A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PUBLIC EMPLOYEES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that identity theft is an 2 increasingly frequent crime with crippling effects on the 3 finances and credit of individuals and businesses. Identity 4 theft occurs when personal information, such as names, social 5 security numbers, credit card numbers, and other information are 6 stolen or obtained and used to commit fraud or other crimes. 7 The department of the attorney general reported over 1,302 cases 8 or incidents of identity theft in the State in 2008. 9 Honolulu Police Department alone reported that its financial fraud unit received over five hundred new cases of identity 10 11 theft in 2009. Due to the increased use of the Internet for 12 purchasing goods and services, completing bank and other financial transactions, social communication, and business 13 14 transactions, people have become increasingly wary of the risk 15 of identity theft.
- Several requests have been made by media organizations over the past few years for information on state employees' salaries,

- 1 distributed over the Internet. In many instances, the
- 2 employee's name and specific salary were listed, causing concern
- 3 that the availability of the information could place employees
- 4 at greater risk of identity theft and raises the issue of
- 5 unwarranted invasion of privacy.
- 6 While the legislature acknowledges the importance of open
- 7 government and the disclosure of certain types of information
- 8 for public inspection, it also recognized the need to balance
- 9 open government with the right to privacy when it enacted the
- 10 Uniform Information Practices Act in 1988. In light of the
- 11 increasing risk of identity theft in recent years, the
- 12 legislature finds that the Uniform Information Practices Act
- 13 should be modified to provide greater privacy protections for
- 14 state and county employees while preserving the intent of the
- 15 law to promote the public's access to certain types of
- 16 information.
- 17 The purpose of this Act is to clarify the required
- 18 disclosure of certain information on public employees, elected
- 19 officials, and appointed department heads.
- 20 SECTION 2. Section 92F-12, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 21 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

19		real property tax information and leases of state

Report Title:

Public Employees; Salary Disclosure

Description:

Amends salary disclosure and other requirements for public employees, elected officials, and appointed department heads. Prohibits disclosure of names of all public employees, excluding elected officials and appointed department heads, when salary information, job position, and job titles for those public employees are disclosed.

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
