A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the period from
2	birth to age five is the most crucial period of learning in a
3	child's life. This is when over eighty-five per cent of a
4	child's brain development takes place in response to the
5	stimulation that the child receives. Early experiences lay the
6	groundwork for a child's lifelong learning and behavior. The
7	legislature further finds that high quality early learning
8	programs that are affordable and accessible for all children are
9	critically important to ensuring the success of Hawaii's keiki.
10	In addition, the significant, long-term benefits realized
11	through investments in high-quality, early learning systems have
12	been established through decades of research. Many studies show
13	the importance of early childhood education. For example, a
14	federal Department of Education study reports that all
15	kindergarteners increase their knowledge and skills regardless
16	of how much they knew prior to enrollment. Kindergarteners are
17	expected to and often do leave kindergarten knowing how to read
18	and write. First graders who did not go to kindergarten are

1 typically behind their peers in their academic and social 2 development and are more likely to fail a grade in elementary 3 school. The purpose of this Act is, among other things, to: 4 5 (1)Establish the executive office on early learning; 6 (2) Establish the early learning advisory board to replace 7 the early learning council; (3) 8 Repeal junior kindergarten programs at the end of the 9 2013-2014 school year; 10 (4)Require students to be at least five years of age on 11 July 31 of the school year in order to attend 12 kindergarten starting with the 2014-2015 school year; 13 and 14 (5) Make an appropriation to the executive office on early 15 learning. 16 SECTION 2. Chapter 302L, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 17 amended by adding three new sections to be appropriately 18 designated and to read as follows: 19 "§302L-A Executive office on early learning; director;

general functions, duties, and powers. (a) There is

10		impacting early learning and conducting advocacy
11		efforts for early learning;
12	(5)	Advising agencies on new legislation, programs, and
13		policy initiatives relating to early learning;
14	(6)	Employing and retaining staff as may be necessary for
15		the purposes of this section, in conformity with
16	\	chapter 76; and
17	(7)	Contracting for services that may be necessary for the
18		purposes of this section, including through master
19		contracts with other state agencies receiving federal
20		and state funds for programs and services for early
21		learning, and purchase of service agreements with
22		appropriate agencies.
