Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on H.B. No. 2456.

OIP supports this bill, which would allow government agencies required to give public notice to do so by means of electronic notice on the State or county website, and would make the current requirement of print publication an alternative option to electronic notice.

The Sunshine Law, which OIP administers, has separate notice requirements, and OIP has never interpreted the provision addressed in this bill to apply to Sunshine Law notices. Nevertheless, the electronic notice proposed in this bill is consistent with OIP's proposal in H.B. 2597 and S.B. 2859 to change from paper notice to electronic notice under the Sunshine Law, which will make it easier for members of the public to find all types of notices at the same online location. OIP also believes that a change to electronic notice generally will provide for faster and broader public access to notices, will utilize declining government resources more efficiently and cost effectively, and will place less of a burden on affected agencies.

Thank you for considering our testimony.

Chair Oshiro, Vice Chair Lee, and members of the committees, thank you for the opportunity to testify on H.B. 2456.

The Office of Information Management and Technology supports and recommends passage of H.B. 2456, which authorizes government agencies to publish notices electronically or online on the state or county official government websites in lieu of publication in a newspaper or other written publication.

As electronic posting of information has become an accepted and expected way to conduct business, the state should publish public notices online as well to expand its ability to reach constituents.

This proposed bill aligns with the chief information officer's strategic IT vision to leverage new technologies to increase government transparency and enhance citizen engagement and participation, while providing increased cost efficiencies for state government.

At this time, we would like to make recommend revising SECTION 2.(1)(C) of H.B. 2456 to specifically identify electronic or online publication to the centralized public notices website of the State of Hawaii. This will allow for one location to serve as the primary host, provide standardization and provide uniform opt-in services for all public notices.

Bill No. and Title: House Bill No. 2456, Relating To Publication of Notices.

Purpose: Allows government agencies to publish notices electronically on the official government websites in lieu of publication in a newspaper or other written publication.

Judiciary's Position:

The Judiciary supports the intent of this bill, with comments, and with concerns for Hawaii residents who may not have easy access to the Internet.

Currently Hawaii residents must read a statewide publication and a county publication to find notices concerning them. With this bill's amendments, they would have to read a statewide publication, a county publication, and check "the official website of the State" and "the official website of the affected county" to ensure they had a complete set of notices. Without knowledge of this bill and any resulting act, citizens familiar with the publication of notices in print media, seeing some notices in print media may assume that this is the complete set of notices.

Since the "the official website of the State" is managed by the State's portal manager, Hawaii Information Consortium, and they are managed by the Access Hawaii Committee, the Access Hawaii Committee could be responsible for setting up web pages that aggregate or centralize notices. The Access Hawaii Committee is a cross jurisdictional committee empowered under HRS 27G.

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To ensure that there is one set of aggregated or centralized notices, it is recommended that notices be published in print media and on-line rather than "or on-line." Alternatively, for a limited period the State should have a standing notice advertising the new Public Notice website. The Judiciary recognizes the additional costs, but believes that there is still a segment of our community who would be served better through print media.

If the notices are published online, there is no timeframe specified for how long that notice must remain on the website. If notices remain on the website indefinitely, there should be an applicable archive process. It is recommended that notices remain public for one month and are moved to electronic archive for ten years and then removed to State archives after that date.

TO CHAIRPERSON MARCUS OSHIRO AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE:

The purpose of H.B. No. 2456 is to allow government agencies to publish notices electronically on the official government websites in lieu of publication in a newspaper or other written publication.

The Department of Human Resources Development strongly supports this bill.

Allowing public agencies the option to publish notices on their websites significantly enhances their ability to more widely publicize and disseminate information contained in the notices. This would translate to a higher likelihood that the intended audience of the notice will be reached by the publication. My name is Celia Suzuki, Licensing Administrator for the Professional and Vocational Licensing Division ("Division"), Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs ("Department"). The Department appreciates the opportunity to submit testimony in support of House Bill No. 2456, Relating to the Publication of Notices.

The purpose of House Bill No. 2456, is to allow government agencies the ability to publish notices electronically on official government websites in lieu of publication in a newspaper or other written publication.

The Division currently oversees the regulation of forty-seven (47) boards, commissions and programs. Every licensing authority has its own statutes and rules. The Division periodically updates its rules or authors new ones.

