- 1 **Department's Position:** The Department of Health strongly supports this Administration bill.
- 2 **Fiscal Implications:** No impact.
- 3 **Purpose and Justification:** This measure would include pharmacists as volunteer medical assistance
- 4 personnel. Medically-licensed volunteer workers who are performing volunteer medical assistance
- 5 services within the scope of their license on behalf of the State or a county are indemnified under Hawaii
- 6 law when responding to an emergency and during non-emergency situations such as school-based
- 7 immunization clinics. Lack of coverage for professional liability may mean that these valuable workers
- 8 will not participate as state volunteers, thereby limiting the ability of the State to draw upon their skills
- 9 as a critical public health resource.

In Support of H.B. 2564, HD1 Relating to Volunteer Medical Assistance Services.

Chair Green, Vice-Chair Nishihara, and Members of the Committee:

My name is Cindy Kamikawa, Vice President of Nursing, ED, Trauma, CNO, of The Queen's Medical Center (QMC), testifying on H.B. 2564, HD1 which seeks to include pharmacists who provide state voluntary medical assistance services as immune from liability. **QHS strongly supports this measure.**

Medical professional volunteers continue to be needed to supplement the State's staff in preparation for disasters and emergencies, including pharmacists. Lack of coverage for professional liability for pharmacists will likely mean that these valuable workers will not participate as state volunteers. As much as they may wish to help, they are unlikely to risk losing their home or other assets as the result of a lawsuit. Utilization of volunteers for periodic non-emergency activities and events keeps the volunteer force active and interested, provides an opportunity for volunteer training, and allows practice of the system for calling volunteers out to respond. In order to build a strong volunteer workforce of medical professionals to support public health interventions and for emergency medical surge capacity, we strongly believe that pharmacists who volunteer for the state should be indemnified in both emergency and non-emergency situations, providing that they are acting within the scope of their license and assigned volunteer role and without willful misconduct.

QHS strongly supports this measure as it will provide the public with the benefits of including pharmacists in an enhanced volunteer workforce organized and trained to respond to emergencies.

Chair Green, Vice Chair Nishihara, and members of the Committee:

My name is Todd Inafuku and I am a pharmacist, **testifying in strong support of HB 2564 HD1**, which adds pharmacists to the list of volunteer medical assistance and volunteer emergency medical disaster response personnel to be provided immunity from liability.

Pharmacists are able to administer immunization orally, by injection, or by intranasal delivery to persons eighteen years of age older provided they first receive appropriate training that includes programs approved by the Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education (ACPE), curriculum-based programs from an ACPE accredited college of pharmacy, state or local health department, or programs recognized by the board of pharmacy. By including pharmacists as volunteer medical assistance personnel, pharmacists who are able to administer immunization may be allowed to volunteer and provide professional medical services in support of vaccination campaigns.

The addition of pharmacists to the list of volunteer emergency medical disaster response personnel will allow pharmacists licensed in this state to utilize their professional expertise in the emergency response to a mass casualty event or disaster. This will also allow pharmacists to participate in the mass casualty and disaster training which is vital in the preparation for the response to an emergency event.
