Re: S.B. No. 2261 Relating to the Weed and Seed Program

I. OVERVIEW OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

SB2261 creates a Weed and Seed program in the Office of Community Services (OCS), which is administratively attached to the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations (DLIR). The measure appropriates funds and requires a report to the legislature from the department.

We support this bill provided that its passage does not displace the funding priorities of the administration.

III. COMMENTS ON THE SENATE BILL

DLIR supports and shares OCS's concerns with the measure as currently drafted. The reduction of crime and drug use is both outside the scope of OCS and the prevention of crime is outside the mission of DLIR. The measure as currently worded would task OCS with providing direct services, which would require significantly more resources including staff. The department notes that under HRS Chapter 371K, OCS's mission is to contract out services to other entities to provide services and then provide administrative support and oversight.

The department defers to the Department of Human Resources Development in regards to the potential roadblocks identified by OCS regarding program expenses associated with personnel issues.

My name is Barbara Tom. I recently retired from the DOH as a Public Health Nurse but continue to work closely with the Waipahu Community Coalition which I chaired for a number of years. The Coalition's main mission is to develop a safe and healthy community for Waipahu. The Weed and Seed Program has been an active and key partner with the Coalition in collaborating with residents, non-profit organizations, community groups and private businesses to help us focus on crime reduction and drug prevention.

For example, one of the preventative activities that Weed and Seed leads in our community is the RAP Program provided to Waipahu and Honowai Elementary School students. RAP stands for Real and Powerful sessions. Weed & Seed conducts weekly sessions with the students on making appropriate and informed decisions on drugs, internet safety, school attendance, and bullying.

Another program offered by Weed & Seed in Waipahu is Fresh Start which in partnership with Waipahu High School and Gear Up, targets youth that are on track for failure. Weed and Seed conducts workshops and supports educational excursions that teach students and parents skills in communication, problem solving and decision making. The goal is to give these students a much needed "fresh start".

Re: S.B. No. 2380 Relating to Taxation

The Department of Taxation (Department) appreciates the intent of S.B. 2380 and provides the following information and comments for your consideration.

S.B. 2380 requires the Department to permit the counties access to income tax data of taxpayers for real property tax purposes.

Due to the high level of confidentiality afforded taxpayer information, both at the State and federal level, the Department cannot support providing non-Department of Taxation staff access to its income tax. County employees would be held to the same standard of confidentiality that Department employees must adhere to, which includes the possibility of termination and criminal charges should a violation occur.

At the same time, the Department understands the counties' need to verify income information as a requisite for receiving certain county-funded benefits. Currently, the Department is able to assist the counties in determining real property tax benefits for certain individuals. We are willing to work with the counties to identify and resolve other potential issues that may require information on taxpayers' status.

SB 2380 Relating to Tax - Sharing Information with Counties (SUPPORT)

Aloha Chair and Senators,

Thank you for allowing me to provide testimony on SB 2380, which would allow the state department of taxation to share certain tax information with the counties.

Currently, the City and County of Honolulu offers a real property tax credit to certain homeowners who make less than \$50,000 per year. Applicants are required to submit an application along with tax documents, including income tax returns, to the county Department of Budget and Fiscal Services. The county also currently requires a tax return transcript, and this requirement alone causes confusion and frustration for both the applicant and county employees. If the county were allowed access to information filed with the Hawaii Department of Taxation, the application process could be simplified and more efficient.

I therefore support this bill and ask you to vote "yes."
