District Concerns

Queen Lili'uokalani

It was disappointing to hear the Board of Education voted to close Queen Lili'uokalani Elementary School at the end of this school year. The Deputy Superintendent has indicated that DOE offices might be consolidated at this facility.

Kindergarten and first grade students from Queen Lili'uokalani had a happy tour of the Capitol

and sat in on a session of the House of Representatives recently. So sad that it may be one of the last excursions for these youngsters as the school is slated to be closed by the Board of Education due to lack of enrollment.

Rep. Marumoto also stopped in on an ice cream social put on by the Parent Teachers Organization.



Lili'uokalani has a rich and illustrious history and students have a deep pride in their school.

Marumoto Bills Legislative Update

Kahala Covenants and ATV Bills Pass the House – HB 1431 HD1 that would require the Counties to enforce covenants that run with the land has passed the House and is slated to be heard in the Senate Government & Public Safety Committee. This may help to prevent a museum on Kahala Avenue.

Rep. Marumoto originally asked for a prohibition on minors to operate ATVs (HB 18 HD1). However, it now allows <u>6-year-olds to operate these off-road vehicles!</u> This bill is moving the wrong way. Please send testimony to Rep. Marumoto requesting the Senate to raise the age to at least 16. Or how about just requiring ATV users to have a drivers license? That way we know that they can handle a car.



During the Budget hearing, Rep. Marumoto questioned the taxing of pensions, especially on the elderly and pensioners solely dependent on that source of income.

Gov. Abercrombie's Pension Tax Proposal

Although he insists that only pension income is taxed, his proposal would tax AGI of \$37,500 if *any part* of it consists of pension income. Marumoto said that taxing income as low as \$37,000 is almost cruelespecially when the tax is retroactive to January 1, 2011 and folks have planned on tax-free pensions for decades. The House is moving a bill that would tax \$100,000+AGI but beware – that number could slide down as the bill moves toward session end! For more, see www.timeforbarbaramarumoto.com.

Cost of Living Rising!

House Democrats are pushing a long list of tax and fee increases plus raiding many special funds in an effort to balance the state budget. The "revenue enhancements" enable the Democrats to make fewer cuts in the budget. Some of the tax/fee increases that passed the House include:

- pensions over \$100,000 individual
- Increase fuel tax
- 75 cents/1000 lbs. on incoming freight
- increasing solid waste tipping fee
- \$20 increase on auto registration
- 1 cent/lb increase auto weight tax
- \$3/day increase on rental cars
- disabled parking registration \$1
- conveyance tax on transfer of controlling interests with real property interest
- surcharge on film permits
- \$20 surcharge on business licenses
- tax and labor service fees for DBEDT operation
- building/design review fees for ADA compliance
- GET on life settlement contracts
- make permanent physicians assessment fee
- hotel tax on time shares
- delay standard deduction
- 20% increase on liquor tax
- Increase tax on tobacco products
- suspend GET exemption on certain entities
- and add 4% GET.

If you can identify the branch of service of the helicopter, call them directly.


