A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Section 302A-1502.4, Hawaii Revised Statutes,
- 2 is amended to read as follows:
- 3 "\$302A-1502.4 Hawaii 3R's school repair and maintenance
- 4 fund. (a) There is established the Hawaii 3R's school repair
- 5 and maintenance fund (hereinafter, "fund") as a separate fund of
- 6 Hawaii 3R's, a Hawaii nonprofit organization. Moneys received
- 7 from the State, county, or federal government, private
- 8 contributions of cash or other property, and the income and
- 9 capital gains earned by the fund shall constitute its assets.
- 10 (b) Hawaii 3R's shall expend moneys from the fund in the
- 11 form of either grants to organizations or contracts with private
- 12 vendors for the repair and maintenance of public schools in
- 13 Hawaii in accordance with this section.
- (c) The fund may receive contributions, grants,
- 15 endowments, or gifts in cash or otherwise from all sources,
- 16 including corporations or other businesses, foundations,
- 17 government, individuals, and other interested parties. The fund
- 18 shall also receive moneys transferred to it from the school-





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    level minor repairs and maintenance special fund established
    under section 302A-1504.5. The legislature intends that public
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    and private sectors review and investigate all potential funding
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    sources. The State may appropriate moneys to the fund; provided
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    that any appropriations made by the State are not intended to
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    supplant the funding of any existing school-level minor repairs
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    and maintenance programs.
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         [(d) Hawaii 3R's shall appoint the members of the Hawaii
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    3R's school maintenance and repair advisory board, which shall
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    be responsible for:
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         (1) Soliciting and otherwise raising funds for the fund;
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         (2) Establishing criteria for the expenditure of funds;
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         (3) Reviewing grant proposals using criteria established
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              by Hawaii 3R's; and
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         (4) Making recommendations for grants and other specific
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              expenditures.
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    Members of the advisory board shall be stakeholders in Hawaii's
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    public educational system, including students, parents, alumni,
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    principals, community and business leaders, and representatives
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    from the department of education and the department of
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    accounting and general services, who shall be represented on the
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    advisory board.
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1	(e) In managing the moneys in the fund, Hawaii 3R's shall
2	exercise ordinary business care and prudence given the facts and
3	circumstances prevailing at the time of action or decisionIn
4	doing so, Hawaii 3R's shall consider its long and short term
5	needs in carrying out its purposes, its present and anticipated
6	financial requirements, expected total return on its
7	investments, price trends, and general economic conditions.
8	(f) There may be an endowment component of the fund, and
9	Hawaii 3R's may accumulate net income and add the same to the
10	principal.
11	(g) The use of any state moneys may be restricted by the
12	legislation appropriating these moneys to the fund.
13	(h) Hawaii 3R's may expend principal from the fund for the
14	purposes of the fund.
15	(i) Any organization submitting a proposal to Hawaii 3R's
16	for moneys shall meet the following standards at the time of
17	application:
18	(1) Be a for profit organization duly registered under the
19	laws of the State, or be a nonprofit organization
20	determined by the Internal Revenue Service to be
21	exempt from the federal income tax, or be an agency of
22	the State or a county;

1	(2)	In the case of a nonprofit organization, have a
2		governing board whose members have no material
3		conflict of interest and serve without compensation;
4	(3)	In the case of an applicant that is not a state or
5		county government agency, have bylaws or policies that
6		describe the manner in which business is conducted and
7		policies that relate to the management of a potential
8		situation involving a conflict of interest;
9	(4)	Have experience with the project or in the program
10		area for which the proposal is being made; and
11	(5)	Be licensed and accredited, as applicable, in
12		accordance with the requirements of federal, state,
13		and county-governments.
14	(j)	All proposals submitted to Hawaii 3R's for moneys
15	shall be	approved by the department for consistency in meeting
16	design an	d materials standards for public schools.
17	-(k)	Organizations or agencies to which moneys are awarded
18	shall agr	ee to comply with the following conditions before
19	receiving	the award:

14	(n) T ł	ne fund shall be audited annually by an independent
15	auditor. Th	ne results of each annual audit shall be submitted to
16	the departme	ent not later than thirty days from the date Hawaii
17	3R's receive	es the audit results. In addition, Hawaii 3R's shall
18	retain for a	a period of three years and permit the department,
19	state legis	lators, and the auditor, or their duly authorized
20	representati	ives, to inspect and have access to any documents,
21	papers, bool	cs, records and other evidence that is pertinent to
22	the fund.	

