My name is Sam Cox. I am a member of the Board of Directors of Kokua Council and the designated point person representing Kokua Council on Bills related to Gambling. The Kokua Council is probably the oldest advocacy group for senior citizens in Hawaii. Our mission, however, is not only to advocate for senior citizens, but also our grandchildren, our families, our neighbors and the welfare of our total community.

Kokua Council has long been opposed to legalized gambling in Hawaii as harmful to our senior citizens, our families and our community of Hawaii. ## **Dear Representative Brower:**

The prospect of adding gambling to Hawaii is a balance of risks & benefits; the risks (potential to harm) far outweighs the benefits. Here are a few reasons why:

### **CRIME**

Gambling breeds crime. Communities that welcome gambling also welcome an increase in crime. Any form of legalization makes an attractive target for career criminals. Organized crime has infiltrated numerous legal gambling operations in various states in recent years. This is NOT what we want for Hawaii!

#### ADDICTION & FAMILY DETERIORATION

Legalized gambling creates gambling addicts. Millions of Americans have developed devastating gambling addictions over the last few years as a direct result of gambling's rapid growth. An abundance of research and expert testimony demonstrates that as gambling expands, so does the number of those with serious gambling problems.

Legalized gambling devastates families because gambling exploits the vulnerable — the young, the old, and those susceptible to addictive behaviors. It entices the disadvantaged with the unrealistic hope of escape from poverty through instant riches. Authorities in gambling jurisdictions report dramatic increases in divorce, suicide, bankruptcy, and child abuse and domestic violence related to gambling. Research shows that children of gambling addicts experience lower levels of mental health and physical well-being.

## NEGATIVE ECONOMIC IMPACT

Gambling is an economic negative. Many states and communities embrace gambling as a means to generate additional revenues as well as to inspire economic growth, boost tourism and create jobs. These claims rarely prove accurate.

Finally, the social costs associated with gambling — such as losses due to crime, additional law enforcement costs, gambling addiction treatment costs, and lost work productivity — are staggering, often far exceeding a state or community's total revenues from gambling. Given these and other considerations, it is unconscionable that our State government would promote any form of gambling activity. Legalized gambling is ravaging the lives of untold thousands of individuals and families, and contributes substantially to the moral decay of our communities. Therefore, we believe legalized gambling, in all its forms, should and must be vigorously opposed.

#### **NEGATIVE IMAGE FOR HAWAII**

Thus far, Hawaii still has a great attraction for Families. A gambling state will not make Hawaii more

attractive, but less. Our increasing crime is a deterrent already; gambling will bring the desire for vacationers go down-->
