

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CHARTER SCHOOLS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that article X, section 1
- 2 of the Hawaii State Constitution clearly indicates that the
- 3 State has a constitutional obligation to support charter school
- 4 facilities: "The State shall provide for the establishment,
- 5 support and control of a statewide system of public schools free
- 6 from sectarian control, a state university, public libraries and
- 7 such other educational institutions as may be deemed desirable,
- 8 including physical facilities therefor."
- 9 Department of education schools that convert to charter
- 10 school status have pre-existing facilities and remain on the
- 11 department's regular repair and maintenance and capital
- 12 improvement program schedules. Currently, all of Hawaii 3R's
- 13 projects must be selected from the department of accounting and
- 14 general services repair and maintenance backlog unfunded list,
- 15 which includes public conversion charter schools; start-up
- 16 charter schools, however, receive no such support and have
- 17 historically received legislative appropriations for facilities
- 18 assistance on an ad hoc basis.





1	Although public-private partnerships are not intended to
2	serve as the exclusive means of meeting the State's
3	constitutional obligation to support charter school facilities,
4	the legislature finds that innovative, cost-effective public-
5	private partnerships present a promising way to address the lack
6	of funding for the establishment, repair, and maintenance of
7	charter schools. The legislature further finds that
8	public-private partnerships would provide a mechanism to
9	leverage scarce public resources with private resources and to
10	use state investments to leverage federal funding, which often
11	is contingent upon state funding, for charter school facilities.
12	The purpose of this Act is to support the funding of
13	charter school facilities by establishing a program similar to
14	the Hawaii 3R's. This objective is accomplished by creating the
15	Hawaii charter school facilities fund, which will support only
16	start-up and conversion charter schools, not-for-profit
17	corporations supporting charter schools, and community
18	development financial institutions supporting charter schools.
19	This program differs from Hawaii 3R's in that it would:
20	(1) Be expanded to include acquisition, predevelopment,
21	rehabilitation, construction, and other capital

1		improvement projects, in addition to repair and
2		maintenance; and
3	(2)	Accommodate the greater complexity of capital
4		improvement projects.
5	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 302B, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
6	amended by	y adding a new section to be appropriately designated
7	and to rea	ad as follows:
8	" <u>§</u> 302	2B- Hawaii charter school facilities fund. (a)
9	There is	established the Hawaii charter school facilities fund
10	as a sepa	rate fund of Lei Hoolaha, a Hawaii nonprofit
11	corporation	on, into which shall be deposited:
12	(1)	Appropriations by the legislature to the Hawaii
13		charter school facilities fund;
14	(2)	Contributions, grants, endowments, gifts in cash or
15		otherwise, loans, and bond financing from all sources,
16		including corporations or other businesses,
17		foundations, government, individuals, and other
18		interested parties; and
19	(3)	Income and capital gains earned by the fund.
20	(b)	The fund shall be administered by Lei Hoolaha, and the
21	moneys in	the fund shall be used only for the specific purposes
22		the fund is established, pursuant to this section.

1	(c) Lei Hoolaha shall spend moneys from the fund in the
2	form of grants, loans, or contracts to charter schools,
3	nonprofit corporations that benefit start-up and conversion
4	charter schools, or contracts with private vendors for the
5	repair, maintenance, acquisition, predevelopment,
6	rehabilitation, construction, or other capital improvement
7	projects of charter school facilities, or facilities
8	administered, operated, or developed by nonprofit corporations
9	for the support of charter schools in Hawaii in accordance with
10	this section. Lei Hoolaha may prioritize funding for projects
11	that exhibit best practices in green building or sustainable
12	construction, rehabilitation, repair, and maintenance.
13	(d) There is established the Hawaii charter school
14	facilities fund advisory board within the charter school
15	administrative office, for administrative purposes. The Hawaii
16	charter school facilities fund advisory board shall consist of
17	the executive director of the office, who shall serve as an ex
18	officio non-voting member, and five members who shall be
19	appointed without regard to section 26-34 as follows: Lei
20	Hoolaha shall appoint two members, the Hawaii charter school
21	network shall appoint two members, and the charter school review

