Chair Ige and Members of the Committee:

The Hawaii Disability Rights Center testifies in support of this bill.

The purpose of the bill is to provide increased Medicaid reimbursement rates to physicians who treat QUEST and QUEST Expanded Access patients. We believe that it is important to provide this at a level which will fairly compensate them and create sufficient incentives to provide the care that these recipients require. We have heard anecdotally of problems of shortages of physicians in certain areas of the state as well as physicians who were reluctant to treat Medicaid patients because of the low reimbursement.

To the extent that physicians can receive reimbursements that more realistically reflect the level of care that is required for their patient, the easier it should be to find an appropriate number of physicians who are willing to participate in these programs. The QUEST and QUEST Expanded Access programs are only as good and effective as the quality and quantity of providers with whom they can contract to provide services. Since higher reimbursements will make both of these more likely, we are in full support of this bill.

Hawaii Medical Association supports this measure.

The HMA agrees that Medicaid is the cornerstone of health care for the most needy individuals in Hawaii. It is in the public interest to ensure that health care payments made with state funds or controlled by the State are sufficient to cover the actual costs of care. Inadequate reimbursement from Medicaid has compromised access to medical care because Hawaii has a high percentage of independent physicians who have no other means of making ends meet than by ensuring that the payments that they receive cover the cost of the services they provide.

As documented in numerous media reports, the inadequacy of medical care services, especially in specialty-care coverage in rural areas and on the neighbor islands, has reached a critical level. Hawaii's physicians serving Medicaid-eligible persons have been adversely affected by the inadequacy of Medicaid reimbursements and as a result there is a severe access to care crisis for the Medicaid population. This measure will go a long way to help serve Hawaii's most needy patients.
