements of
- 11 this part shall remit to the department the fees collected
- 12 pursuant to section 342H-B during the immediately preceding
- 13 month; provided that a small business may remit the fees on a
- 14 quarterly basis on the last day of the month following the end
- 15 of a quarter.
- 16 (b) Payments and receipts of fees shall be reported on
- 17 forms prescribed by the department. Any proprietary information
- 18 obtained by the department shall be kept confidential and shall
- 19 not be disclosed to any other person.
- 20 (c) Businesses shall be subject to penalties and interest
- 21 for late or underpaid fees.

- (d) All fees collected by the department pursuant to this
 part shall be deposited as follows:
- 3 (1) Sixty per cent of the fees collected from January 1,
 4 2013, until December 31, 2013, and seventy per cent of
 5 the fees collected thereafter, into the natural area
 6 reserve fund to be expended by the department on
 7 watershed protection and restoration and for expenses
 8 related to the administration and enforcement of this
 9 part; and
- 10 (2) Twenty per cent of the fees collected into the
 11 environmental management special fund established
 12 pursuant to section 342G-63, to be expended by the
 13 department of health for expenses related to clean
 14 water and environment protection.
- §342H-D Violations. (a) It shall be a violation of this
 part for any business that is subject to the requirements of
 this part to pay or otherwise reimburse a customer for any
 portion of the fee required to be charged and collected pursuant
 to section 342H-B.
- (b) Violations of this part or any rule adopted pursuant
 to this part shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$1,000
 for each violation.

Report Title:

Single-use Checkout Bags; Fees; Watershed Protection; DLNR

Description:

Requires businesses in the State to collect a 10-cent fee for each single-use checkout bag provided to a customer, with certain exceptions. Subject to income and general excise taxes, allows businesses to keep 20% of the fees collected from 1/1/13 to 12/31/13 and 10% thereafter. Requires fees to be collected on paper bags in counties that currently have ordinances banning plastic bags. Authorizes 20% of the fees collected to be expended by DOH for clean water projects. Authorizes 60% of the fees collected from 1/1/13 to 12/31/13, and 70% thereafter, to be expended by DLNR for watershed protection. Takes effect 1/1/2013.
