A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO STANDARDS OF CONDUCT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Section 84-11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended to read as follows:
3	"§ 84-11 Gifts . <u>(a)</u> No legislator or employee, except as
4	provided in subsection (b) with regard to a legislator, shall
5	solicit, accept, or receive, directly or indirectly, any gift,
6	whether in the form of money, service, loan, travel,
7	entertainment, hospitality, thing, or promise, or in any other
8	form, under circumstances in which [it can reasonably be
9	inferred that] the gift is intended to influence the legislator
10	or employee in the performance of the legislator's or employee's
11	official duties or is intended as a reward for any official
12	action on the legislator's or employee's part.
13	(b) A legislator may accept a gift of food or drink,
14	including a meal, served as part of a private industry event or
15	reception that:

(1) Is intended to educate or provide information to the legislator about an industry or a specific business or organization within an industry, including successes,

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1	achievements, or issues concerning the industry,		
2	business, or organization; or		
3	(2) Allows a legislator to meet individuals who work with		
4	or are involved in an industry or in a specific		
5	business or organization or organization within an		
6	industry; or on an issue concerning that industry,		
7	business, or organization;		
8	provided that the gift of food or drink, including a meal, under		
9	this subsection shall be reported as a gift under section 84-		
10	11.5, if the host of the event or reception indicates in		
11	writing, such as on the invitation or announcement, that the		
12	value of the gift of food or drink, including a meal, exceeds		
13	<u>\$50.</u> "		
14	SECTION 2. Section 84-11.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
15	amended by amending subsection (d) to read as follows:		
16	"(d) Excluded from the reporting requirements of this		
17	section are the following:		
18	(1) Gifts received by will or intestate succession;		
19	(2) Gifts received by way of distribution of any inter		
20	vivos or testamentary trust established by a spouse or		
21	ancestor;		

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1	(3)	Gifts from a spouse, fiance, fiancee, any relative
2		within four degrees of consanguinity or the spouse,
3		fiance, or fiancee of such a relative. A gift from
4		any such person is a reportable gift if the person is
5		acting as an agent or intermediary for any person not
6		covered by this paragraph;
7	(4)	Political campaign contributions that comply with
8		state law;
9	(5)	Anything available to or distributed to the public
10		generally without regard to the official status of the
11		recipient;
12	(6)	Gifts that, within thirty days after receipt, are
13		returned to the giver or delivered to a public body or
14		to a bona fide educational or charitable organization
15		without the donation being claimed as a charitable
16		contribution for tax purposes; [and]
17	(7)	Exchanges of approximately equal value on holidays,
18		birthday, or special occasions[-]; and
19	(8)	Gifts of certain food or drink, including meals,
20		valued at \$50 or less, pursuant to section 84-11."
21	SECT	ION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed

and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

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1 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Ethics; Gifts of Food and Drink

Description:

Removes the requirement that a gift be reasonably inferred to be intended to influence a legislator or employee in order to be prohibited under the ethics code. Allows a legislator to accept a gift of food or drink, including a meal, served as a part of a private industry reception or event under certain circumstances.
