# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I
2	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that immediate action is
3	needed to secure Hawaii's water supply. Hotter, drier
4	conditions and damaged watershed forests are escalating the
5	costs and conflicts over water.
6	While climate change is a problem on a global scale,
7	simple, local actions can safeguard Hawaii's declining water
8	sources. Through Act 152, Session Laws of Hawaii 2000, the
9	legislature recognized that fresh water is not an infinite
10	resource and its high quality, quantity, and sustainability
11	depend upon forested watersheds. Without vegetation, most of
12	our islands' rainfall would quickly run off into the ocean and
13	be unusable. Instead, forests break the impact of heavy rains,
14	thereby reducing flooding and erosion and siltation of reefs and
15	fisheries.
16	Protecting forest watersheds is the most cost effective and
17	efficient way to absorb rainwater and replenish ground water.
18	Watersheds also reduce impacts from climate change by absorbing

- 1 greenhouse gases, a component of the Hawaii Clean Energy
- 2 Initiative to help the State reach its policy targets to reduce
- 3 greenhouse gas emissions to 1990 levels by year 2020, enacted by
- 4 the legislature by way of Act 234, Session Laws of Hawaii 2007.
- 5 Additionally, forests sustain irreplaceable cultural and natural
- 6 values.
- 7 Half of Hawaii's forests have already been lost. Alien
- 8 species, such as feral pigs and goats trample and devour
- 9 vegetation, leaving bare ground or openings for alien plants
- 10 that consume more water and increase runoff. The gradual
- 11 invasion of alien plants into native forests may have already
- 12 reduced the estimated groundwater recharge by up to ten per cent
- 13 in certain aguifers. For example, in East Hawaii, invasive
- 14 plants have already reduced estimated groundwater recharge by
- 15 eighty-five million gallons a day. Controlling these and other
- 16 threats requires a large-scale effort to protect these
- 17 irreplaceable natural assets.
- 18 Governor Neil Abercrombie's "A New Day in Hawaii" plan
- 19 calls for the stewardship of the natural resources that our
- 20 survival, economy, and quality of life depend on. Priority
- 21 actions of the plan include managing invasive species,
- 22 increasing Hawaii's ability to withstand impacts from climate



- 1 change, and restoring capabilities of the department of land and
- 2 natural resources by finding additional sources of funding. The
- 3 Abercrombie administration's New Day status report also tasks
- 4 the department of land and natural resources with ensuring that
- 5 mauka watersheds are fully functioning so fresh water resources
- 6 can be utilized and enjoyed by the people of Hawaii in
- 7 perpetuity. To implement these central goals of the Abercrombie
- 8 administration, the department of land and natural resources
- 9 released "The Rain Follows the Forest A Plan to Replenish
- 10 Hawaii's Source of Water".
- 11 "The Rain Follows the Forest" identifies priority
- 12 watersheds and outlines on-the-ground actions and projects
- 13 required to protect and sustain Hawaii's critical water sources.
- 14 The forests and their ability to capture water depend on the
- 15 protection provided by the actions listed in this plan. To be
- 16 successful, these actions must occur on a large scale across
- 17 ownership boundaries, through agreements and leveraged funds
- 18 provided by the statewide watershed partnerships. Currently,
- 19 only ten per cent (approximately ninety thousand acres) of the
- 20 priority watershed areas are protected. This level of
- 21 management has taken forty years to achieve. The department of
- 22 land and natural resources' goal is to double the amount of

- 1 protected watershed areas in just ten years. This will require
- 2 approximately \$5,000,000 per year, and create over one hundred
- 3 fifty local jobs.
- 4 The legislature further finds and declares that the State
- 5 needs to direct revenues towards new priorities and move
- 6 immediately to fund the protection of these watersheds and
- 7 implement this comprehensive plan to ensure the availability and
- 8 affordability of fresh water. Watershed protection and
- 9 restoration must be funded commensurate with its essential role.
- 10 Hawaii's leaders must come together and incorporate funding
- 11 policies within the State's overall financial plan to reverse
- 12 the grave decline of the islands' life-giving forests in order
- 13 to sustain and enrich current and future generations.
- 14 The purpose of this part is to provide funds to the
- 15 department of land and natural resources for the immediate
- 16 protection of priority watershed forests to replenish Hawaii's
- 17 water supplies and provide many other fundamental benefits to
- 18 Hawaii's environmental health.
- 19 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
- 20 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 21 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 to be
- 22 expended on projects undertaken in accordance with watershed



