#### In consideration of SENATE BILL 2792 RELATING TO RENEWABLE ENERGY REVENUE

Senate Bill 2792 proposes to provide supplemental sources of revenue from renewable energy for the Native Hawaiian Rehabilitation Fund. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports the intent of this Administration measure, however requests the following revisions to clarify the proposed revenue to be shared with the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL):

- 1. Royalties transferred to DHHL that apply to future mining leases executed after July 1, 2012 shall be contingent upon the reduction of the County's share from 30% to 25%...
- 2. The reduction of the County's share from any existing mining lease shall be retained by the Department.
- 3. Regarding the County's share of the royalties, revise proposed language on page 8, lines 5-6 from "not less than twenty" to "twenty-five".
- 4. 30% of any revenue transferred to DHHL from any disposition to a renewable energy producer made after July 1, 2012 shall not apply to a geothermal energy producer (page 5, lines 16-17).

These clarifications are currently reflected in the companion measure, House Bill 2530, House Draft 1.

Due to the increased workload to meet renewable energy needs in the State of Hawaii, these revisions will ensure that the Department can maintain the necessary resources to effectively manage the Geothermal Program and continue to facilitate land dispositions with renewable energy producers. The Department believes this cost sharing proposal, as clarified in this testimony, is fair with respect to the needs and obligations of both agencies and meets the objective of this measure.

Chair Galuteria, Chair Dela Cruz, Chair Gabbard, and Members of the Committees:

The Department of Hawaiian Home Lands strongly supports SB 2792, which identifies supplemental sources of revenue from renewable energy for the Native Hawaiian Rehabilitation Fund. This bill is part of the Governor's administrative package by request of our department.

The Native Hawaiian Rehabilitation Fund (NHRF) is a Hawaiian Home Lands trust fund that supports higher education scholarships, financial literacy training and counseling, agricultural and pastoral technical assistance, and community grants for native Hawaiians. The State Constitution secures 30% of the state revenues from lands previously cultivated as sugarcane lands and water licenses for this fund, but there has been a 94% decline in the revenue stream since this constitutional amendment was enacted in 1978.

This proposal identifies 20% of geothermal royalties and 30% of lease rents derived from Department of Land and Natural Resources

(DLNR) dispositions to renewable energy producers on DLNR lands as new revenue sources from renewable energy development activities that are expected to grow over the next decade. Since the geothermal royalties are already allocated to the DLNR, the county in which the geothermal project operates, and the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, this measure proposes to increase the geothermal royalty rate from 10% to 12% to maintain the royalty sums available to these entities.

In consideration of the conclusion of the Act 14 settlement payments and the limited alternative revenue sources, the passage of this measure ensures the availability of resources to carry out the intent of Section 1, Article XII of the State Constitution and the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act.

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) <u>SUPPORTS WITH AMENDMENTS</u> SB2792, which would help ensure steady future revenue for the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL).

The State constitution places a high priority on the rehabilitation of native Hawaiians and created a funding structure for the native Hawaiian Rehabilitation Fund, which was designed to perpetuate for many years. This fund is utilized by DHHL for the important purpose of rehabilitating of native Hawaiians, native Hawaiian families, and Hawaiian homestead communities, which includes the educational, economic, political, social, and cultural processes by which the general welfare and conditions of native Hawaiians are improved and perpetuated. However, the continuing decline in deposits from the fund's main traditional funding source—state receipts from lands previously cultivated as sugarcane lands—necessitates the establishment of a stable alternative funding source to ensure that these resources remain available to DHHL and to native Hawaiians.

Geothermal and other renewable energy research and development have a promising future in Hawai'i, and the royalties and revenue to be derived from these sources and received by the state will likely continue to grow. Therefore, DHHL reasonably looks to these revenue streams as possible alternatives.

OHA appreciates the important need for DHHL to stabilize their future funding and seeks to ensure that constitutionally provided funding for other services to the same beneficiary community would not suffer as a result. Therefore, OHA urges the committee to add a new section between the current sections 5 and 6 stating: "Nothing in this act shall diminish the office of Hawaiian affairs' pro rata portion of the public land trust, pursuant to article XII, section 6, of Hawaii's constitution."

OHA urges the committee to PASS SB2792 with OHA's recommended amendments. Mahalo for the opportunity to testify on this important measure.

The legislature finds that an additional revenue stream for the native Hawaiian rehabilitation fund must be identified to continue existing programs for native Hawaiians, native Hawaiian families, and Hawaiian homestead communities. Senate Bill (SB) No. 2792 identifies geothermal royalties and revenue from the public land dispositions to renewable energy producers as supplemental sources of revenue for the Native Hawaiian Rehabilitation Fund.

I support the intent of SB No. 2792 to find additional funding sources for the Native Hawaiian Rehabilitation Fund but ask that you consider the following amendment.

SB No. 2792 proposes to amend Section 182-7, Hawai'i Revised Statues (HRS) to reduce from thirty to twenty percent the percentage of all royalties received by the State from geothermal resources to be paid to the county in which the mining operations covered under a state geothermal resource mining lease are situated. This would reduce revenue available to the County's Geothermal Relocation and Community Benefits Fund. This fund has been used for road improvements, water infrastructure, land acquisition, parks and recreational facility needs,

civil defense, and mass transit improvements in the Lower Puna District. More specifically, during the current administration, the fund has been a funding source for the purchase of buses to service the Lower Puna district, park equipment renovations, Pāhoa swimming pool equipment, installation of smart signs and streetlights, improvements to the Pāhoa Transfer Station, and various road repaving and drainage improvements. Therefore, in order for these important projects to continue to be funded, I humbly ask for the amount to be amended to twenty-five percent.

With the additional amendment proposed by SB No. 2792 to Section 182-18, HRS, the payment of royalties to the State would be increased from ten per cent to a fixed at a rate of not less than twelve per cent of the gross amount or value of the geothermal resources produced under the lease. This rate increase along with the requested amendment to twenty-five percent royalties received by the State from geothermal resources to be paid to the county would allow our revenue stream to be maintained. With those amendments, the County's Geothermal Relocation and Community Benefits Fund could continue to be utilized as a valuable funding source for public projects in the Lower Puna District.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in support of this measure and to offer a further amendment. I ask that the Committees consider the amendment to SB No. 2792 as proposed above.
