A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAII PAROLING AUTHORITY.

RE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII-

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Hawaii paroling
2	authority plays a vital role in the State's criminal justice
3	system. It determines minimum terms of incarceration for almost
4	all inmates sentenced to prison; grants parole when it
5	determines that an inmate is ready for release into the
6	community; establishes terms and conditions of parole for each
7	offender granted parole; oversees parole officers who monitor
8	and supervise parolees; grants discharges from parole; and makes
9	recommendations for pardons and commutations of sentences.
10	The authority was reconstituted in 1976 by Act 92, Session
11	Laws of Hawaii 1976, with one full-time chair and two part-time
12	members. In the past thirty-six years, its workload has
13	increased eight-fold due to the rise in incarceration rates.

- 14 However, the authority continues to be composed of one full-time
- 15 and two part-time members. Because it is essentially a part-
- 16 time body, the authority finds proper deliberation very
- difficult when reviewing cases and making decisions that are 17
- 18 vital to public safety. Further, the authority is experiencing



- 1 severe difficulties in carrying out its responsibility in
- 2 assuring that the terms and conditions of parole are properly
- 3 enforced with its existing staff.
- 4 The purpose of this Act is to add two more part-time
- 5 members of the Hawaii paroling authority and authorize the
- 6 governor to set the salary of the chair of the paroling
- 7 authority.
- 8 SECTION 2. Section 353-61, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 9 amended to read as follows:
- 10 "\$353-61 Hawaii paroling authority; appointment; tenure;
- 11 qualifications. Members of the paroling authority shall be
- 12 nominated by a panel composed of the chief justice of the Hawaii
- 13 supreme court, the director, the president of the bar
- 14 association of Hawaii, a representative designated by the head
- 15 of the Interfaith Alliance Hawaii, a member from the general
- 16 public to be appointed by the governor, and the president of the
- 17 Hawaii chapter of the National Association of Social Workers.
- 18 The panel shall submit to the governor the names of not less
- 19 than three persons, designated as the nominees, for chairperson
- 20 or as a member, for each vacancy. The requirement for
- 21 nomination by the panel established under this section shall
- 22 only apply to a nominee's nomination by the governor to an





- 1 initial term on the paroling authority and not to any subsequent
- 2 consecutive term of a sitting paroling authority member or
- 3 chairperson whose initial appointment to office was made
- 4 pursuant to a nomination by the panel.
- 5 The governor shall appoint, in the manner prescribed by
- 6 section 26-34, a paroling authority to be known as the Hawaii
- 7 paroling authority, to consist of [three] five members one of
- 8 whom shall be designated chairperson. Appointments shall be
- 9 made for terms of four years, commencing from the date of
- 10 expiration of the last preceding term. Any vacancy in an
- 11 unexpired term shall be filled by appointment for the remainder
- 12 of the unexpired term. Nominees to the authority shall be
- 13 selected on the basis of their qualifications to make decisions
- 14 that will be compatible with the welfare of the community and of
- 15 individual offenders, including their background and ability for
- 16 appraisal of offenders and the circumstances under which
- 17 offenses were committed."
- 18 SECTION 3. Section 353-63, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 19 amended to read as follows:
- 20 "\$353-63 Service of Hawaii paroling authority members;
- 21 compensation; expenses. The chairperson of the Hawaii paroling
- 22 authority shall serve on a full-time basis. The other [two]

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- 1 <u>four</u> members shall serve on a part-time basis. Effective July
- 2 1, [2005,] 2012, the chairperson of the Hawaii paroling
- 3 authority shall be paid a salary [set at eighty-seven per-cent
- 4 of the salary of the director of public safety.] that is
- 5 established by the governor. The compensation of each of the
- 6 part-time members shall be eighty per cent of the hourly wage
- 7 paid the chairperson. For each hour engaged in the official
- 8 duties of the authority, each part-time member of the authority
- 9 shall be paid an hourly wage at the percentage rate specified in
- 10 this section based on the hourly wage paid the chairperson;
- 11 provided that compensation shall not exceed eighty per cent of
- 12 the total regular working hours in a month; provided further
- 13 that part-time members shall not be entitled to any vacation,
- 14 sick leave, or other benefits except as provided in this
- 15 section. All paroling authority members shall receive their
- 16 necessary expenses for travel and incidentals which shall be
- 17 paid from appropriations provided the authority for such
- 18 purposes, on vouchers approved by the director of public
- 19 safety."
- 20 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
- 21 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 22 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 to



- 1 carry out the purposes of this Act, including the purchase of
- 2 office equipment and other expenses related to the new part-time
- 3 paroling authority members.
- 4 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 5 public safety for the purposes of this Act.
- 6 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 7 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 8 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2012.
