Subject: Letter in Strong Opposition to Portions of HB 2874 Relating to Broadband

My name is Roy Amemiya, President and Chief Executive Officer of 'Ōlelo Community Media ('Ōlelo), the PEG Access Provider for Oahu. I am writing to oppose Section 2 of the bill further capping cable access revenues to recipients such as 'Ōlelo and the other PEG providers. As you may be aware, 'Ōlelo's fees are already subject to a cap and this has resulted in serious funding deficiencies for a number of years.

The timing of this bill is a bit curious. Last year, HB 112, HD 1 was passed into law as Act 19. This committee voted unanimously in favor of the measure, as did the full House. Along with setting a procurement procedure for PEG contracts, the act also requires that an independent auditor conduct management and financial audits of each PEG for three consecutive years. The audits were required because there were questions about 'Ōlelo's use of cable access fees. We did not object to the audits because our senior management team believed that a comprehensive audit by an independent third party would finally put to rest House member's concerns about 'Ōlelo's fiscal practices. The firm of Merina and Company LLC was commissioned to conduct the audit and followed U.S. Government Auditing Standards. The audit was comprehensive and reviewed operating policies and procedures; financial budgets, ratios, and practices; management; and compliance with government requirements. In December of last year, the management audit was published and my team and I were extremely pleased because we believe that the resulting report describes 'Ōlelo as a well-managed company but requiring additional funding. The report validated 'Ōlelo's long contention that the cap on its funding should be removed or lifted.

WHEN OUR VOICE THRIVES, SO DOES OUR COMMUNITY

Specifically, Merina concluded that, "The use of resources is exceeding the operating funds available. This cannot continue for much longer. Either its spending has to be brought in line with its available resources or the funding for the organization has to be increased". So you can understand why we are a bewildered. We agreed to undergo a performance audit, the auditor concluded that we are well managed but under-funded, and we find ourselves back before this committee again on the issue of funding.

And so I thank this committee for this opportunity to hopefully convince House Finance Committee members that we are in a very tenuous financial position, and that limiting future revenues would in our opinion be unwise. My testimony is very focused. It is designed to specifically address six misunderstandings of fact that we believe need to have corrected.

Misunderstanding 1: 'Ōlelo is prospering financially while other NPOs are struggling.

Fact: Unfortunately, 'Ōlelo is <u>not</u> prospering. In fact, the cap on its funding has resulted in it not being profitable for many years. Between 2004 and 2010, 'Ōlelo averaged \$235,000 in losses per year. This has severely reduced operating reserves to an uncomfortable level of being less than six months of operating costs. Staff count at 'Ōlelo, which once stood at 75 is now just 63 and includes 10 part timers. Like employees across the island, up until this year, ours had not received merit increase raises for 4 years. Like others, they are now paying a much larger share for family medical coverage, and several years ago contributions to retirement was reduced from 4% to just 1% of their annual salary. But we are blessed because, in spite of earning lower than industry counterparts, our staff remains dedicated and passionate to their clients and allowing their voices to be heard. I believe a number of you have witnessed your own personal stories about your interaction with them.

Misunderstanding 2: 'Ōlelo has state-of-the art, broadcast quality equipment.

Fact: This is a myth. 'Ōlelo's equipment is very old. Two thirds of our fixed asset inventory is fully depreciated and in many instances are no longer supported by manufacturers. When cameras breakdown, our engineering staff cannibalizes parts from previously broken cameras because parts are no longer available. The massive transition from analog to digital equipment including our master control unit was a result of necessity. Anecdotally, when a retired general manager of a broadcast station entered our studio control room last year, his face brightened as saw the equipment and he looked at me and stated that he hadn't seen such equipment in decades and felt like he was in a broadcast museum. To again quote from the Merina & Company audit, "The transition to digital and HD has been entirely necessary".

Misunderstanding 3: 'Ōlelo is against the cable industry's transition from analog to digital.

Fact: We fully understand and support analog being replaced by the superior technology. Our objection is not to advancement in technology, but something much more pragmatic. 40% of the cable company's subscribers are only able to watch analog transmitted programs. That is why the major broadcast stations are still being transmitted in analog, in addition to digital and HD. When PEG channels move off analog and to the digital tier, four of every ten subscribers end up paying for a service that they cannot readily receive. Like the broadcast stations, we would much prefer to have our programs cablecast on multiple tiers. We realize that is not likely to happen so our position is that we

would like to remain on analog and transition when the broadcast stations no longer have analog channels.

Misunderstanding 4: 'Ōlelo owns a building worth over \$10 million and the rent it receives can fund its operations.