- 1 management plans, including but not limited to invasive species
- 2 removal, construction and ongoing maintenance of fences, control
- 3 of other forest threats, and restoration; provided that any new
- 4 fences constructed shall be on state land only and funds used
- 5 for maintenance of fences shall be for fences on state lands
- 6 only. Private land owners shall reimburse the department of
- 7 land and natural resources for any funds appropriated to the
- 8 watershed management plans that are used for private lands.
- 9 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 10 land and natural resources for the purposes of this part.
- 11 PART II
- 12 SECTION 3. The purpose of this part is to statutorily
- 13 establish the division of aquatic resources under the department
- 14 of land and natural resources.
- 15 SECTION 4. Section 26-38, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 16 amended to read as follows:
- 17 "\$26-38 Powers and duties of heads of departments. Except
- 18 as otherwise provided by this chapter, every power and duty
- 19 conferred by law and required to be performed by any officer,
- 20 board, department, bureau, commission, administrative agency, or
- 21 instrumentality of the State existing immediately prior to
- 22 November 25, 1959, shall hereafter be exercised and performed by

- 1 the head of the respective department established by this
- 2 chapter, whether the head of the department be a single
- 3 executive, board, or commission.
- 4 Except as otherwise provided by this chapter, the head of a
- 5 department may assign any function vested in [his] the
- $\mathbf{6}$  department to any subordinate officer or employee as  $[\frac{he}{}]$  the
- 7 head of the department deems desirable.
- 8 With the approval of the governor, the head of a department
- 9 may establish or abolish within [his] the department any
- 10 division or other administrative unit to achieve economy and
- 11 efficiency and in accord with sound administrative principles
- 12 and practices and procedures [-]; provided that the chairperson
- 13 of the board of land and natural resources shall not use this
- 14 authority to abolish or consolidate the division of aquatic
- resources established under section 187A-4.
- 16 The head of each department may prescribe regulations for
- 17 the administration of [his] the department, for the conduct of
- 18 its employees, for the performance of its business, and for the
- 19 custody, use, and preservation of records, equipment, and other
- 20 property pertaining thereto; provided that the regulations shall
- 21 not be inconsistent with the requirements of chapters 76, 91,

1	and 92, o	r rules promulgated by the governor, or other laws of				
2	the State."					
3	SECT	ION 5. Section 187A-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is				
4	amended to read as follows:					
5	"§18	7A-4 [Administrator. The board shall appoint an				
6	administr	rator] Division of aquatic resources; administrator.				
7	(a) Ther	re shall be a division of aquatic resources [who] under				
8	the department. The division shall have charge, direction, and					
9	control of all matters relating to aquatic resources management,					
10	conservation, and development [activities] under this title, and					
11	such other matters relating to aquatic resources as the board					
12	may direct[-]; except that:					
13	(1)	The enforcement of laws and rules regulating aquatic				
14		resources shall be the responsibility of the				
15		conservation and resources enforcement program				
16		established pursuant to chapter 199, unless otherwise				
17		directed by the board; and				
18	(2)	For the purpose of achieving efficiency, the board may				
19		provide administrative services for the division of				
20		aquatic resources through another division or unit of				
21		the department.				

