HB 754

RELATING TO HEALTH.

EEP, HLT, JUD

Status

Requires a county to investigate and notify the Department of Health if a report is made about a possible nuisance involving air pollution. Defines air-polluting nuisances. Gives the Director of Health the authority to enter and investigate reports of air-polluting nuisances.

HB 1307

RELATING TO LANDFILLS.

EEP, EDN, FIN

<u>Status</u>

Creates a host municipality benefit fee to be assessed against landfill operators who violate solid waste pollution laws. Requires the State to distribute the fee to high schools within a five-mile radius of the

penalized landfill.

HB 701

RELATING TO WASTE DISPOSAL.

EEP, CPC, FIN

Status

Requires the department of health to develop and implement a voucher system for the collection and disposal of vehicle tires; appropriates

funds. Effective July 1, 2013.

HB 633 <u>Status</u>

RELATING TO THE ENVIRONMENT.

EEP, OMH

Requires that all loading operations of oil petroleum, petroleum products, and other non-miscible lighter-than-water substances in any

state harbor must be surrounded by containment devices.

HB 901

RELATING TO SOLID WASTE.

EEP, HLT, FIN

<u>Status</u>

Increases the solid waste management surcharge to \$1.25 per ton of solid waste disposed of in landfills or shipped out-of-state; increases the solid waste management surcharge to 60 cents per ton of solid waste disposed of at waste-to-energy facilities that accept 150,000 tons or more of solid waste annually; provides for no surcharges to wasteto-energy facilities that accept less than 150,000 tons of solid waste annually and for ash disposed of in landfills that originates from a waste-to-energy facility; and defines "waste-to-energy facility".

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HB 902

RELATING TO THE DEPOSIT BEVERAGE CONTAINER

EEP, CPC, FIN

Status

PROGRAM.

Removes the exemption for dietary supplements from the deposit

beverage container program.

HB 357

RELATING TO THE ENVIRONMENT.

EEP, CPC, FIN

Status

Requires certain businesses in the State to collect a 10-cent fee for each single-use checkout bag provided to customers. Allows businesses to retain ten per cent of the fees, subject to income and general excise taxes, for the first year. Directs use of fee revenues to fund programs to mitigate the effects of single-use checkout bags. Establishes provisions relating to violations, injunctive and other relief, county ordinances, business reporting, and audit authority. Requires annual

report to the legislature. Appropriates funds.

HB 932

RELATING TO MINERAL RESOURCES.

EEP, WAL

Status

Revises statutory provisions relating to the regulation of mineral resources under chapters 171 and 182, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to include geothermal within the definition of a "renewable energy producer" and to provide clarity, eliminate ambiguities, and incorporate technical, nonsubstantive changes in accordance with Act

97, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012.

HB 106 Status RELATING TO GEOTHERMAL RESOURCES.

EEP, WAL, FIN

Repeals Act 97, SLH 2012, relating to geothermal resources which differentiates between "geothermal resources exploration" and "geothermal resources development". Designates "geothermal resources exploration" and "geothermal resources development" as permissible uses in all state land use districts and certain conservation district repeat in accordance with chapter 205, HPS. Freets

district zones in accordance with chapter 205, HRS. Enacts geothermal resource subzones, designation of areas as geothermal resources subzones, and exploratory wells, which were repealed by Act

97.

HB 856 Status RELATING TO GREEN INFRASTRUCTURE.

EEP, CPC, FIN

Establishes a regulatory financing structure that authorizes the Public Utilities Commission and the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism to provide low-cost loans for green infrastructure equipment to achieve measurable cost savings and

achieve Hawaii's clean energy goals.