Fact: 'Ōlelo owns its headquarters building in Mapunapuna and it rents out parts of the building that it does not need. The Department of Education leases office space on the second floor where it creates programs for its distance learning instruction including programs for its PEG access channel. Another tenant leases a warehouse space in the back of the property but they will be vacating the space at the end of February and will be replaced with a short-term tenant. Together, these two tenants have been paying more than \$600,000 annually in rent and common area maintenance. However, that total is not even enough to cover the ground lease rent of \$670,000 annually that we pay to fee owner LMTC. And although the City assesses the property in excess of \$10 million, close to 60% of the value is in the land which 'Ōlelo does not own. Furthermore, since the building is on leasehold property with the rents fixed only until early 2014, there wouldn't be any prudent buyers should 'Ōlelo ever decide to sell the building. Finally, the building was not a recent acquisition. It was purchased by 'Ōlelo almost 18 years ago and no one on the current management team was involved in the purchase decision.

Misunderstanding 5: 'Ōlelo's expansion into community locations is a costly waste of money. Fact: The expansion into underserved communities is a very low cost business model and is an example of a win-win partnership with the Department of Education. By locating a media center at a school, our equipment and staff knowledge is shared with students and teachers during school hours. In the evening, the center is open to the general community. By having locations around the island rather than just at the Mapunapuna headquarters, we are able to service many more clients. For that privilege, schools can assess 'Ōlelo up to \$100 a month in rent. For that \$100, 'Ōlelo receives classroom and studio space, utilities, parking, security, and access to both students and the community at large. The partnership works so well, that several schools waive the \$100. Staffing is an ongoing expense but the majority of positions have been the result of transferring position that previously were at Mapunapuna. As mentioned earlier, through the years, the overall staff count at 'Ōlelo has been reduced.

Misunderstanding 6: You Tube and other forms of social media is making 'Ōlelo obsolete.

Fact: Interestingly, the reverse appears to be true. In fact, the hours of local programming produced by our clients has been increasing every year and in 2011 surpassed 5000 hours. This averages out to more than 13 hours of new local produced programs every single day of the year. There are probably many reasons contributing to this, but one may be because producers can use social media as an inexpensive and timely method of advertising their programs to a wide spectrum of potential viewers.

TESTIMONY IN <u>OPPOSITION</u> TO HB 2874 – RELATING TO PUBLIC, EDUCATIONAL, OR GOVERNMENTAL ACCESS FACILITIES

CHAIRS OSHIRO and YAMASHITA, VICE-CHAIRS LEE and TOKIOKA and MEMBERS of the FINANCE and LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEES:

Aloha. I offer this testimony today on behalf of the Koani Foundation to register our strong **OPPOSITION** to **HB 2874** because of the damage this will cause to free speech in Hawaii.

One of the greatest injustices resulting from the pirating of the Hawaiian Kingdom has been the practice of squelching dissent from the people—whether it be annexation, indentured servitude, unionizing, sovereignty, independence, land titles, sustainability, rail development and so forth.

In recent years, 'Olelo and other public access facilities across the state have provided a crucial platform for the Public to speak from regarding critical issues, and to offer insightful, constructive ideas to remedy these problems.

With the merging of mainstream media into corporate uniformity, these "public access" programs, produced independently by members of the community, are a vital source of alternative views in the public discourse of critical issues.

In a time of rising costs, capping PEG funds and diverting the access to other uses would cause the public's voice to be stifled. This is particularly egregious since the PEG funds are not coming from the state's coffers, but are fees from cable TV companies specifically earmarked for PEG.

If the state legislature needs funds for its broadband/"free"-laptop program, let it extract it from the monolithic cable/broadband/telecommunications companies as a separate, new fee.

We urge you not to pass HB 2874 and preserve a vital part of free speech.

On behalf of Oceanic Time Warner Cable (Oceanic), which provides a diverse selection of entertainment, information, and communication services to over 425,000 Hawaii households, schools and businesses and currently employs more than 1,000 highly-trained individuals, we appreciate the opportunity to express our support of this bill, which creates broadband special fund to support funding public school broadband and laptop initiatives through cable fees and contributions, grants, endowments, or gifts in cash received by the fund.

Oceanic is supportive of initiatives such as this legislation that provides a more equitable distribution of cable fees toward education and government services.

Oceanic's subscribers through cable franchise fees provided more than \$7.5 million in operating funds and over \$1.1 million in capital funds to Olelo, Akaku, Hoike and Na Leo combined in 2011. 

I'm Leslie Wilcox, President and CEO of PBS Hawaii. As Hawaii's only statewide noncommercial educational broadcaster, we support strategic efforts to equip students with 21st-century skills.

However, we are concerned that HB 2874 would harm PBS Hawaii in <u>our</u> successful work of equipping students with 21st-century skills.

We receive 1% of the fee proceeds and this has proved critical to us in weathering the recent recession and the continuing uneven economy. Moreover, it has helped us create and cover the costs of a rapidly growing, innovative educational program, HIKI NŌ: The Nation's First Statewide News Network.

