Chair Souki, Vice Chair Ichiyama, and Members of the Committee:

The Department of Public Safety (PSD) supports House Bill 2253 that would make it a Class C felony to fail to obey a law enforcement officer's direction to stop a motor vehicle, resulting in serious bodily injury or death to another person.

House Bill 2253 would increase the penalties in Section 710 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes by adding language to address the seriousness of resisting an order to stop a motor vehicle given by a law enforcement officer. Presently, the charge of resisting an order to stop a motor vehicle under Section 710-1027 is only a misdemeanor regardless if it results in serious bodily injury to another person. The Department feels that the passage of House Bill 2253 would send a strong message to the public and possibly save lives.



I am in support of Bill HB2253, Resisting an Order to Stop a motor vehicle for the following reasons.

I believe that public safety is very important. The public roadways / highways are too congested with vehicles and pedestrians as the population continues to grow. Law Enforcement officers take a risk every day in making critical decisions to pursue or not to pursue. The violator whom chooses not to stop when ordered to do so by a law enforcement authority should be held accountable for their actions. In the county of Kauai, there were over 15 documented vehicular pursuits for the year of 2011. Some of which have involved high speeds. Some of which have involved vehicle accidents. However, currently the Hawaii Revised Statutes law states that the offender will be punishable on with a misdemeanor regardless of the result. The current law does not differentiate if the violator causes injury or death by continuing to evade or resist an order to stop when an officer activates his/her emergency lights and sirens and further more when using a marked police vehicle. It is therefore paramount that this bill be recognized and supported that driving on public roadways / highways is not a right, but a privilege. And to violate this privilege, thus to Resist a lawful order to stop a motor vehicle when ordered to do so, to place the public at risk, and as a result of the violator's actions, the violator causes serious bodily injury or death to a law enforcement officer or a third party, the violator should at least be guilty of a Class C Felony.

As more and more states are enacting laws of felony evading police, Hawaii too must step up to the plate and enact a law making it a felony upon willful evading of police thus resulting with serious bodily injury or death. I cast my vote in support of HB2253.
