## **REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES**

Representative Rhoads, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented two reports:

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of both measures with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support with some reservations. Not reservations in disagreement, but the accuracy of some of the statements that are made, Mr. Speaker. With the United Nations, I spent over two months in the Federated States of Micronesia doing economic development. These resos are very accurate when basically they said we have neglected economic development.

"Essentially 70% of their economy is either welfare payments, transfer payments, or government jobs and subsidies. They have basically no private sector. That was part of why the UN was sending me there, but it was also the reason why, and I think these resos do not mention, that we should have USAID, our foreign aid office, helping to develop their economy.

"The other part of it is that it fails to mention the \$20 billion or so, the settlements that were given to the nations for their compact of free association. Even though they have given up some of their military lands, we are now responsible for their military wellbeing. I'm not sure that that comes as clear as it is.

"It also suggests that Micronesians cannot freely travel, work or become active US citizens without any visas or other things. In effect they can come and go wherever they want to go and do whatever they want to do. I know Hawaii tried to restrict some of their access to medical services, but that was thrown out by the courts.

"So Mr. Speaker, the notion that Micronesians have not been given their due, in a way is very true given what we did with military and other nuclear experiments. But by and large, Micronesians have in-roads in various parts of the nation, including this place, and they're upright standing members of our community. This one wanting to make them alien residents, I'm not sure I've ever heard of the term. A 'qualified alien.' I'm not sure if that's consensus within the Micronesian community.

"So, Mr. Speaker, for the sake of accuracy and what otherwise is not mentioned here, that the State of Hawaii, for food, shelter, medical and other things, spends over \$100 million per year on the Micronesians. And the reimbursement of the impact aid from the federal government is \$30 million divided by Guam, California and Hawaii. So we get back maybe \$1 out of \$10 for what we spend. So I think we're being a good neighbor, and I think the Micronesians look at Hawaii as kind of like a big brother, and I'm not sure how the Micronesians may look at this even though it looks to be a beneficial one. It should be a bit more accurate to go the distance. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"Fishing and seafood are an integral part of the host (Hawaiian) culture, as well as the culture of many immigrants from the Pacific Rim countries. Many of us in this very Chamber were taught at a very young age how to catch fish and crab, and how to pick *limu* and what variety of *limu* to pick. We were even taught how to clean and prepare the seafood. More importantly, we were taught how to care for the ocean environment. This festival is not only for those individuals wanting to learn how to fish, but also those wanting to learn more about our ocean environment and where the seafood on our dinner table comes from.

"Mr. Speaker, eight years ago Mr. Neil Kanemoto, President of Pacific Islands Fisheries Group, Mr. Roy Morioka, Mr. Tony Costa, Mr. Bruce Takenaka, auctioneer at Otani fish auction, and many others put forth the idea of a fishing and seafood exposition to educate Hawaii's residents about Hawaii's fishing industry and ocean resources. This year's 'Hawaii Fishing and Seafood Week' from October 6 through 13, culminating with the Festival on October 13 at Pier 38, is a testament to their hard work.

"Mr. Speaker, the 'Hawaii Fishing and Seafood Week' festival is not solely for locals and fishermen; over the years, attendees have included new residents to Hawaii as well as visitors to the islands who want to learn more about Hawaii's ocean resources. Besides learning fishing techniques (how to tie a hook onto the line, how to cast your line out and the use of various types of bait), you also learn about ocean resources and conservation, such as taking only what you can eat, marine invasive species, etc. Activities during the festival include visiting the auction block where commercial fishermen take their different varieties of daily catch for sale. Patrons will learn about various conservation efforts, such as the tagging program that identifies various varieties of fish. Personnel from the DLNR's Division of Conservation and Resources Enforcement are also in attendance to inform the public of Hawaii's fishing regulations, both marine and freshwater. There are also numerous children's activities that center on fishing and ocean resources. For my colleagues who have not attended this festival in the past, I highly recommend that you do so this vear.

"Mr. Speaker, for these reasons, I am in strong support of HSCRs 1657 and 1658, HR 102 and HCR 132, and ask my colleagues to support these measures."

"Mr. Speaker, rise in strong support of HSCR No. 1675, HR No. 149, REQUESTING THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO SUPPORT LEGISLATION REQUIRING THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION TO COME UP WITH A NATIONWIDE SYSTEM FOR MONITORING, LABELING AND ENFORCING THE LABELING OF ALL WHOLE AND PROCESSED GENETICALLY ENGINEERED FOODS.