Pursuant to section 91-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, part of the rulemaking adoption process includes giving the public at least thirty days' notice for a public hearing. The Division has been providing such notification by posting public hearing notices in each of the county's newspaper publications. This bill will allow us to provide public hearing notification electronically or online via the Division's official website.

The Division has expended thousands of dollars to post such public hearing notices in the local newspapers. In these austere times it is prudent to allow state agencies the ability to provide notifications electronically or online.

House Bill 2456 – Relating to the Publication of Notices

The Disability and Communication Access Board (DCAB) takes no position on this measure but wishes to provide comments.

DCAB's mission is to provide technical assistance related to accessibility for individuals with disabilities to state and county programs and services per the Americans with Disabilities Act, Title II. The underlying purpose of this bill is also to enable state and county agencies to save money that is used to publish notices in newspapers by providing the option to electronically publish notices online.

The rationale of publishing notices in the newspaper is to encourage the public to participate in government. Allowing state and county agencies to publish notices online assumes that everyone has access to a computer. In many instances, that is not the case, especially for individuals with disabilities. If an individual does not have access to a computer, state and county governments are excluding a segment of the population and denying them the means to participate in government.

Also, if a state or county agency decides to publish online in lieu of in a newspaper, all material published online must be in a format that is accessible to individuals with disabilities, including people who are blind or have low vision.

If these two concerns can be addressed in the language of the bill, we would have no objection to it.

HB 2456 – Relating to The Publication of Notices

The Hawaii State Public Library System (HSPLS) supports HB 2456.

For the past several years, we have seen increasing numbers of people turning to their libraries for the e-government, workforce development, education and health information they need. We anticipate this bill will dramatically increase the number of visits and requests for assistance we receive from citizens across the state, and we look forward to providing the key communications linkages between government organizations and the people of Hawaii

This bill will create opportunities to open channels of communication between our citizens and the legislature, government departments, agencies and institutions at all levels. It will also have a significant workload and financial impact on HSPLS and our daily operations, as we anticipate many more people will be coming to our libraries to access, view and print this information. This will impact our reference staff, as they help patrons search for, locate and make use of the information they

require, and there will be additional costs associated with printing the documents retrieved, including paper, printer supplies and wear and tear on equipment.

To help us take full advantage of our libraries' critical position in the government to citizen's communication link, we have already begun working with the Office of Information Management Technology (OIMT) to plan for a government information portal and to develop a budget for the installation of dedicated computers and printers, ADA compliant furniture, software and hardware, and various connectivity and other enhancements to facilitate the public's accessing government information in our libraries. These dedicated computers would allow streaming video of legislative proceedings, provide access to the documents and information targeted in these bills, provide links to government at all levels, and open the doors to government information for citizens across the state. If this funding were appropriated and released to HSPLS by next FY 2013, we would work with OIMT to implement these dedicated workstations in our libraries statewide, probably before the beginning of the next legislative session.

We look forward to working with the legislature to create new pathways for constituents to remain aware of and engaged in their government.

Chair Oshiro and Committee Members:

My name is Barbara Kim Stanton, State Director of AARP Hawaii. AARP is a membership organization of people 50 and older with nearly 150,000 members in Hawaii. We are committed to championing access to affordable, quality health care for all generations, providing the tools needed to save for retirement, and serving as a reliable information source on issues critical to Americans age 50+.

AARP **opposes** HB2456 which allows government agencies to publish public notices electronically on official government websites in lieu of a publication in a newspaper or other written publication. Currently public notice is required in daily or weekly newspapers.

We acknowledge that there is a possible cost savings if public notice can be provided online or electronically. However, our concern is that people who are not computer literate or without internet access would not be able to access public notice information. This is particularly true of many seniors, disabled, and disadvantaged groups who still rely on newspapers for vital information and would miss public notices if not published in newspapers.

While online use is gaining ground, we know from our own membership that printed material remains their top preference. Until it is clear consumers more readily access public information online we believe that public notification needs to be published in daily or weekly newspapers. Public interest is best served by assuring that public information is easily accessible and we ask that the public notice requirement remain as-is.

Aloha Chair Oshiro, Vice Chair Lee, and members of the committee:

The Honolulu Star-Advertiser respectfully opposes HB2456, which, if enacted, would limit the requirement that state and county legal ads be published in newspapers of general circulation, creating the option that they be published on the official website of the state or affected county.

HB2456 erodes access to vital public information.