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         (o) The fund shall not be placed in the state
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    treasury, and the State shall not administer the fund, nor shall
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    the State be liable for the operation or solvency of the fund or
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    Hawaii 3R's.
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         [(p) For every dollar of state moneys granted by the fund
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    to the project, there shall be a minimum of $1 in value matched
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    by Hawaii 3R's from private, federal, county, or community
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    service.
         (g) The superintendent of education shall submit an annual
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    report of the progress of the Hawaii 3R's school repair and
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    maintenance fund no later than twenty days prior to the
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    convening of each regular session of the legislature.] "
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         SECTION 2. Section 302A-401.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
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    repealed.
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         ["[$302A-401.5] Hawaii teacher cadet program fund. (a)
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    There is established the Hawaii teacher cadet program fund as a
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    separate fund of the Hawaii alliance for future teachers, a
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    Hawaii nonprofit organization. Moneys received from the state,
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    county, or federal government, private contributions of cash or
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    other property, and the income and capital gains earned by the
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    fund shall constitute its assets.
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1	(d)	The Hawaii alliance for future teachers shall expend
2	moneys fro	om the fund in the form of either grants to
3	organizat	ions or contracts with private vendors to provide
4	programs	for students who possess a high level of academic
5	achieveme	nt and the personality traits found in good teachers to
6	consider	teaching as a career in accordance with this section.
7	(c)	The fund may receive contributions, grants,
8	endowment;	s, or gifts in cash or otherwise from all sources,
9	including	corporations or other businesses, foundations,
10	governmen	t, individuals, and other interested parties. The
11	legislatu	re intends that public and private sectors review and
12	investiga	te all potential funding sources. The State may
13	appropria	te moneys to the fund.
14	(d)	The Hawaii alliance for future teachers shall appoint
15	the-membe:	rs of the Hawaii teacher cadet program advisory board,
16	which sha	ll be responsible for:
17	(1)	Soliciting and otherwise raising funds for the fund;
18	(2)	Establishing criteria for the expenditure of funds;
19	(3)	Reviewing grant proposals using criteria established
20		by Hawaii alliance for future teachers; and
21	-(4)	Making recommendations for grants and other specific
22		expenditures.

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Members of the advisory board shall be stakeholders in Hawaii's 1 public educational system, including students, parents, alumni, 2 3 principals, community and business leaders, and representatives from the department of education and the department of 4 5 accounting and general services, who shall be represented on the 6 advisory board. 7 (e) In managing the moneys in the fund, the Hawaii 8 alliance for future teachers shall exercise ordinary business 9 care and prudence given the facts and circumstances prevailing 10 at the time of action or decision. In doing so, the Hawaii 11 alliance for future teachers shall consider its long and short-12 term needs in carrying out its purposes, its present and 13 anticipated financial requirements, expected total return on its 14 investments, price trends, and general economic conditions. 15 (f) There may be an endowment component of the fund, and 16 the Hawaii alliance for future teachers may accumulate net 17 income and add the same to the principal. 18 (g) The use of any state moneys may be restricted by the 19 legislation appropriating these moneys to the fund. (h) The Hawaii alliance for future teachers may expend 20 principal from the fund for the purposes of the fund. 21

3	for consi	stency in meeting standards for public schools.
4	-(k)	Organizations or agencies to which moneys are awarded
5	shall agr	ee to comply with the following conditions before
6	receiving	the award:
7	(1)	Use persons qualified to engage in the activity to be
8		funded;
9	(2)	Comply with the applicable federal, state, and county
10		laws; and
11	(3)	Comply with any other requirements prescribed by the
12		Hawaii alliance for future teachers to ensure
13		adherence by the recipient of the award with
14		applicable federal, state, and county laws and with
15		the purposes of this section.
16	(1)	Chapter 103D shall not apply to organizations or
17	agencies	that apply for grants or contracts under this section;
18	provided	that the Hawaii alliance for future teachers shall be
19	held acce	ountable for the use of the funds under a contract with
20	the depar	tment.

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(m) Any contract awarded by the Hawaii alliance for future
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    teachers shall be made with as much competition as is practical
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    to execute its purposes.
         (n) The fund shall be audited annually by an independent
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    auditor. The results of each annual audit shall be submitted to
    the department not later than thirty days from the date the
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    Hawaii alliance for future teachers receives the audit results.
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    In addition, the Hawaii alliance for future teachers shall
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    retain for a period of three years and permit the department,
    state legislators, and the auditor, or their duly authorized
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    representatives, to inspect and have access to any documents,
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    papers, books, records and other evidence that is pertinent to
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    the fund.
         (o) The fund shall not be placed in the state treasury,
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    and the State shall not administer the fund, nor shall the State
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    be liable for the operation or solvency of the fund of the
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    Hawaii alliance for future teachers.
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         (p) For every dollar of state moneys granted by the fund
    to the project, there shall be a minimum of $1 in value matched
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    by the Hawaii alliance for future teachers in cash, or the fair
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    market value of in kind donations, real property, or any other
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    item of value from federal, state, or county governments,
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- 1 private entities, community-based organizations, non-profit
- 2 organizations, or individuals.
- 3 (q) The superintendent of education shall submit an annual
- 4 report of the progress of the Hawaii teacher cadet program fund
- 5 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular
- 6 session of the legislature."]
- 7 SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 8 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

9 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
