A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FAILURE TO REPORT A MISSING CHILD.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The Legislature recently witnessed the tragic events that occurred in the case of Caylee Anthony, whose mother, Casey Anthony, was found not guilty of Caylee's murder. In that case, a child, Caylee Anthony, was missing for thirtyone days before her disappearance was reported to law enforcement authorities by her grandmother. During the ensuing missing person investigation, the mother, Casey Antony, lied to law enforcement concerning Caylee Anthony's whereabouts; these false statements are the only offenses of which Casey Anthony was convicted in the case.

The Legislature recognizes that current State law does not address the situation where a parent, legal guardian, or other person legally charged with the care or custody of a child fails to report the death or disappearance of the child, or where a caregiver actively conceals a child's death or disappearance. However, the Legislature recognizes that our State law should penalize any caregiver who fails to report a child's death or



disappearance or who conceals that child's death or disappearance.

SECTION 2. Chapter 709, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to read as follows:

"§709- Failure to report a missing child. (1) A caregiver in custody of a child commits the offense of failure to report a missing child if:

- (a) The child is under the age of sixteen;
- (b) The caregiver knowingly or negligently fails to verify the safety and whereabouts of the child for a period in excess of forty-eight hours; and
- (c) The caregiver knowingly or negligently fails to report the child as missing to a law enforcement agency upon the expiration of the forty-eight hour period.
- 1 (2) Nothing in this section shall preclude prosecution and 2 conviction of the caregiver:
- (a) Any applicable degree of homicide under title 37,
 chapter 707, Part II;
- 5 (b) Reckless endangering under title 37, chapter 707,
 6 §\$713 and 714;
- 7 (c) Child abuse under title 37, chapter 707, Part VI;
- 8 (d) Concealing the corpse of an infant \$709-901;

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1	(e) Endangering the welfare of a minor §\$709-903.5 and
2	904;
3	(f) Abuse of family and household members \$709-906;
4	(g) Any other applicable offense.
5	(3) "Caregiver" means a parent, legal guardian, or other

10	investigation that involves a child who is in the caregiver's
11	care.
12	(2) "Caregiver" means a parent, legal guardian, or other
13	person legally charged with the care or custody of a child.
14	(3) "Child" means a person under the age of eighteen years.
15	(4) A person who violates this section commits a Class C
16	felony."
