### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FIREWORKS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the use of consumer
- 2 fireworks causes fires and burn injuries mostly to children.
- 3 Fireworks produce excessive smoke contributing to breathing
- 4 difficulties. Loud fireworks noises traumatize both war
- 5 veterans and pets. With the increase in fireworks-related
- 6 calls, public safety agencies are strained to maintain adequate
- 7 response levels for other critical emergencies. Our state and
- 8 communities deserve to live in peace and security, without the
- 9 public safety risk and disruptive impact of consumer fireworks.
- 10 The purpose of this Act is to limit the use of consumer
- 11 fireworks for cultural purposes only and at designated times,
- 12 while continuing to allow display fireworks, articles
- 13 pyrotechnic, and aerial devices that are conducted by licensed
- 14 professionals.
- 15 SECTION 2. Section 132D-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 16 amended by amending the definitions of "consumer fireworks" and
- 17 "cultural" to read as follows:
- ""Consumer fireworks" [means]:

8	a radius of twelve feet as measured from the point
9	where the item was placed and ignited, novelty or
10	trick items, combination items, and other fireworks of
11	like construction that are designed to produce the

14	mores, and history of all of the various ethnic groups of
15	Hawaii[-] and includes religious events."
16	SECTION 3. Section 132D-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
