HOUSE COMMITTEE ON TRANSPORTATION

This resolution requests the Department of Transportation (DOT) to convene a task force to examine the impact of all-terrain vehicle accidents on children and consider means, including legislation, to minimize injuries and deaths suffered by children due to the use of all-terrain vehicles.

The Department of Transportation respectfully opposes these resolutions as this request is outside of our jurisdiction. All-terrain vehicles (ATVs) cannot legally travel upon our public roads. We do not collect crash data, unless the crash occurs on public roads. Further, since ATVs do not meet the Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standards, it is not anticipated that they will be allowed to use public roads.

My name is Caesar Ursic, MD, FACS, Assistant Clinical Professor of Surgery JABSOM and Trauma Medical Director of The Queen's Medical Center (QMC).

The Queen's Medical Center supports HCR 33/HR 17 due to its potentially beneficial impact on the prevention of ATV-related childhood injuries. As a trauma surgeon who has cared for several children injured or killed while riding on ATV in the State of Hawaii, I can attest to the severity of these injuries and to the life-long impact that they can have on a child, especially when a head injury is involved. A closer study of the factors and variables associated with these injuries in children and of possible approaches to their reduction or prevention would be time, effort and money well spent in improving the quality of life of our keiki.

Good morning, Chair Souki, Vice- Chair Ichiyama and members of the Committee. On behalf of the Hawaii Chapter, American Physical Therapy Association ("HAPTA"), we are in <u>support</u> of HR 17/HCR 33, REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION TO CONVENE A TASK FORCE TO EXAMINE THE IMPACT OF ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLE ACCIDENTS ON CHILDREN.

In addition to the disturbing statistics noted in the resolution, 1.7 million Americans sustain a brain injury each year. According to the Center for Disease Control, 500,000 children under the age of 14 in the United States visit an emergency room for brain injuries annually. In Hawaii alone, according to the Hawaii Department of Health, more than 2,600 children under the age of 14 are treated for brain injuries in the emergency room.

As physical therapists, our members are on the frontlines of treating patients with brain injuries, including those caused by accidents involving all terrain vehicles. We believe that passing this measure is especially timely and fitting, given that March is National Brain Injury Awareness Month.

HAPTA is a non-profit professional organization serving more than 200 member Physical Therapists and Physical Therapist Assistants. Our mission is to be the principal membership organization that represents and promotes the profession of Physical Therapy in the State of Hawaii.
