The Hawaii Medical Association strongly endorses the establishment and financial support of the Hilo Family Medicine residency program.

Inadequate access to health care on the neighbor islands has become a vitally important issue. Too many people die, or suffer poor outcomes, because there are inadequate numbers of practicing physicians. According to the Kaiser Foundation, the life span of a Big Island resident is currently 1.6 years shorter than those in other parts of the state. Because hospitals are so financially stressed that they do not have the ability to establish or partner to provide services and achieve the programs necessary for the recruitment and retention of physicians.

The introduction of HB2368 is important to all neighboring islands in that it establishes support in the recruitment and retention of health care providers. Financial assistance to the organizing Family Medicine residency program in Hilo will augment an island-wide community fundraising effort, and with corporate donations, bring young, energetic physicians to train in the rural setting of the Big Island. Studies show that physicians tend to begin their practice within 50 miles of their training site. This, combined with exposure to a rural medicine setting, will help to build a foundation on which a growing medical community may be built.

On behalf of the East Hawaii Region of Hawaii Health Systems Corporation (HHSC) and its Board of Directors, thank you for the opportunity to present testimony in strong support of HB 2368 that authorizes appropriation of funds for the Medical Residency Program at University of Hawaii, Hilo, for fiscal year 2012-2013.

With the on-going support of the Legislature, the East Hawaii Region of HHSC continues to serve the healthcare needs of Hawaii County's growing population as a State Safety Net facility. The Region encompasses Hilo Medical Center (HMC), its long-term care facility and outpatient specialty clinics, Critical Access Hospitals in Ka'u and Honoka'a, as well as the Yukio Okutsu State Veterans Home. As the largest hospital on the island, HMC serves the needs of its patients, regardless of their financial status or ability to pay. A network of primary care physicians that is adequate to meet the needs of the East Hawaii population is critical to the provision of services at the Region's facilities.

Hawaii County has a shortage of more than 150 physicians needed to provide adequate levels of access. Moreover, the current physician shortage is expected to more than double in the next 5 years as many doctors retire, according to the latest projections by the authors of the 2011 University of Hawaii John A. Burns School of Medicine Workforce Study. Statewide, the projected loss of doctors equates to 41 percent of Hawaii's physicians as they reach retirement age of 65 within the next 10 years. This means Hawaii faces a potential loss of 134 physicians <u>per year</u> as they retire, according to the Workforce Study.

The current and projected shortage of physicians simply means less access to care for Hawaii County residents that already suffer from a disproportionate rate of disease and disability than others in the state. According to the North Hawaii Outcomes Project (2011) these health disparities include:

- Higher Death rates, from
 - -Heart disease
 - -Stroke
 - -Diabetes
 - -Overall cancer







- -Infant mortality
- -Suicide
- -Traffic-related accidents
- Lower life expectancy
- Higher teen birth rates
- · Higher confirmed child abuse rates

State funding of the Hilo Medical Residency Program is critically needed now to ensure the program is sustained through its accreditation process. The Program will require \$400,000 per year in order to sustain ongoing operations. Medical residency programs require significant resources, which are not adequately recouped through the provision of health services extended to patients by medical residents. In today's environment of rising healthcare costs and decreased reimbursement, the resulting financial shortfall is more dramatic, particularly when services are rendered to the underinsured.

The Hilo Medical Residency Program is Hawaii Island's best way to alleviate the critical shortage of physicians, as our research tells us that medical residents who train in rural environments overwhelmingly stay and practice in the region.

The Hilo Medical Residency Program intends to incorporate a Patient Centered Medical Home model in the training of physicians. This new approach will train doctors to practice in a manner in which a patient's care is highly coordinated to achieve the best outcomes and to better manage healthcare costs. East Hawaii's early adoption of an electronic medical record system (in place at only 30 percent of hospitals in the nation) is a cornerstone of this training model. In addition, the hospital's participation in the Beacon Community will result in establishing Hilo's program as a highly desirable technology-based rural training option for doctors.

Our goal is to have the Residency Program fully accredited by 2013, and to have the first cohort of four doctors begin the residency in 2014, followed by successive classes of four doctors in each of the program's three years. To achieve this, ongoing State support is needed to operate this program that will dramatically curtail the island's severe shortage of primary care physicians.

As noted above, doctors trained in a rural environment are much more likely to practice in such an environment. We expect the residents trained in Hilo will practice throughout the Neighbor Islands.

I am acutely aware of the wave of practicing physicians that are reaching retirement age, and troubled by what this situation means for our Island. We must fully fund, and thus, ensure the viability of the Medical Residency Program in Hilo.

