Conclusion

Mitigating the animal agriculture sector"s significant yet underappreciated role in climate change is vital for the health and sustainability of the planet, the environment, and its human and nonhuman inhabitants. As experts at the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations, and numerous other leading global entities have identified, reducing GHG emissions is both urgent and critical. As the largest anthropogenic user of land and responsible for 18% of human-induced GHG emissions, the farm animal production sector must be held accountable for its many deleterious impacts, and changes in animal agricultural practices must be achieved.