1	(b) The division of aquatic resources shall not be placed					
2	organizationally under any other division or unit of the					
3	department, except the board and office of the chairperson.					
4	The division of aquatic resources shall not have primary					
5	responsibility for a matter unrelated directly and substantially					
6	to aquatic resources management, development, or conservation.					
7	(c) The division of aquatic resources shall be headed by					
8	an administrator, who shall be trained and educated in natural					
9	resource management."					
10	PART III					
11	SECTION 6. The legislature finds that the collapse of					
12	national credit, housing, financial, and other market sectors					
13	has culminated in the current national economic crisis, which					
14	continues to have consequences on the local economy, including					
15	significant losses in local construction, restaurant, and other					
16	industries. The legislature further finds that solutions for					
17	immediate relief will require unprecedented levels of					
18	cooperation between state and local governments and between					
19	public and private entities to realize bold yet productive					
20	proposals.					
21	The purpose of this part is to appropriate funds for the					
22	establishment of an emergency environmental workforce for short-					



- 1 term employment for individuals who are unemployed or
- 2 underemployed due to the slow economic recovery. Individuals
- 3 willing to accept the challenge of an emergency environmental
- 4 workforce job will assist in the State's efforts to:
- 5 (1) Maintain and strengthen watersheds throughout the
- 6 State;
- 7 (2) Eradicate the miconia plant, feral coffee trees, and
- 8 other invasive plants; and
- 9 (3) Reduce coqui frog, coffee borer beetle, and fire ant
- 10 populations.
- 11 The legislature intends for the revenues generated by
- 12 general obligation bond authorizations and appropriations from
- 13 the general fund made by this part to be released only after at
- 14 least sixty-five per cent of the total appropriations from
- 15 various funds made by this part have been released. The
- 16 legislature further intends for the director of finance to have
- 17 the discretion to determine when at least sixty-five per cent of
- 18 the special and other fund appropriations have been made in a
- 19 manner that fulfills the purpose of this part.
- 20 SECTION 7. There is established the emergency
- 21 environmental workforce to be attached to the research

1	corporation	on of the University of Hawall for administrative
2	purposes.	The emergency environmental workforce shall:
3	(1)	Employ as six-month contract employees approximately
4		five hundred to seven hundred fifty individuals who
5		were terminated from their jobs as a result of the
6		local economic downturn;
7	(2)	Supplement the State's current services being provided
8		for the maintenance and strengthening of watersheds
9		throughout the State, eradication of the miconia plant
10		and other invasive plants, and the reduction of coqui
11		frog, coffee borer beetle, and fire ant populations;
12		and
13	(3)	Coordinate its efforts with the efforts of the
14		department of agriculture, the department of land and
15		natural resources, and the invasive species committees
16		of Hawaii.
17	SECT	ION 8. The research corporation of the University of
18	Hawaii sha	all:
19	(1)	Together with the pacific cooperative studies unit of
20		the University of Hawaii at Manoa, develop a planning,
21		administration, implementation, and evaluation
22		strategy, including a program duration plan and a

1		budget for contract and administrative expenses for
2		the sums appropriated;
3	(2)	Develop a recruitment and public information plan, in
4		consultation with private employers with workforces
5		that have been or that may be affected by layoffs
6		resulting from the economic downturn;
7	(3)	Develop a strategy for the interviewing and selection
8		of emergency environmental workforce participants,
9		including physical examinations as necessary to
10		qualify applicants before final contract offers;
11	(4)	Request that attorneys employed or retained by the
12		University of Hawaii prepare, on an expedited basis,
13		the necessary employment contracts to meet the
14		objectives of the emergency environmental workforce;
15	(5)	Submit review and assessment reports to the governor,
16		the senate president, and the speaker of the house of
17		representatives every sixty days for the duration of
18		the emergency environmental workforce; and
19	(6)	Undertake all other necessary activities for emergency
20		environmental workforce development and
21		implementation.

1 SECTION 9. There is appropriated out of the special land 2 and development fund the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 to establish an 3 4 emergency environmental workforce to be administered by the 5 research corporation of the University of Hawaii. 6 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the research 7 corporation of the University of Hawaii for the purposes of this 8 part; provided that no moneys shall be expended without the 9 prior approval of the pacific cooperative studies unit of the **10** University of Hawaii at Manoa. 11 SECTION 10. There is appropriated out of the forest and wildlife resources fund within the special land and development **12** 13 fund the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary 14 for fiscal year 2012-2013 to establish an emergency 15 environmental workforce to be administered by the research 16 corporation of the University of Hawaii. 17 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the research 18 corporation of the University of Hawaii for the purposes of this 19 part; provided that no moneys shall be expended without the 20 prior approval of the pacific cooperative studies unit of the 21 University of Hawaii at Manoa.