"Across the country, various states are considering food labeling requirements for genetically modified organics (GMOs). A referendum on labeling died in California during the 2012 election cycle. This year in Hawaii, a bill labeling GMO food in Hawaii failed in the State Senate.

"We, the public believe that transparency and accuracy regarding the genetic and nutritional composition of food is a right that should be protected by law on the national level. It would be logical on the consumer world, if there was a national mandate for GMO labeling rather than each of the 50 states having their own individual mandate.

"That is why I support HSCR No. 1675, H.R. No. 149. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 149, entitled: "HOUSE

"The purpose of this measure is to support efforts to secure federal funding for a feasibility study for the establishment of a commercial space launch and control facility in Hawaii.

"This is not a new issue in the Legislature. Former Governor George Ariyoshi, former Governor John Waihee and other individuals in the space exploration arena have supported the space port concept in Hawaii.

"For reference, there should be a study that was done by the Waihee administration that highlighted the Big Island as a site to consider. Any new economic opportunities outside of tourism and defense spending would really help to diversify Hawaii's economy.

"So that is why I support HSCR No. 1678, HCR No. 226. Thank you Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. Representative Awana rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. Representative Takai, for the Committee on Veterans, Military, & International Affairs, & Culture and the Arts, presented two reports:

Representative Say rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"In strong support with written comments for both resolutions. Thank you very much."

Representative Say's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in strong support to H.R. 72, HD 1 and H.C.R. 90, HD 1, URGING THE VARIOUS BRANCHES OF THE UNITED STATES ARMED SERVICES IN THE STATE OF HAWAII, IN COOPERATION WITH THE MILITARY AFFAIRS COUNCIL OF THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE OF HAWAII, TO ESTABLISH A WORKING GROUP TO ASSESS THE FEASIBILITY OF A CONSOLIDATED MILITARY TRANSITION, IMMERSION, AND EDUCATION CENTER.

"The potential services and benefits to military families the working group could uncover, in response to HR 72, HD 1 and HCR 72, HD 1, would benefit both the State of Hawaii and the federal government through potential cost savings and a refined, improved quality care system.

"HR 72, HD 1 and HCR 90, HD 1 reflect the first steps that need to be taken in regards to a military family support center that was outlined in H.B. 580, a bill which died earlier this session. In taking these progressive and innovative steps, the State of Hawaii is in line with President Obama's recent proposed defense budget. According to an April 10, 2013 press release by Air Force News (AFNS) on the FY 14 Defense Budget Proposal, 'The budget continues the department's commitment to good stewardship of taxpayer dollars by seeking further consolidation of defense infrastructure and instituting a study of possible efficiencies in military treatment facilities...' Additional pieces of the FY 14 Defense Budget Proposal stated further investment in critical programs, such as transition assistance and quality care for the All-Volunteer Force service members and their families.

"The 2013 legislative bill and the House Concurrent Resolution and House Resolution were developed and drafted by Ms. Dina Poma-Barnes,

legislative intern for the East-West Center and a Marine reservist. Her husband is stationed at Kaneohe Bay Marine Corps Base.

"Both HR 72, HD 1 and HCR 90, HD 1 are in the spirit of supporting national budget objectives and being one of the first of the 50 states to take innovative ideas and acting on them in support of our state's military members and their families. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the reports of the Committee were adopted and H.R. No. 72, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION URGING THE VARIOUS BRANCHES OF THE UNITED STATES ARMED SERVICES IN THE STATE OF HAWAII, IN COOPERATION WITH THE MILITARY AFFAIRS COUNCIL OF THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE OF HAWAII, TO ESTABLISH A WORKING GROUP TO ASSESS THE FEASIBILITY OF A CONSOLIDATED MILITARY TRANSITION, IMMERSION, AND EDUCATION CENTER," was adopted, with Representatives Har, McDermott, Oshiro and Tokioka being excused; and

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations. 152 years ago the Civil War began, and this is defying a federal order as I read the resolution, so I think I should be with reservations."

Representative Fale rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him on both measures, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the reports of the Committee were adopted and H.R. No. 53, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION EXPRESSING COMMITMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES," was adopted, with Representatives Har, McDermott, Oshiro and Tokioka being excused; and

H.C.R. No. 69, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION EXPRESSING COMMITMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES," was adopted, with Representatives Har, McDermott, Oshiro and Tokioka being excused.