1. Accessibility is most important reason for public notices to remain mandatory in print.
 - 74% of Americans read the newspaper – in Hawaii our readership is even higher with 8 in 10 Hawaii adults reading the newspaper each week;
 - 25% of Hawaii adults do not access the internet in an average week;
 - 76% of non-internet users are newspaper readers;
 - By not advertising in newspapers, government is alienating residents who either are seniors, have a high school education or less, and the poor; and
 - 46% of the poorest households do not own a computer and racial minorities have much lower instances of internet access.

Removing state and county legal ads from newspapers would force residents to hunt for proposed government action on often difficult-to-navigate government websites. For residents, especially in rural and remote areas, not everyone has easy access to a computer. It's hard to imagine people going to the trouble of regularly visiting a public library in order to check out the day's legal notices.

2. Publishing to a government website doesn't meet the traditional definition of a legal notice that appears in an independent third-party publication. There is an inherent danger which rests in citizens not knowing about government actions such as:
 - Government hearings and meetings;
 - Opportunities to bid on government contracts;
 - Proposed property developments zoning and land-use changes; and
 - Road construction and road closures.

These are all matters that affect people's livelihoods and well-being.

Further, it is helpful to examine why newspaper publication of notices is such a longstanding and universal requirement. This requirement ensures that once printed, state and county legal ads can be archived and are secure from modification and tampering and are widely and easily accessible. If any of these elements were absent, a legal notice could not be authenticated and would be subject to challenge.

If state and county legal ads were no longer published in newspapers of general circulation, but instead only appeared online – let alone on a *government-run* website – they would have none of these hallmarks of reliability, verifiability, permanency and accessibility. Legal notices – like all serious business – must be transparent, independently verifiable and above suspicion. The government cannot and should not be relied upon to check itself.

Newspapers have extremely broad circulation and penetration. Our readership and print circulation are both rising at a very healthy rate. Contrary to widespread belief, newspapers are not going the way of the dinosaurs – and certainly not in Hawaii.

In closing, it is true that newspapers earn revenue from state and county legal ads. However, this is a very small proportion of our overall revenue. In fact, our current state and county legal rates are less than they were a decade ago and far less than the rates paid by most.

The bottom-line issue here isn't about revenue for us; it's about public access and the public's right to know. That's something we in the news business take very seriously.

This is why we respectfully oppose HB2456, and request that you hold this bill in committee.

The Hawaii Tribune-Herald opposes HB 2456.

While the said purpose of the bill is to save money, the solution stated in this bill is not in the best interest of the local citizenry.

There are many reasons important public notices should not be solely posted on a government website. Public notices published in newspapers of general circulation ensure notification to the general populace because they have these elements:

- Publication is in a forum independent of the government;
- The published notice is archivable and secure;
- The notice is accessible by all segments of society;
- Publication is verifiable (by way of an affidavit of publication).

Posting information on a government website on the Internet has none of these elements of permanency, reliability and accessibility. On the Internet, everything seems to move, change or cease to exist without notice or explanation. When ink is pressed to paper thousands of times, the notice is either right or wrong, but it will never be right one moment and wrong the next.


Obviously, the official website of the state is not independent of the legislative body that enacted the ordinance. Therefore, posting on a government site alone deprives the notice of the independence that protects against tampering, alteration, political bias and post-deadline posting.

The purpose of public notices is to display information in places where the public is likely to see them. Newspapers, purchased by the consumer, contain news, information on events, advertisements, and other content that is attractive to locally engaged members of the community.

Putting public notices on a government website, while the notices will be available, will effectively remove it from the view of the general public.

For these reasons and more, we urge you to vote in opposition to HB2456

Please accept this letter as an expression of opposition to HB2456.

It is my firm belief that public notices are not simply solicitations for bid by governmental entities nor are postings of new or changed legislation simply for the benefit of insiders. The founders of our republic believed in the widest possible dissemination of the workings of government.

A governmental website does not do that.

Newspapers of general circulation have long been the medium for that wide dissemination. Certainly the residents of our state and county do not search governmental websites for news. *The Maui News* has the largest audience on Maui and our readers rely on us as a source of information. Public notices are an important part of that information.

In closing, please reject HB2456 for the following reasons:

- Publication on a governmental website will obscure the information from a vast majority of the citizenry;
- Newspapers are not an arm of government and publication of governmental workings in an independent forum is essential in a free society;
- Printed pages provide a permanent record of the notice;
- Public notice laws and newspapers have always shared common goals – to keep an informed electorate and make sure governmental actions are transparent.