In one year, the number of participating schools in HIKI NŌ has jumped from 54 to 73. All middle and high schools in Hawaii may join at no cost to the schools. Students learn real-world, 21st-century workforce skills and "habits of mind," and at the same time, they're sharing responsible stories about their school communities with a statewide television audience and the worldwide web.

On this very day in Washington D.C., PBS Hawaii and HIKI NŌ have been awarded the top national award for innovation at a public media summit. That's why I'm not able to deliver this testimony in person.

We ask that you consider the effect that the current draft of HB 2874 is likely to have in limiting educational services at PBS Hawaii, including this effective digital media program which reaches deeply into schools across the state.

Thank you for listening, and *mahalo* for seeking and vetting ways to strengthen student learning.

My name is Meredith Nichols and although I am submitting testimony as a private citizen today, for the purposes of full-disclosure, I want to let you know that I am also the Director for Community Development at 'Ōlelo Community Media and have been employed by 'Ōlelo since 1999.

As a resident of a rural community on O'ahu, I can testify to the frequently uneven resources available to those communities outside of central Honolulu. My home-town of Wahiawā is beautiful. Our people are hard-working and we love our community. We don't have much. One thing we do have, thanks to a partnership between 'Ōlelo and the DOE's Leilehua High School, is a community media center where Wahiawā folks (student through kupuna) can learn how make videos and share their stories. Before there was a media center in Wahiawā, our unique stories were not on television. The Kunia Orchid show, the Pineapple Festival, The Central O'ahu band competition, Iliahi's May Day program, Wahiawā kupuna oral histories...and so many others are now being shared via television on 'Ōlelo. In fact, since opening the Wahiawā CMC three years ago, 257 hours of community programming from nearly 500 community programs from the Wahiawā, North Shore and Central O'ahu area have been distributed on television via 'Ōlelo's channels.

I have three sons at Iliahi Elementary school. Thanks to 'Ölelo's presence in Wahiawā, my fifth grader has already had the opportunity, along with his classmates, to learn more about video production. He and his classmates are hard at work right now on completing their video submission for 'Ölelo's annual Youth Xchange competition. I hope that the resource is still there when my second and third grade sons are old enough to create their own videos.

So why is this information relevant to a Bill on Broadband? I agree that it shouldn't be. Broadband is an important initiative that should be addressed, but it should not be connected with funds derived from cable subscribers. I know that the only way 'Ōlelo is able to operate centers in communities like Wahiawā, Kahuku, Wai'anae, Waipahu, Kaneohe and Palolo are through the PEG access funding it receives. Note that these funds are from Oceanic Time Warner, a mainland cable company who enjoys milliona and millions in profits from our community each year. These are not tax payer dollars, although it is true that Oceanic TWE passes the fee on to our subscribers, not wanting invest any of their profits in funding free speech and community access. Placing a permanent cap on these funds (which are collected for this purpose) would make it impossible for 'Ōlelo to continue to serve communities like mine from within the community. This Bill would be bad for community participation in free speech. It would limit resources and opportunities for our neediest communities.

As a mother, with high-hopes for the future of Hawai'i nei, I ask that you support the community's on-going ability to access video production resources across our islands by rejecting HB 2874. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

Opposed: HB 2874 relating to Broadband

Four years ago, I joined 'Olelo as its marketing manager following retirement after twenty three years with Starr Seigle Communications, the last six years serving as chairman and CEO.

I submit this testimony as an individual, not as an employee as I believe my perceptions prior to joining 'the company is, like many of the committee perhaps, were terribly uninformed. Frankly, I had not spent much time viewing 'Olelo's channels and knew little of the outreach programs or programming they are responsible for in the community. I didn't know...

- 1. about the annual Youth Xchange student video competition (the state's largest) where students with their teachers create videos relating to issues facing our community. The program provides training to teach students how to use their voice by employing video in a positive manner. The competition received over 580 entries last year and has awarded over 200 video cameras to our schools since its inception eight years ago.
- 2. about the "Vote Informed" campaign 'Olelo hosts during election years offering candidates on O'ahu or seeking statewide or federal office the opportunity to present themselves and their platform on TV at no cost. The campaign also features forums and debates, not only for those high profile candidates for a particular office, but for all candidates. As part of "Vote Informed" 'Olelo produces more hours of election programming than any other TV station in Hawaii.
- 3. 

I have visited a Public Television station and I have seen how well-equipped facilities can be when the public and the political leadership ensure that their Public Television gets the full 5% allotted to them by law. This full 5% funding comes from the lucrative Cable

Company contracts with no cost to tight government budgets or the public. One again, there are " misunderstandings" in our Legislature.
