A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO URBAN ART.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that throughout the
- 2 State, graffiti is a problem in most communities. Graffiti
- 3 appears on public and private property, causes visual blight,
- 4 and results in unsightly scenery. Individuals engaging in
- 5 graffiti typically tag buildings, walls, bus stops, bridges,
- 6 underpasses, construction sites, concrete columns, postal mail
- 7 boxes, signs, trees, vehicles, and other surfaces able to
- 8 accommodate their marks and messages. In some cases, taggers
- 9 place themselves in dangerous situations that could lead to
- 10 injury or death. To date, the problem persists despite
- 11 community efforts to combat graffiti.
- 12 The legislature finds that if individuals are given an
- 13 opportunity to create certain types of urban art on public
- 14 property, these individuals may be less likely to create
- 15 graffiti illegally.
- 16 The purpose of this Act is to create a pilot program for
- 17 the creation of urban art under the direction of the state
- 18 foundation on culture and the arts.

- 1 SECTION 2. (a) There is established a pilot program for
- 2 the creation of urban art under the direction of the state
- 3 foundation on culture and the arts.
- 4 (b) The state foundation on culture and the arts shall
- 5 establish procedures that permit individuals to create urban art
- 6 on property owned in fee simple by the State. The procedures
- 7 shall address the following, at a minimum:
- 8 (1) Selection of the individuals to participate;
- 9 (2) Requirements as to the type and size of the urban art
- and art materials to be used;
- 11 (3) Rights to copyrights of urban art;
- 12 (4) Limitations on access to state property, including
- safety and security considerations; and
- 14 (5) Any other considerations that the state foundation on
- culture and the arts deems appropriate.
- 16 (c) The state foundation on culture and the arts shall
- 17 consult with the historic preservation division of the
- 18 department of land and natural resources to review any proposal
- 19 to create urban art to determine if the urban art may cause an
- 20 adverse effect to a historic property, pursuant to the review
- 21 process for public projects under section 6E-8, Hawaii Revised
- 22 Statutes. If the historic preservation division determines that



- 1 a proposal to create urban art would adversely affect a historic
- 2 or cultural property, the urban art shall not be permitted.
- 3 (d) The pilot project to create urban art shall be
- 4 repealed on June 30, 2015.
- 5 (e) The state foundation on culture and the arts shall
- 6 report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the
- 7 convening of the regular session of 2015 on the status of the
- 8 pilot project to create urban art and any recommendation to
- 9 extend the project on a permanent basis.
- 10 (f) For the purposes of this section:
- "Urban art" means any painting or artistic work composed of
- 12 arrangements of color or black and white. Urban art includes
- 13 mosaics, murals, stencil art, and other art media and
- 14 techniques. Urban art excludes a painting or work placed on a
- 15 structure that is erected for the sole or primary purpose of
- 16 signage.
- 17 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
