A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CONCUSSIONS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that concussions or mild
2	traumatic brain injuries sustained by children and adolescents
3	frequently occur in a variety of sports and recreational
4	activities, such as football, soccer, bicycling, and
5	skateboarding. In October 2011, the Centers for Disease Control
6	and Prevention reported that the number of traumatic brain
7	injury-related emergency department visits in this country by
8	persons nineteen years old or younger that were related to
9	sports and recreational activities increased from 153,375 in
10	2001 to 248,418 in 2009. In this State, the department of
11	education's athletic health care trainers program also noted an
12	increase in the number of reported concussions, from two hundred
13	thirteen in the 2007-2008 school year to four hundred forty-six
14	in the 2010-2011 school year.
15	The marked increase in national and state concussion

The marked increase in national and state concussion

statistics may be attributed at least in part to an increased

awareness of the dangers of concussions by the people involved

- 1 concussion management program in 2011 to educate coaches,
- 2 parents, and athletic trainers and provide care for students.
- 3 The legislature finds, however, that a statewide concussion
- 4 educational program is necessary to ensure that public and
- 5 private high school students, school personnel, and parents are
- 6 provided with consistent and up-to-date information on
- 7 concussions and management of symptoms and injuries relating to
- 8 a concussion.
- 9 The purpose of this Act is to require the department of
- 10 education and the Hawaii High School Athletic Association to
- 11 develop a concussion educational program for students and
- 12 student athletes who are fourteen to eighteen years old. The
- 13 program shall include:
- 14 (1) Education of students, student athletes, parents,
- sports officials, school faculty and staff, and school
- administrators of the signs and symptoms of a
- 17 concussion and what to do if someone demonstrates any
- of these signs or symptoms;
- 19 (2) An annual educational session for coaches and athletic
- 20 trainers about the signs and symptoms of a concussion;
- 21 (3) A requirement for the mandatory removal of a student
- from the athletic activity that the student is

1	participating in if the student demonstrates any signs					
2	or symptoms of a concussion; and					
3	(4) A requirement for a concussed student's physician to					
4	evaluate the student and determine whether the student					
5	is able to return to a particular athletic activity.					
6	SECTION 2. As used in this Act:					
7	"Coach" means a paid or volunteer coach.					
8	"Concussion" means a pathophysiological process affecting					
9	the brain, caused by traumatic biomechanical forces.					
10	"Licensed health care professional" means an advanced					
11	practice registered nurse, certified or registered athletic					
12	trainer, neuropsychologist, physician assistant, physician, or					
13	osteopathic physician trained in the management of sports					
14	concussions.					
15	SECTION 3. The department of education and the Hawaii High					
16	School Athletic Association shall develop a concussion					
17	educational program that shall include:					
18	(1) Educating students, parents, sports officials, school					
19	faculty and staff, coaches, and school administrators					
20	about the signs and symptoms of a concussion and the					
21	procedures to follow if a person displays any of the					

signs or symptoms of a concussion;

1	(2)	Annual educational sessions about the signs and				
2		symptoms of a concussion for coaches and athletic				
3		trainers;				
4	(3)	The need for the mandatory removal of a student from				
5		the school athletic activity or event that the student				
6		is participating in, if the student demonstrates any				
7		signs or symptoms of a concussion;				
8	(4)	The need for a concussed student's licensed health				
9		care professional to evaluate the student and				
10		determine whether the student is able to return to a				
11		particular athletic activity; and				
12	(5)	The monitoring of a student's return to physical				
13		activity by a certified athletic trainer employed by				
14		the school, based upon peer-reviewed scientific				
15		evidence, such as that from the National Athletic				
16		Trainer Association or Centers for Disease Control and				
17		Prevention.				
18	SECT	ION 4. Every public and private school that is a				
19	member of	the Hawaii High School Athletic Association shall				
20	develop and implement a concussion awareness plan. Each plan					
21	shall require:					

1	(1)	Annual concussion awareness training for coaches,					
2		administrators, faculty, staff, and sports officials,					
3		including:					
4		(A) The signs and symptoms of a concussion;					
5		(B) The need to obtain proper medical attention for a					
6		person suspected of having a concussion; and					
7		(C) Information on the nature and risk of					
8		concussions, including the danger of continuing					
9		to play after sustaining a concussion and the					
10		proper method of allowing a student who has					
11		sustained a concussion to return to activity;					
12	(2)	Annual concussion awareness education for parents and					
13		students who participate in a school's athletic team					
14		or programs or both. The parents and students shall					
15		sign a concussion information sheet that they have					
16		attended and received concussion awareness education;					
17	(3)	Immediate removal from a game, practice, or other					
18		activity of any student who exhibits signs, symptoms,					
19		or behaviors consistent with a concussion, such as					
20		loss of consciousness, headache, dizziness, confusion,					
21		or balance problems. The student shall not return to					

1		the activity until cleared to do so by a licensed						
2		hea	health care professional; and					
3	(4)	The	The student to obtain written clearance from a					
4		lice	licensed health care professional prior to returning					
5		to a	to academics and athletics, which:					
6		(A)	Stat	es that the student is capable of resuming				
7			part	icipation in a particular sport;				
8		(B)	May	require the student to follow a plan designed				
9			to a	id the student to recover and resume				
10			part	icipation in school and athletic activities				
11	•		that	:				
12			(i)	Includes, as appropriate, periods of				
13				cognitive and physical rest while symptoms				
14				of a concussion persist; and				
15			(ii)	Reintroduces cognitive and physical demands				
16				on the student on a progressive basis to				
17				prevent the reemergence or worsening of				
18				symptoms of a concussion; and				
19		(C)	Requ	ires that the student's return to physical				
20			acti	vity be monitored by the school's certified				
21			athl	etic trainer, if an athletic trainer is				
22			empl	oyed by the school.				

- 1 SECTION 5. The department of education shall submit a
- 2 report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the
- 3 convening of the regular session of 2013 on the development and
- 4 implementation of the concussion educational program.
- 5 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
