A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO URBAN ART.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that graffiti is a
- 2 problem in most communities throughout the State. Appearing
- 3 without authorization on public and private property, graffiti
- 4 causes visual blight and may result in unsightly scenery.
- 5 Individuals engaging in graffiti typically tag buildings, walls,
- 6 bus stops, bridges, underpasses, construction sites, concrete
- 7 columns, postal mail boxes, signs, trees, vehicles, and other
- 8 surfaces able to accommodate their marks and messages. Graffiti
- 9 can also impact property values and the community's perception
- 10 of safety. Because of the negative impacts of graffiti, it is
- 11 an issue of great concern and, to date, the problem persists
- 12 despite community efforts to combat it.
- 13 Graffiti is defined in the Hawaii Revised Statutes as, "any
- 14 unauthorized drawing, inscription, figure, or mark of any type
- 15 intentionally created by paint, ink, chalk, dye, or similar
- 16 substances." However, it can also be a form of legitimate
- 17 artistic expression when it is applied with the consent of a
- 18 property or facility owner. As urban art, graffiti can be a



- 1 creative outlet for people who choose to express themselves and
- 2 comment on social issues. Using artistic and creative talent to
- 3 make social or political commentary, graffiti often consists of
- 4 murals and complicated works of art that take hours to complete.
- 5 The legislature finds that there are different theories
- 6 behind the purpose and effectiveness of urban art projects as a
- 7 graffiti prevention strategy. One theory is that the
- 8 opportunity to perform urban art on approved surfaces will stop
- 9 graffiti on unauthorized properties.
- 10 The legislature also finds that providing legitimate state-
- 11 owned venues for urban art will enrich our communities in many
- 12 ways. This includes taking a positive step to reduce the
- 13 incidence of illegal graffiti by expanding opportunities to
- 14 bring visual art to public places by providing canvases
- 15 appropriate for this form of creative and social expression.
- The purpose of this Act is to create a pilot program for
- 17 the creation of urban art under the direction of the state
- 18 foundation on culture and the arts.
- 19 SECTION 2. (a) There is established a pilot program for
- 20 the creation of urban art on state-owned property under the
- 21 direction of the state foundation on culture and the arts.

1	(b) The	state	foundation	on	culture	and	the	arts	shall

- 2 have sole discretion to establish procedures for the program,
- 3 including procedures that address the following:
- 4 (1) The selection of participating individuals;
- 5 (2) Designation of specific areas for urban art on state6 owned property;
- 7 (3) Requirements and guidelines as to the type and size of urban art and art materials to be used:
- 9 (4) Rights to copyrights for the urban art created;
- 10 (5) Limitations, as necessary, on access to state-owned
 11 property used for the urban art such as requirements
 12 for safety and security; and
- (6) Any other considerations that the state foundation onculture and the arts deems appropriate.
- 15 (c) The state foundation on culture and the arts shall
- 16 consult with the historic preservation division of the
- 17 department of land and natural resources, Historic Hawaii
- 18 Foundation, and any other stakeholders the state foundation on
- 19 culture and the arts deems appropriate, to review, under section
- 20 6E-8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the creation of urban art under
- 21 the pilot program to ensure that such urban art does not cause
- 22 an adverse effect to historic property. Any urban art proposal

- 1 under the pilot program that the historic preservation division
- 2 determines will adversely affect historic property shall not be
- 3 permitted.
- 4 (d) For the purposes of this section:
- 5 "Urban art" means any painting or artistic work composed of
- 6 arrangements of color or black and white. Urban art includes
- 7 mosaics, murals, stencil art, and other art media and
- 8 techniques.
- 9 Urban art excludes:
- 10 (1) Painting or work placed on a structure that is erected
- for the sole or primary purpose of signage; and
- 12 (2) Graffiti as defined in sections 46-1.5(24)(C), 577-
- 13 3.5(a), and 708-823.6(3), Hawaii Revised Statutes.
- 14 (e) The pilot program for the creation of urban art shall
- 15 be repealed on June 30, 2015.
- (f) The state foundation on culture and the arts shall
- 17 report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the
- 18 convening of the regular session of 2015 on the status of the
- 19 pilot program for the creation of urban art and submit its
- 20 findings and recommendations, including any proposed
- 21 legislation, regarding continuation of the program on a

- 1 permanent basis and other recommendations to reduce illicit
- 2 graffiti.
- 3 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