For those reasons, please reject HB2456.

Chair Oshiro, Vice-Chair Lee and members of the Committee, my name is Peter Fritz. I am an individual with a disability, past member and Chair of the State Rehabilitation Committee, member and past Chair of the Disability and Communications Access Board and an attorney. I am testifying in my individual capacity in **Opposition to S.B. 2219 as drafted** because it is not possible to develop the rules and standards that are necessary to ensure that visually and motor disabled individuals can access the electronic notices by July 1, 2012.

This measure would authorize government agencies to publish notices electronically or online on the State or county official government websites in lieu of publication in a newspaper or other written publication.

An effective date of July 1, 2012 is not enough time to develop the rules required to provide access for the disabled. Without such rules this measure would have an adverse impact on the disabled.

- Many State Agencies are not publishing documents in an accessible format. It may not be possible for all agencies acquire software or train employees to publish notices and documents in an accessible format. Example of documents that have not been published in an accessible format include:
 - Proposed Amendments to Chapter 12-46 Subchapter 9, Hawaii Administrative Rules. The Hawaii Civil Rights Commission recently held a hearing on Proposed Amendments to Chapter 12-46 Subchapter 9, Hawaii Administrative Rules, employment discrimination rules. Prior to the hearing, a copy of the proposed amendments was posted on their website THAT WAS NOT ACCESSIBLE using JAWS or ZoomText which meant that individuals with visual impairments were excluded from participation at the hearing held by the HCRC on the proposed rules. The HCRC was informed of this problem; however, they chose not to hold the hearing and submit the proposed amendments to the Governor for his signature. If the Agency responsible for enforcing disability rules cannot get it right, what hope is there for other agencies?

- Statewide Plan for Independent Living. The PDF copy of the Statewide Plan for Disabilities was not accessible using ZoomText and was difficult to read using JAWS. The document was published by the Department of Vocational Rehabilitation.

Questions That Need to Be Answered Regarding Electronic or Online Notices:


- When will the state website for posting of notices come into existence?
- How will the State make users aware of the existence of such a website?
- Where will notices are to be placed on the Agency's website? Will notices be posted on the first page of the state website or will there be a clickable link on a webpage that will take the user to the Agency's website. Without standardization regarding the location of the notices on an Agency's website, visually impaired individuals will need to search an entire website (one word at a time using screen reading software) to locate the information. Agencies do not make it easy to find information. For example:
 - Notices for meetings of the Tax Review Commission ("Tax Review Commission") are not posted on the page for the Tax Review Commission but are posted on another page on the Department of Taxation's website. Someone looking for the notice of a meeting of the TRC that "Goggles" the Hawaii Tax Review Commission, clicks on the address for the TRC and goes directly to the page would not be informed of a meeting. There is no separate telephone number to call the TRC to request information.
 - The Statewide Independent Living Council publishes notices of meetings under "Forums." It is not posted under "News and Events." Many people have been unable to find the notices of meetings because they do not expect such notices to be filed under Forums.
- Will notices be posted on the first page of the state website or will there be a clickable link on a webpage that will take the user to the Agency's website.
- What file formats will be used for posting of the notices – PDF, Microsoft Word or other format? The preferred format for visually impaired individuals is HTML followed by Microsoft Word.
- This bill needs independent verification of the date of posting of a notice. I have personally questioned the date of a notice and was told by the Executive Director that it had been sent to the Lieutenant Governor's Office. A check with the Lieutenant Governor's Office revealed that the notice had not been filed with that office even though the Executive Director stated that the notice had been filed. Independent verification is essential.

- When will the State Library system have software that can be operated by individuals with motor impairments and when will the staff be trained to use this software and software for visually impaired individuals?
- Legal issues need to be addressed.
 - How will online notices affect proof of publishing a notice?
 - If an Agency states that a notice was published on one date, but the metadata shows that it was created two days after that date, how is a court to determine if the document was published properly?
 - Metadata is information located in the file that indicates the date that the document was created and whether it had been modified.
 - Will state agencies be required to include metadata in their documents? Documents from the Governor's Office are stripped of metadata. Documents from other agencies contain metadata. What will be the standard for the documents posted electronically or online?
 - What are the legal implications of a notice being posted with a date that is earlier than the date of the notice?
 - What are the risks to the State from an online notice?

