# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SUSTAINABILITY.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds and declares that the
2	environmental response, energy, and food security tax supports
3	critical investments in clean energy and local agricultural
4	production to reduce the State's dependence on imported fossil
5	fuels and food products. As currently apportioned, however,
6	only a total of 30 cents of the \$1.05 per barrel tax is being
7	allocated to the energy security special fund and the
8	agricultural development and food security special fund, with
9	just 15 cents going to each fund. The majority of the funds, 60
10	cents per barrel, is deposited into the general fund. The
11	legislature finds that this allocation of the barrel tax is
12	inconsistent with the intent of Act 73, Session Laws of Hawaii
13	2010, which established most of the existing uses of the
14	environmental response, energy, and food security tax revenue,
15	as it was originally envisioned.
16	The purpose of this Act is to:

5	(2)	Continue to provide oversight and analysis of the
6		distribution of the environmental response, energy,
7		and food security tax by extending the sunset date of
8		the Hawaii economic development task force, and
9		renaming it as the Hawaii food and energy security
10		council;

19	SECT	ION 2. Section 243-3.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
20	amended b	y amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
21	"(a)	In addition to any other taxes provided by law,
22	subject t	o the exemptions set forth in section 243-7, there is

- 1 hereby imposed a state environmental response, energy, and food
- 2 security tax on each barrel or fractional part of a barrel of
- 3 petroleum product sold by a distributor to any retail dealer or
- 4 end user of petroleum product, other than a refiner. The tax
- 5 shall be \$1.05 on each barrel or fractional part of a barrel of
- 6 petroleum product that is not aviation fuel; provided that of
- 7 the tax collected pursuant to this subsection:
- **8** (1) 5 cents of the tax on each barrel shall be deposited
- 9 into the environmental response revolving fund
- established under section 128D-2;
- 11 (2)  $[\frac{15}{2}]$  45 cents of the tax on each barrel shall be
- deposited into the energy security special fund
- established under section 201-12.8;
- 14 (3) 10 cents of the tax on each barrel shall be deposited
- into the energy systems development special fund
- established under section 304A-2169; and
- [4) [4] 45 cents of the tax on each barrel shall be
- 18 deposited into the agricultural development and food
- 19 security special fund established under section
- 20 141-10.
- 21 The tax imposed by this subsection shall be paid by the
- 22 distributor of the petroleum product."

1 SECTION 3. Act 73, Session Laws of Hawaii 2010, is amended 2 as follows: 3 1. By amending the title of part III to read: "PART III. HAWAII [ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT TASK FORCE] 4 5 FOOD AND ENERGY SECURITY COUNCIL" 6 2. By amending section 6 to read: 7 "SECTION 6. (a) There is established the Hawaii [economic 8 development task force] food and energy security council within 9 the department of business, economic development, and tourism **10** for administrative purposes. The purpose of the [Hawaii 11 economic development task force] council shall be to facilitate 12 the accelerated adoption and completion of renewable-energy 13 projects, energy-efficiency programs, agricultural 14 infrastructure and development, and other measures to meet the 15 purposes of this Act. The [Hawaii economic development task 16 force] council shall develop and maintain a broad overview of 17 energy and food security issues that apply an interdisciplinary 18 approach to ensure that Hawaii's energy and food policy and 19 program development is integrated within the overall economic, 20 social, environmental, and cultural aspects of society.

- 11 (f) The Hawaii [economic development task force] food and
- 12 energy security council shall submit a report of its findings
- 13 and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the
- 14 legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
- 15 the regular session of 2011.
- 16 The [task force] council shall also submit [a] annual
- 17 follow-up [report] reports to the legislature no later than
- 18 twenty days prior to the convening of the regular [session]
- 19 sessions of 2012[-], 2013, and 2014. [The] Each report shall
- 20 include a description of the activities funded by the
- 21 environmental response, energy, and food security tax, progress

- 3 (g) The Hawaii [economic development task force] food and
- 4 energy security council shall cease to exist on June 30, [2012.]
- 5 2014."
- 6 3. By amending section 14 to read:
- 7 "SECTION 14. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2010;
- 8 provided that sections 2, 3, 4, and 7 of this Act shall be
- 9 repealed on June 30,  $\left[\frac{2015}{4}\right]$  2017, and sections 128D-2,
- 10 201-12.8, and 243-3.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, shall be
- 11 reenacted in the form in which they read on June 30, 2010."
- 12 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the energy
- 13 security special fund the sum of \$8,000,000 or so much thereof
- 14 as may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 for the purposes
- 15 of the energy security special fund.
- 16 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 17 business, economic development, and tourism for the purposes of
- 18 this Act.
- 19 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the agricultural
- 20 development and food security special fund of the State of
- 21 Hawaii the sum of \$8,000,000 or so much thereof as may be

- 1 necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 for the purposes of the
- 2 agricultural development and food security special fund.
- 3 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 4 agriculture for the purposes of this Act.
- 5 SECTION 6. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance of the
- 6 moneys appropriated to the energy security special fund and the
- 7 agricultural development and food security special fund by
- 8 sections 4 and 5 of this Act, respectively, as of the close of
- 9 business on June 30, 2013, shall not lapse to the credit of the
- 10 general fund and shall remain in each respective special fund.
- 11 SECTION 7. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 12 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 13 SECTION 8. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2012;
- 14 provided that section 3 shall take effect on June 29, 2012.

### Report Title:

Barrel Tax; Energy and Food Security; Task Force; Appropriations

#### Description:

Increases the amount of the per-barrel allocation of the barrel tax to the energy security special fund and the agricultural development and food security special fund from 15 cents to 45 cents. Renames the Hawaii economic development task force the Hawaii food and energy security council and extends the sunset date of the council to June 30, 2014. Extends the repeal date of certain amendments to the barrel tax to June 30, 2017. Appropriates funds from the energy security special fund and the agricultural development and food security special fund to DBEDT and DOA, respectively. (SD1)