Many of the patients Kinisis' works with each day are suffering from debilitating conditions stemming from poor health habits and/or conditions that have worsened because they were not identified and treated sooner. Access to family physicians is one of our best means to identify these unhealthy behaviors, such as obesity and smoking, and to help individuals to change their life patterns. The health of Hawaii County is plagued by the highest rates of smoking, obesity, binge drinking, and motor vehicle accidents in the state. Puna, for example, is the fastest growing area of the state and has the Hawaii's highest use of tobacco, which is nearly 20 percent, according to the American Lung Association. In human terms, and to lower the cost to our healthcare system, we simply must turn these health trends around.

The current state of health in East Hawaii, and the fact that more than 40 percent of the state's doctors are projected to retire in the next 10 years equates to a current crisis. Moreover, in this same time period, the state is facing a wave of residents that are due to retire within the next 10 to 20 years. The fact that the elderly are more intensive users of health resources, coupled with a shortage of providers, creates a "perfect-storm" situation regarding the health of Hawaii's population.

The Institutes of Medicine and emerging Accountable Care Organizations endorse this model as a means to ensure cost-effective health services, identify practices that bridge the chasm of unequal access to quality care, and explore how new systems approaches can implement change.

Secondly, the Residency Program clinic also currently serves as an interdisciplinary training ground for baccalaureate nursing, family nurse practitioner, and doctor of pharmacy students from both UH Hilo and UH Manoa. In fact, the first nurse practitioner student to complete her family nurse practitioner training at the Residency Program clinic has now earned her Master's Degree from UH Manoa. She is now employed as a Family Nurse Practitioner at the UH Hilo Student Health Service Clinic.

The new Doctor of Nursing programs at both UH Manoa and UH Hilo will be placing students in the Residency Program clinic to work with the community to design innovative health care education and research programs to improve rural health outcomes. The addition of the medical residents, physical therapists, and occupational therapists will round out the Residency Program's ability to fully function as a model clinic and training facility offering:

1) Superb access to care







- 2) Patient engagement in their care
- 3) Clinical information systems that support high quality evidence-base care
- 4) Culturally competent care coordination and integrated comprehensive care
- 5) Practice-based learning in collaborative teams

The Big Island Rural Interdisciplinary Residency Program helps the State of Hawaii to grow our own health professionals to work in communities throughout our state, thereby strengthening community capacity and workforce development. As the newly hired Program Director for the Hawaii Island Rural Family Practice Residency Program, it is my pleasure to submit testimony that asks for your support of HB 2368 to fund this critical health resource for the Island and the State. The Residency Program is a practical and cost-effective means to build a stable interdisciplinary health workforce that is sufficient to serve the needs of Hawaii Island's population.

Currently, the Hilo Residency Program is preparing its application for accreditation by the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education. Preparation of the application entails ensuring myriad components of the curriculum, preceptors from the physician community, and all related aspects of training are in place. Once accredited, which we anticipate will occur during 2013, the program will enroll its first cohort of four doctors to begin their residency in 2014. This class will be followed by successive classes of four doctors in each of program's three years.

As a physician with a master's degree in public health, I see the importance of training physicians to practice in a rural setting as twofold:

- Physicians, advanced practice nurses, pharmacists and others who are trained in a rural setting, overwhelmingly practice in rural areas, thereby increasing access to care. In addition to providing care when patients are ill, greater access to primary care through family medicine physicians also equates to a community being better served with preventative services. Preventing the development of disease by working with patients to change lifestyle choices, and diagnosing disease and conditions early when health can more likely be restored, results in a dramatic cost savings to the healthcare system.
- The practice of family medicine in a rural setting requires doctors and other clinical professionals to be skilled in working with networks of providers that are often less robust than in urban settings. Hawaii Island's geography, diverse cultures, and other factors increase the need for family practice physicians who are trained to develop patients' care plans with available resources.

Given Hawaii Island's shortage of physicians, the importance of these two points cannot be overstated. Family physicians and their primary care colleagues need to be trained in the appropriate setting. Furthermore, family practice doctors are the referral source to other physician specialists. Thus, a base of family practice physicians is fundamental to attracting needed cardiologists, gastroenterologists, ophthalmologists, and other critical specialists to the Island.







Currently, Hawaii Island is at a critical juncture in its ability to keep our citizens healthy and our workforce strong. HB 2368 will enable the Residency Program to move forward to achieve needed health services for Hawaii Island and others in the State. Thank you for the opportunity to submit this testimony and to urge the Committees' Members to fully support this Bill.

