1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the American College		
2	of Obstetricians and Gynecologists recommends that pelvic		
3	examinations undertaken for teaching purposes should be		
4	performed with the specific informed consent of the patient.		
5	The legislature also finds that the American Medical Association		
6	recommends discussing medical student involvement with patient		
7	procedures whenever possible.		
8	The purpose of this Act is to require informed consent in		
9	certain circumstances before performing pelvic examinations for		
10	training purposes on anesthetized or unconscious female		
11	patients.		
12	SECTION 2. Chapter 453, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
13	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated		
14	and to read as follows:		
15	"§453- Pelvic examinations on anesthetized or

Prohibits a physician, osteopathic physician, surgeon, or medical student from performing a pelvic examination for training purposes on an anesthetized or unconscious female patient unless specific informed consent was obtained, the pelvic examination is within the specified scope of care, or the pelvic examination is required for diagnostic purposes on an unconscious patient.