Representative Belatti, for the Committee on Health, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1688) recommending that H.C.R. No. 22, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Saiki, seconded by Representative Awana and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 22, HD 2, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO ESTABLISH A TASK FORCE TO DEVELOP LEGISLATIVE RECOMMENDATIONS THAT INCLUDE HEALTH AS A PRIORITY IN LAND USE PLANNING AND TRANSPORTATION DECISIONS," was adopted, with Representatives Har, McDermott, Oshiro and Tokioka being excused.

Representative Rhoads, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1689) recommending that H.C.R. No. 217 be adopted.

Representative Saiki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.C.R. No. 217 be adopted, seconded by Representative Awana.

Representative Fukumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Johanson rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Fale rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in opposition. I remember hearing that if we were to pass civil unions here in the State Legislature, Mr. Speaker, that we would see a huge economic impact with much more money being generated. I would like to see results of some of the statements that were made in regards to the results that would happen from the passage of that measure, Mr. Speaker. I think there's still a little more homework to be done, and with that I'll conclude my comments in written form, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Fale's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise with opposition regarding HCR 217. The title of this resolution is: REQUESTING THE CONVENING OF A TASK FORCE TO STUDY THE SOCIAL, ECONOMIC, AND RELIGIOUS IMPACTS OF ENACTING MARRIAGE EQUALITY IN HAWAII.

"Mr. Speaker, it is important to note that there are no indigenous or cultural members assigned to the task force in this resolution.

"This resolution directs the task force to, 'Determine whether civil unions are sufficient to provide the rights, benefits, and dignity necessary to ensure strong, healthy families in Hawaii.' As such, I do not believe sufficient time has passed in order to adequately address this question. At this point in time, civil unions have only been formally recognized by the State of Hawaii for about one year.

"While a study such as this may have some merit, I feel that it is premature at this time. For these reasons Mr. Speaker, I rise with opposition to HCR 217."

Representative Cheape rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Cullen rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee as adopted and H.C.R. No. 217, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE CONVENING OF A TASK FORCE TO STUDY THE SOCIAL, ECONOMIC, AND RELIGIOUS IMPACTS OF ENACTING MARRIAGE EQUALITY IN HAWAII," was adopted, with Representatives Fale, Fukumoto and Johanson voting no, and with Representatives Har, McDermott, Oshiro and Tokioka being excused.

Representative Rhoads, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented two reports:

(Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1690) recommending that H.R. No. 81, as amended in HD 1, be adopted; and

(Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1691) recommending that H.C.R. No. 106, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

Representative Saiki moved that the reports of the Committee be adopted, and that H.R. No. 81, HD 1; and H.C.R. No. 106, HD 1 be adopted, seconded by Representative Awana.

Representative Rhoads rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. Just briefly, outside of political circles it's not particularly well known that the citizens of our nation's capitol, the District of Columbia, do not have full voting rights. They do get to vote for President, they do get to vote for a nonvoting member, a delegate to the US House of Representatives, but they have no representation whatsoever in the US Senate. We're talking about 600,000 people that don't have the right to vote but they have all the other responsibilities of citizenship, including paying taxes and serving the military and on grand juries.

"It's ironic that one of the few places in the country where the citizens do not have the right to vote is our nation's capitol. It also is troubling considering the civil rights record with regards to African Americans in this country, that more than half the population of the District of Columbia are of African American descent. It's long past time that we give the citizens of our nation's capitol the full right to vote and also look at the status of those in other territories that do not have the same citizenship rights, as in Guam, American Samoa, Puerto Rico, all have unusual statuses as well. Thank you very much."

Representative Fale rose in opposition to both measures and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Fale's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise with opposition regarding HR 81 and HCR 106. The title of these resolutions is: URGING THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO GRANT FULL VOTING RIGHTS FOR RESIDENTS OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA.

"Mr. Speaker, Washington D.C. was created as the seat of the federal government and was named after the first president of the United States. The founding fathers recognized that Washington D.C. had a unique role to play in the function of our federal government. Therefore, the founders intentionally created a federal district that would not be a state, in order to create a clear distinction between state and federal governments.

