In consideration of HOUSE BILL 1981 RELATING TO THE PUBLIC LAND DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION

House Bill 1981 proposes to: 1) Add two new members to the Public Land Development Corporation (PLDC) Board of Directors; 2) Requires that the Hawaii public land optimization plan provide for the protection of cultural practices; and 3) Requires PLDC to comply with certain provisions of law relating to the alienation of land and the Office of Hawaiian Affair's pro rata portion of the public land trust. PLDC opposes this measure.

PLDC was created by the State Legislature in 2011 for the purpose of administering a land development program that makes optimal use of public lands for the economic, environmental, and social benefit of the people of Hawaii. PLDC's five-member Board of Directors has considerable and a broad range of expertise in government, private business, economics, finance and historic and cultural practices of native Hawaiians.

PLDC is developing administrative rules for the Public Land Development Program which will reflect the Legislature's vision and mandates. PLDC believes that changes to its mission and mandate through House Bill 1981 will detract from the intent of Act 55, Session Laws of Hawaii 2011, and is not necessary as these requirements are addressed in the law and therefore, respectfully request that the Committee defer the measure.

HB1981 RELATING TO THE PUBLIC LAND DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) strongly <u>SUPPORTS</u> HB1981, which is a bill in OHA's 2012 Legislative Package. HB1981 will assist the Public Land Development Corporation (PLDC) in complying with the State's current policies related to the protection of Native Hawaiian traditional and customary rights, OHA's right to receive its pro rata share of public land trust revenue, and Act 176, Session Laws of Hawaii 2009, which requires legislative approval for the sale of public lands.

Pursuant to the Hawai'i constitution, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), and judicial decisions, the State and its agencies have a fiduciary obligation to reasonably protect Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices. Unfortunately, these practices are often not given sufficient consideration and protection. Chapter 171C, HRS, grants the PLDC extensive powers, and its projects have the potential to inadvertently affect Native Hawaiian practitioners and the resources they rely upon. HB1981 would require that the PLDC develop plans that protect Native Hawaiian rights for each of its projects, and that the PLDC's Hawai'i Public Land Optimization Plan also include a component that protects cultural practices, including Native Hawaiian practices. In addition, HB1981 would also require that OHA be consulted to ensure that PLDC activities and rules do not diminish Native Hawaiian rights.

Hawai'i's constitution established OHA's right to receive a portion of the revenues generated from the public land trust. Act 178, Session Laws of Hawaii 2006, established the State's interim determination of OHA's pro rata portion of the public land trust revenue to be \$15.1 million. Executive Order 06-06 (EO 06-06) requires state agencies to transfer 20 percent of their gross revenues generated from the use of public trust land under their control to OHA. Chapter 171C is silent on the PLDC's responsibility to comply with Act 178 and EO 06-06. HB1981 would clarify that the PLDC is subject to Act 178 and EO 06-06.

Similarly, HB1981 would clarify that the PLDC is subject to section 171-64.7 and section 171-50, HRS, which prohibits state agencies from alienating public lands without first receiving legislative approval. These laws were a critical part of the agreement that settled OHA's 15-year lawsuit, in which we argued that the state cannot sell the crown and government lands of the Kingdom of Hawai'i that were ceded to the United States

and later transferred to the state at statehood until the Native Hawaiian people's unrelinquished claims to those "ceded lands" are resolved.

Finally, HB1981's addition of an OHA representative and an individual with a background in natural and cultural resource management and sustainable planning to the PLDC's Board of Directors would help to ensure greater balance in the PLDC's decision making.

Therefore, OHA urges the committee to PASS HB1981. Mahalo for the opportunity to testify on this important measure.