My name is Vivian Landrum, and I am the President/CEO of the Kona-Kohala Chamber of Commerce (KKCC). KKCC represents over 520 business members and is the leading business advocacy organization on the west side of Hawai'i Island. KKCC also actively works to enhance the environment, unique lifestyle and quality of life in West Hawai'i for both residents and visitors alike.

The Kona-Kohala Chamber of Commerce strongly supports HB 2368 to appropriate funds for a medical residency program at UH-Hilo.

The shortage of physicians on Hawaii Island has been documented and discussed for the past ten years. As noted in the latest reports from the North Hawaii Outcomes Project as well as the Hawaii County Community Health Profile, the health of the people of Hawaii County is consistently worse that the state average. Factors attributing to this include genetics, social and economic conditions, health related behaviors and **access to healthcare**. Increasing the healthcare workforce was cited as one requirement to improve the health of Hawaii Island's people.

A medical residency program at UH - Hilo could help stem the current and projected shortage by increasing the chances for additional physicians on Hawaii Island as many residents choose to remain where they trained. This could have a positive domino effect as new physicians will require staff, thus supporting job growth as well.

The physician shortage also impacts hiring challenges for employers. Members of this Chamber have reported even though they have health care plans for their employees; new employees are struggling to find physicians who will take on new patients. Aloha Chair Nishimoto:

It is no secret that the shortage practicing physicians on Hawai`i Island has reached crisis levels, and it's growing worse.

This came home to myself and my family personally just a few years ago, when our family physician of many years had to give up family practice due to a serious latex allergy.

Even though a long-time resident of Hilo, we found it very difficult to find another physician to take over our family's care. We found that doctor after doctor was not accepting new patients, because they were already overbooked.

When we finally did find a doctor willing to accept us, very shortly thereafter he gave up practicing at the local hospital, due to the rising cost of liability insurance for inpatient care.

So, while we now have a physician for routine check ups, if any of us required hospitalization, it is off to the ER to stand in line and into the hands of strangers. This has happened to us twice in the last five years.

The Hilo Residency Program is much more than a short-term bandaid on this problem. While it does indeed make qualified medical far more accessible than it has been the last few fears, especially for new comers and lower income families, it is a key element in a deliberate community plan to provide early-career physicians an opportunity to experience practicing medicine in this lovely place, with the expectation that a higher percentage of UH Medical School trainees will choose to come here to practice in the long term, after their residencies.

Many of us -- people and organizations -- have provided out-of-pocket funding to help support the Residency Program thus far, but we cannot do it alone.

Continued funding of this program is critical to the long-term health and safety of our families.

Please help us realize this solution to a problem that is edging on getting desperate.

I am currently President of the Rotary Club of South Hilo Foundation, a non-profit entity, which in conjunction with the Rotary Club of South Hilo, has conducted annual fundraising events, a primary purpose of which has been to help fund the fledgling Hilo Medical Center residency program. As you are aware, we have donated substantial funds towards the program through the Hilo Medical Center Foundation, because of our strong belief in the importance of training medical graduates in a residency program in Hilo. With this opportunity, they can train in a rural setting, help provide medical services to an expandingly needy community which has a shortage of medical care, network among local physicians and health care agencies, and experience the rich cultural and natural environment which the Big Island has to offer.

When students apply to college or medical school, they often have aspirations of serving patients in need, or coming back home to serve residents here. I know of individuals who grew up here and have come back to Hilo to practice, but who had to do their residency elsewhere.

This is testimony in support of HB 2368, Relating to the University of Hawaii at Hilo, which 1 seeks to establish a medical residency program in Hilo. 2 3 Rural areas across the United States are experiencing severe physician shortages and this is only 4 5 likely to worsen over the coming years. Hawaii's rural areas are especially affected by this trend 6 as our state's remoteness adds to the isolation already presented by rural areas. One means of 7 getting physicians to practice and stay in rural areas that has been shown to be effective is the establishment of rural residency programs. These programs help to better prepare physicians for 8 9 the realities of practicing in a rural area, thereby increasing the likelihood that graduating physicians will begin and maintain rural practices. A 2009 report by the Robert Graham Center 10 showed that studying medicine in a rural area can increase the likelihood of a physician 11 practicing in a rural area by almost three times over a physician that does not receive rural 12 13 training 14 Hawaii's rural areas are already facing severe physician shortages and this looks to only worsen 15 if action is not taken soon. I believe that establishing a medical residency program in Hilo is one 16 effective step that can be made to help alleviate the problem and urge you to pass HB 2368. 17 18