"This resolution calls for full voting rights to be extended to the citizens of Washington D.C. Constitutionally, for full voting rights to be in effect for Washington D.C., this may mean that it would have to become a state. The founders never intended that any state in the union would be both a state and the seat of the federal government.

"For these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to HR 81 and HCR 106."

Representative Cabanilla rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, please note my strong support. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the reports of the Committee were adopted and H.R. No. 81, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION URGING THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO GRANT FULL VOTING RIGHTS FOR RESIDENTS OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA," was adopted, with Representative Fale voting no, and with Representatives Har, McDermott, Oshiro and Tokioka being excused; and

H.C.R. No. 106, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION URGING THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO GRANT FULL VOTING RIGHTS FOR RESIDENTS OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA," was adopted, with Representative Fale voting no, and with Representatives Har, McDermott, Oshiro and Tokioka being excused. Representative Rhoads, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1692) recommending that H.R. No. 178, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Saiki, seconded by Representative Awana and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 178, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION URGING THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY TO EXAMINE AND RE-EVALUATE ITS POLICIES REGARDING REFUGEE AND ASYLEE PROTECTIONS, INCLUDING THE PRINCIPLE OF NON-REFOULEMENT," was adopted, with Representatives Har, McDermott, Oshiro and Tokioka being excused.

Representative Rhoads, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1693) recommending that H.C.R. No. 224, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Saiki, seconded by Representative Awana and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 224, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION URGING THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY TO EXAMINE AND RE-EVALUATE ITS POLICIES REGARDING REFUGEE AND ASYLEE PROTECTIONS, INCLUDING THE PRINCIPLE OF NON-REFOULEMENT," was adopted, with Representatives Har, McDermott, Oshiro and Tokioka being excused.

Representative Takumi, for the Committee on Education, presented two reports:

(Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1694) recommending that H.R. No. 55, HD 1 be adopted; and

(Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1695) recommending that H.C.R. No. 71, HD 1 be adopted.

Representative Saiki moved that the reports of the Committee be adopted, and that H.R. No. 55, HD 1; and H.C.R. No. 71, HD 1 be adopted, seconded by Representative Awana.

Representative Say rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I've been standing up on a lot of resolutions today, right? So at this point, I'm in strong support of these two resolutions on behalf of our Filipino Caucus, the brothers and sisters. Thank you."

Representative Cabanilla rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, on behalf of the Filipino Caucus and Speaker Emeritus Say, I just would like to express my strong support on these measures and also to state that we should not just do it for the Philippines but all the countries in the world. Because through education and through partnership, we can make this world a better place to live. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the reports of the Committee were adopted and H.R. No. 55, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO SUPPORT A STUDENT EXCHANGE PROGRAM FOR STUDENTS IN HAWAII PUBLIC SCHOOLS AND STUDENTS IN PROVINCES IN THE REPUBLIC OF THE PHILIPPINES WITH WHICH THE STATE HAS STATE-PROVINCE RELATIONSHIPS," was adopted, with Representatives Har, McDermott, Oshiro and Tokioka being excused; and

H.C.R. No. 71, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO SUPPORT A STUDENT EXCHANGE PROGRAM FOR STUDENTS IN HAWAII PUBLIC SCHOOLS AND STUDENTS IN PROVINCES IN THE REPUBLIC OF THE PHILIPPINES WITH WHICH THE STATE HAS STATE-PROVINCE RELATIONSHIPS," was adopted, with Representatives Har, McDermott, Oshiro and Tokioka being excused. As cited in HCR 99, 'Executive Order 13-01, Governor Neil Abercrombie established the Hawaii Refinery Task Force.' In other words, a task force already exists to study and make recommendations regarding the closure of the Tesoro refinery.

"Jeffrey T. Ono, Executive Director, Division of Consumer Advocacy, Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, made the following observation in his testimony, 'Rather than creating a new task force, the Consumer Advocate recommends that the issues identified in the proposed H.D. 1 be assigned to the existing task force.' In other words, why create a second task force to fulfill essentially the same function?

"Finally, leadership needs to take a more proactive approach to energy security. This resolution is essentially a reactive approach. As policy makers we should be enacting legislation that is proactive so that companies like Tesoro are not driven out of the marketplace, leaving the citizens of Hawaii less energy secure.

"Mr. Speaker, for these reasons I rise with reservations regarding HCR 99."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R.