Electronic publication may be convenient for disabled individuals who own computers. To ensure such accessibility, standards and safeguards are needed to ensure accessibility. Groups representing the disabled and elderly will need to be contacted to provide input. Rules are necessary to provide an opportunity for a public hearing and provide guidance to agencies. This cannot be accomplished by July 1, 2012.

If this measure is to be passed, it should be passed with an effective date that goes into effect 90 days after Rules, providing standards for publication of notices that ensure accessibility, become effective. Furthermore, this measure should have remedies that allow individuals to enjoin the action that is contained in any notice that is not accessible including the recovery of attorney fees by an individual who brings their own action to enforce this law.

Absorb/Trash

Pour liquid into a plastic bag with absorbents, such as shredded newspaper, old rags or sawdust. Once liquid is absorbed, seal the bag, dispose in trash can. An oil change box provides same results. Paints can be hardened in the can, then trashed.

Trash Can

Securely close product lid to prevent spillage, then dispose with trash. Wrap light bulbs in paper before disposal. *For child safety, tape containers and double-bag before disposing.

Flush Down Drain

Flush down household drain with plenty of water; dispose of empty container with trash.

Sprays

Place absorbents and the spray can in a plastic bag. Close the bag, find the spray nozzle from outside the bag and spray the contents until empty. Dispose with trash.

Return to Retailer

Auto battery retailers are required by law to accept old batteries when you purchase a new one. For excess batteries, ask retailers if they will accept additional quantities.

Drop Off

Take to a City Convenience Center.

PAINT: ABSORB & TRASH

Paint is a common item, but not accepted at the drop-off events. You can safely dispose on your own. See Absorb/Trash instructions to the left. Only lead and aluminum paint require a drop-off appointment. Be careful to solidify the paint completely or it might drip from the trash truck onto your street. These instructions apply to small quantity household only. Commercial businesses must comply with EPA and state Department of Health regulations for disposal. Best tip: buy only what you need and use it all.

