A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTI	ON 1. The legislature finds that the most recent	
2	informatio	on on the use of drugs, alcohol, and tobacco reveals a	
3	disturbing	g rise in the use of these substances among the native	
4	Hawaiian population. Many studies conducted both nationally and		
5	statewide show native Hawaiians to be at particularly high risk		
6	for substance abuse. Among students in the eighth and tenth		
7	grades, na	ative Hawaiian children rank highest among all ethnic	
8	groups in the use of these substances. The studies also show		
9	that substance abuse starts at an early age, and if not		
10	addressed will:		
11	(1)	Lead to more serious offenses, which break down family	
12		structures spiritually, psychologically, socially, and	
13		economically;	
14	(2)	Create many health hazards and problems for and with	
15		the individual; and	
16	(3)	Lead to other serious problems, such as poverty,	
17		homelessness, and a growing dependence on both legal	
18		and illegal drugs which in turn may lead to child	
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abuse, family abuse, sexual abuse, and other serious 1 2 life threatening crimes. The legislature finds that a pu'uhonua, or wellness center, 3 based on Hawaiian cultural practice will help the native 4 Hawaiian community and the community at-large. Unquestionably, 5 many high risk individuals need to be cared for in a much more 6 sensitive intervention program that will address solutions that 7 will alleviate their problems. The greatest potential to stem 8 9 the tide of this most horrific situation lies in the creation of a pu'uhonua comprising a culturally-based substance abuse **10** 11 treatment and intervention program that takes a holistic approach, based upon cultural identity and strength to get to **12** the core, the why, of substance abuse. The cultural practices 13 14 of pule, ho'oponopono, aloha 'aina, mahi'ai, la'au lapa'au, and 15 aloha will help create a sensitive setting. These cultural practices have been successful in the past, possessing the 16 17 optimal potential to heal an individual. A culturally-based 18 pu'uhonua will restore and maintain a better atmosphere and relationship between family, friends, community, and society. 19 The legislature further finds that the site formerly used 20 21 as the Kulani correctional facility in east Hawaii would be an ideal site for such a wellness center. - 1 spirituality for the Hawaiian people and, pragmatically, it has
- 2 the infrastructure and historical precedent for use in
- 3 sustainable living.
- 4 The legislature also finds that incarcerated individuals
- 5 who do not pose a threat to public safety can work in the
- 6 community on community projects that are accommodating to their
- 7 level of skill. For example, the island of Hawaii has hundreds
- 8 of acres of plant invasive species such as Miconia calvescens, a
- 9 species of tree from South America which, according to the
- 10 Smithsonian Institution, is the one plant that could really
- 11 destroy the Hawaiian forest. Other areas of the State are
- 12 infested with the banana polka and the albezia, which also choke
- 13 and kill native plants, and the eradication of invasive species
- 14 such as miconia has largely been the work of volunteers. Given
- 15 the need for invasive species control and other work in local
- 16 communities and the overcrowding of the State's correctional
- 17 facilities, the legislature finds that allowing incarcerated
- 18 individuals who do not pose a public safety threat to work in
- 19 the community would provide valuable services while creating
- 20 opportunities for incarcerated individuals to learn new skills
- 21 and apply them in ways that benefit the State.
- The purpose of this Act is to:



1	(1)	Reduce recidivism, prevent crime, and ensure long-term
2		positive change by developing a plan to create a
3		wellness center that reestablishes highly recognized
4		native Hawaiian cultural practices to restore the
5		overall well-being of individuals, families, and the
6		native Hawaiian community; and
7	(2)	Create a pilot program to allow incarcerated
8		individuals on the Big Island to work in the community
9		on community projects that benefit the local community
10		and the State.
11	SECT	ION 2. The department of public safety, working with
12	'Ohana Ho'	opakele and other restorative justice groups, is
13	directed	to prepare a plan for the creation of a pu'uhonua, or
14	wellness	center, on lands owned or controlled by the State. The
15	public land development corporation shall assist in determining	
16	an appropriate site for the center; provided that the site	
17	formerly used as the Kulani correctional facility on the island	
18	of Hawaii shall be given preference.	
19	The	department of public safety shall submit a report to
20	the legis	lature no later than twenty days prior to the convening
21	of the re	gular session of 2013 on its plan, findings, and

- 1 recommendations, including any budget requests necessary to
- 2 achieve the purposes of this Act.
- 3 SECTION 3. (a) There is created within the department of
- 4 public safety a work release pilot program on the island of
- 5 Hawaii to allow incarcerated individuals on the island of Hawaii
- 6 to work on community projects on the island of Hawaii that
- 7 benefit the local community and the State; provided that those
- 8 individuals who would work outside a correctional facility as
- 9 part of the work release pilot program pose no threat to public
- 10 safety, as determined by the director of public safety.
- 11 (b) The department of land and natural resources shall
- 12 collaborate with the department of public safety to identify any
- 13 potential community projects on the island of Hawaii that could
- 14 benefit from using incarcerated persons in accordance with this
- 15 Act.
- 16 (c) The department of public safety may provide for the
- 17 shelter of incarcerated persons outside of a correctional
- 18 facility while participating in the work release pilot program
- 19 on the island of Hawaii.
- (d) The department of public safety may receive public and
- 21 private grants for the purposes of this section.

- 1 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
- 2 provided that section 3 of this Act shall be repealed on
- 3 June 30, 2015.
- 4 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Report Title:

Public Lands; Kulani Correctional Facility; Public Safety; Work Release Pilot Program

Description:

Requires the Department of Public Safety to plan for a model wellness center that employs native Hawaiian cultural practices on state land and to submit a report to the legislature prior to the 2013 legislative session. Creates a work release pilot program on the Big Island to allow certain incarcerated individuals on the Big Island to work on community projects on the Big Island that benefit the local community and the State. Repeals pilot program on 6/30/15. (SD1)

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