1	panel sha	ll appoint one member. The Hawaii charter school
2	facilitie	s fund advisory board shall be responsible for:
3	(1)	Soliciting and otherwise raising funds for the Hawaii
4		charter school facilities fund;
5	(2)	Establishing criteria for the expenditure of funds;
6	(3)	Reviewing grant and loan proposals using criteria
7		established by the board;
8	(4)	Making recommendations for grants, loans, and other
9		specific expenditures; and
10	(5)	Engaging in other activities necessary to support the
11		prudent and efficient operation of the Hawaii charter
12		school facilities fund.
13	(e)	In managing the Hawaii charter school facilities fund,
14	<u>Lei Hoola</u>	ha shall exercise ordinary business care and prudence,
15	given the	facts and circumstances prevailing at the time of each
16	action or	decision. Lei Hoolaha shall also consider the fund's
17	long- and	short-term needs in carrying out its purposes, its
18	present a	nd anticipated financial requirements, the expected
19	total ret	urn on its investments, price trends, and general
20	economic	conditions.

1	<u>(f)</u>	There may be an endowment component of the Hawaii
2	charter s	chool facilities fund which allows Lei Hoolaha to
3	accumulat	e net income, which shall be added to the principal.
4	(g)	The legislature may restrict the uses of the moneys
5	that the	legislature appropriates to the Hawaii charter school
6	facilitie	s fund.
7	(h)	At the time of application, any organization
8	submittin	g a proposal to Lei Hoolaha for moneys shall:
9	(1)	Be a for-profit organization duly registered under the
10		laws of the State, a nonprofit organization determined
11		by the Internal Revenue Service to be exempt from
12		federal income tax, or an agency of the State or a
13		county;
14	(2)	Have experience with the project or in the program
15		area for which the proposal is being made; and
16	(3)	Be licensed and accredited, as applicable, in
17		accordance with the requirements of federal, state,
18		and county governments.
19	<u>(i)</u>	Organizations or agencies to which moneys are awarded
20	shall agr	ee to comply with the following conditions prior to
21	receiving	the award:

1	(1)	use only persons qualified to engage in the activity
2		to be funded;
3	(2)	Comply with all applicable federal, state, and county
4		laws; and
5	(3)	Comply with any other requirements prescribed by Lei
6		Hoolaha to ensure adherence by the recipient of the
7		award with applicable federal, state, and county laws,
8		ordinances, rules, and regulations, and with the
9		purposes of this section.
10	(j)	Chapter 103D shall not apply to organizations or
11	agencies	that apply for grants or contracts under this section;
12	provided	that Lei Hoolaha shall be held accountable for the use
13	of the fu	nds.
14	(k)	The Hawaii charter school facilities fund shall be
15	audited a	nnually by an independent auditor. The results of each
16	annual au	dit shall be submitted to the department of budget and
17	finance n	o later than thirty days from the date Lei Hoolaha
18	receives	the audit results. Lei Hoolaha shall retain the
19	auditor's	report for a period of three years and permit the
20	departmen	t of budget and finance, state legislators, and the
21	auditor,	or their duly authorized representatives, to inspect
22	and have	access to any documents, papers, books, records, and
		an area 1

1	other evid	dence that is pertinent to the Hawaii charter school
2	facilitie	s fund.
3	(1)	The fund shall not be placed in the state treasury,
4	and the S	tate shall not administer the fund, nor shall the State
5	be liable	for the operation or solvency of the fund or Lei
6	Hoolaha.	
7	<u>(m)</u>	For every \$1 of state moneys granted by the Hawaii
8	charter s	chool facilities fund to the project, there shall be a
9	minimum o	f \$1 in value matched by private, federal, or county
10	sources;	provided that this matching value may include:
11	(1)	The fair market value of contributions of in-kind
12		goods and services;
13	(2)	Federal funding intended for charter schools that
14		passes through the department of education as the
15		federally designated state education agency or local
16		education agency;
17	(3)	Federal funding that passes through any agency, board,
18		panel, or other subdivision of the State for the
19		benefit of charter schools; and
20	(4)	Any funding from the office of Hawaiian affairs that
21		did not originate as general revenues appropriated to
22		it by the legislature.

Report Title:

Charter School Facilities Fund; Appropriation

Description:

Establishes the Hawaii charter school facilities fund for funding the repair, maintenance, and other facilities needs of charter schools. Establishes the Hawaii charter school facilities fund advisory board within the charter school administrative office, to establish criteria for the expenditure of funds, among other things. Exempts the fund from the special fund assessments on gross receipts and for administrative expenses incurred by the department responsible for the operations supported by the fund. Appropriates funds for the fund.
