Subject: Senate Bill No. 2341 Relating to Land Use

The Department of Planning and Permitting opposes Senate Bill No. 2341. This measure would allow short-term overnight accommodations (agricultural tourism) as a principal use in State Agricultural Districts. No agricultural uses need be present on the property. The language could be interpreted to refer to hotels. The allowance of overnight accommodations would be contrary to the purpose and intent of retaining agricultural lands to support agricultural activities and services.

The Department will not support any proposals to change the zoning ordinance to establish provisions for short-term rentals on agricultural lands.

Chairs Nishihara and Dela Cruz, Vice Chairs Kahele and Solomon, and Members of the Senate Committees on Agriculture and Water, Land, and Housing.

The Office of Planning (OP) opposes SB 2341, which would amend Hawai'i Revised Statutes (HRS) Chapter 205, to allow short-term rentals of not more than thirty days duration as a permissible use in the State Agricultural District. SB 2341 would also eliminate the requirement for agricultural tourism uses to be permissible only in association with a bona fide farming operation and allow overnight accommodations in association with an agricultural tourism use in the Agricultural District.

SB 2341 is inconsistent with State policy to promote agricultural uses in the Agricultural District and to protect agricultural lands as set forth in Article XI, Section 3 of the Hawai'i Constitution, HRS Chapter 205, the State Land Use Law, and HRS Chapter 226, the Hawai'i

State Plan. In addition, it is a priority of the Administration's New Day Plan to stimulate an agricultural renaissance in Hawai'i that would increase production and consumption of locally produced foods and increase food and energy security for the islands.

HRS Chapter 205 specifically limits the permissible uses in the Agricultural District to discourage the use of agricultural land by higher value, non-agricultural land uses. The only dwellings defined as permissible uses in the Agricultural District are farm dwellings that are located on and used in connection with a farm or a dwelling occupied by persons or families deriving income from agriculture, as defined in HRS Section 205-4.5(a)(4).

Allowing short-term or vacation rentals as a permissible use in the State Agricultural District would increase land values in the Agricultural District and make land less affordable for farmers. This would contribute significantly to the loss of agricultural lands to higher-value nonfarm uses, and could adversely impact the viability of diversified agriculture in Hawai'i as well as food and energy security for Hawaii's people.