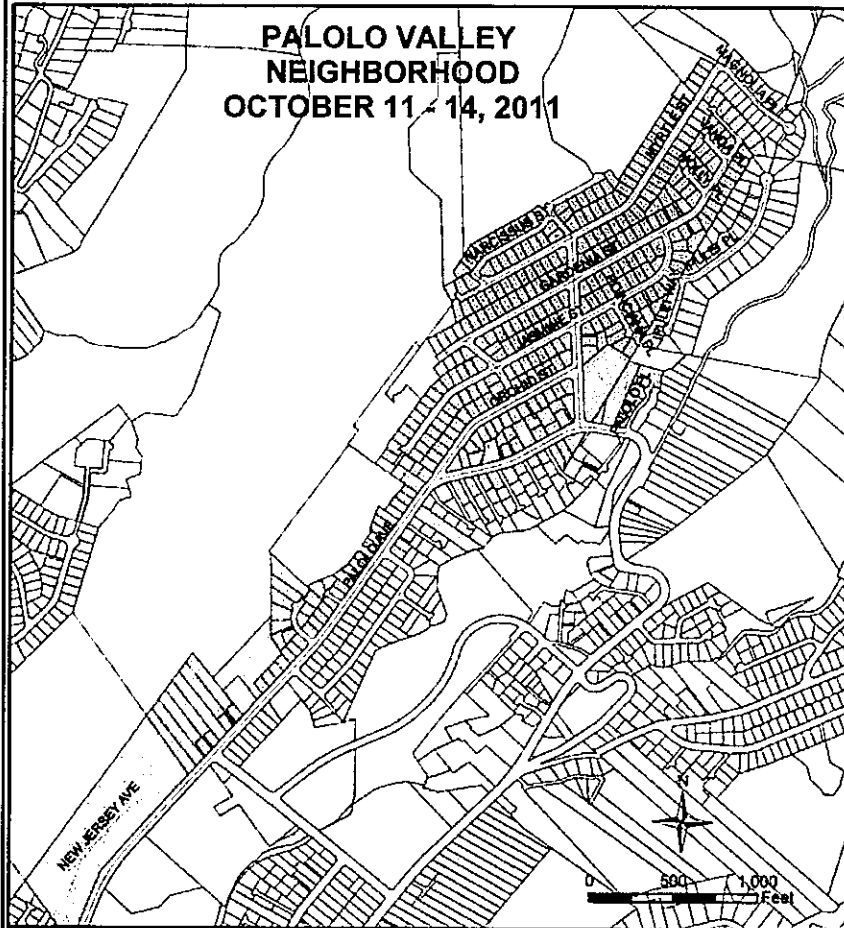

Shop and Compare Motor Vehicle Insurance Premiums

The Insurance Division of the Hawaii State Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs provides information on licensed insurance companies transacting private passenger motor vehicle insurance in Hawaii as part of a continuing effort to assist and educate consumers. Having motor vehicle insurance is essential to owning a motor vehicle in Hawaii. Hawaii State law requires that your vehicle be insured throughout the entire motor vehicle registration period by an insurance company that is licensed to write auto insurance in Hawaii. Hawaii state law also requires that you have a valid Hawaii motor vehicle insurance identification card in your motor vehicle at all times.

Over the last few years, several insurance companies have lowered rates for motor vehicle insurance. To assist consumers in shopping around and comparing premiums, the Hawaii Insurance Division has compiled a list of sample premiums for licensed insurance companies transacting private passenger auto business in Hawaii. This list also includes complaint statistics for the insurance companies that write more than 95% of the private passenger automotive insurance market.

On September 27, 2011, the Commission on Water Resource Management (Commission) approved a process for determining appurtenant water rights in the Na Wai Eha Surface Water Management Areas (SWMAs). The appurtenant rights determination will be done in a two-step process. The first step will be to determine whether there is an appurtenant water right associated with the parcel of land on which the water is being used or proposed to be used. The second step will be to quantify the amount of water associated with that parcel. The quantity determination will be done as part of the surface water use permitting process.

The Commission has the legal authority to determine appurtenant rights pursuant to HRS 174C-5(L5) which provides that, in addition to its other powers and duties, the Commission "(s)hall determine appurtenant water rights, including quantification of the amount of water entitled to by that right, which determination shall be valid for purposes of this chapter."

The land areas affected by the appurtenant rights determination are located in the Waikapu District of Maui and include Tax Map Keys from: (2) 3-1-006:001 to (2) 3-6-007:093 and from (2) 4-1-001:017 to (2) 4-8-001:002 (see map).

Applications for appurtenant water rights in Na Wai Eha must be made within ninety (90) days from the date of the last publication of this notice. The deadline is February 6, 2012. The Commission shall send notices to all existing users who declared their surface water uses and/or righted stream diversions with the Commission; existing and new users who applied for Surface Water Use Permits with the Commission; and the principal contacts for TMKs indicating a Land Commission Award in Na Wai Eha.

Although appurtenant rights may not be diminished or extinguished by a failure to apply for a permit, the Commission hereby notifies all potential appurtenant rights claimants to submit an application for a surface water use permit if they are currently using surface water (FORM SWUPA-E) or plan to use surface water in the Na Wai Eha SWMA (FORM SWUPA-H).

Application forms for surface water use permits are available at the Department of Land and Natural Resources, Commission on Water Resource Management, Kalahele Building, Room 227, 1151 Punchbowl Street, Honolulu, HI 96813, or may be downloaded from the Commission's website at: <http://hawaii.gov/dlnr/cwrmy/forms.htm>.

In addition to filing an application for surface water use permit, the following information and documentation will assist the Commission in making a judgment about the appurtenant rights claim:

- Proof of ownership or occupancy
- TMK map showing boundaries of all parcels for which an appurtenant right is being claimed
- TMK map showing current auwai(s)/ditches, lol, and sources of water (i.e., stream or spring)
- Documents demonstrating that parcel was used as a residence or for cultivation at the time of the Mahele, including but not limited to:
 - Copy of the LCA (and number) that is legible
 - Translation into English
 - Royal Patent (and number)
 - Name of original awardee
 - Kamaaina testimony and/or other Mahele documents
 - Other title history in support of claim
 - Map showing sources of water at the time of the Mahele
 - 1800's tax record
 - Current or historic photos of archaeological features or historic uses
 - Schematic maps or diagrams
 - Current title or deed clear of language demonstrating that the appurtenant right has been extinguished (i.e., no severance in deed)
 - Such other relevant information that the Commission may request from time to time
- List of future crops and water flow requirements (total & net) to supplement SWUPA-E applications, as applicable.
- Other relevant information that may assist the Commission in making its determination, e.g. oral history.