1	SECTION 11. There is appropriated out of the land
2	conservation fund the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may
3	be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 to establish an emergency
4	environmental workforce to be administered by the research
5	corporation of the University of Hawaii.
6	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the research
7	corporation of the University of Hawaii for the purposes of this
8	part; provided that no moneys shall be expended without the
9	prior approval of the pacific cooperative studies unit of the
10	University of Hawaii at Manoa.
11	SECTION 12. There is appropriated out of the water
12	resource management fund the sum of \$ or so much thereof
13	as may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 to establish an
14	emergency environmental workforce to be administered by the
15	research corporation of the University of Hawaii.
16	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the research
17	corporation of the University of Hawaii for the purposes of this
18	part; provided that no moneys shall be expended without the
19	prior approval of the pacific cooperative studies unit of the
20	University of Hawaii at Manoa.
21	SECTION 13. There is appropriated out of the natural area

reserve fund the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be

- 4 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the research

- 9 SECTION 14. There is appropriated out of the forest

- 11 be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 to establish an emergency
- 12 environmental workforce to be administered by the research
- 13 corporation of the University of Hawaii.
- 14 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the research
- 15 corporation of the University of Hawaii for the purposes of this
- 16 part; provided that no moneys shall be expended without the
- 17 prior approval of the pacific cooperative studies unit of the
- 18 University of Hawaii at Manoa.
- 19 SECTION 15. There is appropriated out of the pest
- 20 inspection, quarantine, and eradication fund the sum of
- 21 \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 22 2012-2013 to establish an emergency environmental workforce to



- 1 be administered by the research corporation of the University of
- 2 Hawaii.
- 3 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the research
- 4 corporation of the University of Hawaii for the purposes of this
- 5 part; provided that no moneys shall be expended without the
- 6 prior approval of the pacific cooperative studies unit of the
- 7 University of Hawaii at Manoa.
- 8 SECTION 16. There is appropriated out of the general
- 9 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 10 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 to carry
- 11 out the purposes of this part.
- 12 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the research
- 13 corporation of the University of Hawaii; provided that no moneys
- 14 shall be expended without the prior approval of the pacific
- 15 cooperative studies unit of the University of Hawaii at Manoa.
- 16 SECTION 17. The director of finance is authorized to issue
- 17 general obligation bonds in the sum of \$ or so much
- 18 thereof as may be necessary and the same sum or so much thereof
- 19 as may be necessary is appropriated for fiscal year 2012-2013
- 20 for the emergency environmental workforce to:
- 21 (1) Fence lands and easements in the state conservation
- district to protect watershed lands; and



- 1 (2) Mitigate invasive species.
- 2 The appropriation made for the capital improvement projects
- 3 authorized by this section shall not lapse at the end of the
- 4 fiscal biennium for which the appropriation is made; provided
- 5 that all moneys from the appropriation unencumbered as of June
- 6 30, 2014, shall lapse as of that date.
- 7 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the research
- 8 corporation of the University of Hawaii; provided that no moneys
- 9 shall be expended without the prior approval of the pacific
- 10 cooperative studies unit of the University of Hawaii at Manoa.
- 11 SECTION 18. The moneys appropriated from the general fund
- 12 by section 16 of this Act and the revenues derived from the
- 13 general obligation bonds authorized by section 17 of this Act
- 14 shall be released and expended only when at least sixty-five per
- 15 cent of the moneys appropriated from funds by sections 9, 10,
- 16 11, 12, 13, 14, and 15 of this Act have been authorized for
- 17 expenditure by the director of finance. For the purpose of
- 18 determining the monetary amount that is at least sixty-five per
- 19 cent of the moneys appropriated and allotted under sections 9,
- 20 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, and 15, the director of finance may
- 21 aggregate the amounts authorized for expenditure from those
- 22 funds.
