### ORDER OF THE DAY

#### SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Awana, seconded by Representative Fukumoto and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering a certain House Bill for Final Reading by consent calendar. (Representatives Hashem, McKelvey, Oshiro and Takai were excused.)

### FINAL READING

#### H.B. No. 1133, SD 2:

Representative Saiki moved that H.B. No. 1133, SD 2 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Awana.

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in strong support. Thank you. The work of a previous legislature is being changed today. Today, I ask my colleagues to support the repeal of the Public Land Development Corporation. As Legislators, we shall make the tough decision to undo what those before us decided. I believe it is the right thing to do. We have properly vetted this issue in committee hearings and listened to the people of Hawaii.

"I want to recognize the hard work of those before us and their good intentions. The intent of the Public Land Development Corporation was to help generate funds for the Department of Land and Natural Resources in order to meet its mission of managing natural resources, including recreational opportunities on public lands. The legislature recognized that DLNR's portion of the general fund had been in decline since 2002 and any fees for services or fines for violations had not replaced the decline in General Funds. Sustainability had become the mantra and generating revenue from public lands became a means to an end.

"Act 55, 2011 gave power to the Public Land Development Corporation to negotiate leases of public lands by private entities. It also allowed the issuance of revenue bonds to help construct, acquire and renovate public facilities, and purchase non-public lands. These powers, along with authorization to bypass county zoning and permitting rules and to allow just about anything to be developed on public lands, would get results in the near future. Regarding oversight, the Board of Land and Natural Resources, appointed by the Governor, was responsible for approval of any public-private agreement and the state legislature could overturn planned projects on land sizes over 200 acres by a two-thirds vote of either the Senate or the House, or by a majority vote in both Chambers.

"We understand now the concerns raised by the counties and the public. Although the PLDC had to abide by state and federal environmental regulations, federal laws, and state historic preservation laws, Act 55 took away the authority of the counties to permit and regulate, stating the PLDC 'shall be exempt from all statutes, ordinances, charter provisions, and rules of any government agency relating to special improvement district assessments or requirements; land use, zoning, and construction standards for subdivisions, development, and improvement of land; and the construction, improvement, and sale of homes thereon.' In addition, the fear of lopsided power in the PLDC and indirectly with the Governor who appoints the board members was constantly raised by the public.

"I believe we have listened, and responsibly debated HB 1133. We heard from the people across the state and vote today on the repeal of the Public Land Development Corporation.

"In closing, I want to point out the work ahead of us. The decaying conditions of our public facilities and the missed recreational opportunities due to lack of funding still need to be addressed. Our natural resources deserve our attention. This vote today will not change my commitment to the ethical management of our natural resources. In fact, this vote today is a vote for ethical management of our natural resources. Thank you."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support and just a few remarks to add to those of the previous speaker. I just want to also add that we shouldn't underestimate the value of trust in government. This repeal is a step towards restoring that trust. Distrust of government poses a fundamental threat to our ability as a Legislative Body to provide solutions to today's issues. Society is healthiest when its citizens have confidence that their leaders are acting in their interest, and this bill, this repeal, is a step in that direction. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. Mr. Speaker, the mothership of the PLDC is dead, but the DNA of the ship lives on. Harbors, schools, and as we enter this gut-and-replace season between now and May 2nd, let us remain vigilant. Thank you."

Representative Awana rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Before I begin, I'd like to take this opportunity to thank the Chairs of both bodies of the Legislature who heard these measures in their respective committees. During the hearings, the public spoke loud and clear. Necessary amendments were made to address an issue that concerned residents in relationship on how valuable our 'aina is in the State of Hawaii.

"This is one of the most controversial measures that drove the community to come forward and share their *mana'o*. The hard work and commitment included late nights and a weekend hearing by our House Committees. A desire to provide the public a platform to voice their support or opposition was given.

"I can recall being here on Saturday morning and hearing from a resident who flew in from the neighbor island. One in particular was a gentleman from Hawaii Island and, as it was his first time giving testimony, he was quite nervous. Nonetheless it was also his first time being here at our State Capitol, however he felt compelled to come down as he wanted to share his deep concern about the PLDC and how he believed it needed to be repealed. This was not unlike hundreds who testified in opposition on that day. Residents from all islands gave testimony, and the people have spoken.

"So House Bill 1133, Senate Draft 2 speaks back and says to the people of Hawaii, you have been heard and we, your elected officials, will take action. For these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I rise in support and I'd like to also ask that the very insightful comments made by the Chair of Water & Land be entered into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising in strong support. Thank you, for the measure to repeal the PLDC. A number of us were caught short on this in 2011, and thought that this concept was a good idea, Mr. Speaker. Then as things moved forward we realized, wait a minute, what started out as a way to improve our boat harbors and help the Department of Land and Natural Resources morphed into a 'Grand Theft 'Aina,' as it was so aptly stated by the Sierra Club. With the wonderful outpouring of testimony and comments and pleas from the public, today we are taking the right step.

"Mr. Speaker, I particularly would like to thank the Sierra Club Hawaii Chapter, Hawaii's Thousand Friends, and the thousands and thousands of people that cared enough about protecting Hawaii's public lands that they sent in emails, testimony, phone calls, all of the different ways of communicating with us to say that was not a good idea, repeal the PLDC. So today we are doing it in a bipartisan manner and it just shows that when we work together as colleagues, we can do very positive things. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Saiki rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I rise in support of this measure. I also would like to thank the Water & Land Chair for providing clarity and making it a priority to involve the public on an issue that became somewhat controversial over the past year.

"I want to make it clear that this vote to repeal the PLDC reaffirms the Legislature's commitment to preserve and protect Hawaii's natural resources. The principal challenge was that the PLDC laws circumvented longstanding protections that were designed to safeguard our environment and our resources. This was due to the fact that the PLDC was exempt from statutes, ordinances and regulations which protect agricultural, conservation and other public land. Such as HRS Chapter 205A, the Coastal Zone Management Act, which protects our shoreline and beaches. Chapter 183, which safeguards conservation land, county subdivision and building permit standards and the procurement code.

"I wanted to acknowledge that we know that government plays a pivotal role in facilitating economic development. But that entails responsible development. The PLDC failed because it went too far and was unbalanced. Thank you very much."

Representative Ing rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. I just wanted to echo the sentiments of all my colleagues and thank the Chairs involved in both Chambers. It's been a really long session revolving around this issue with lots of hearings, lots of hours put into it. Although when this law passed, it was a good idea a few years ago and it was a little broad, and I think it became clear from then until now that it might be best if we pressed the reset button and try again. That's what we're doing, so I'm really proud to be able to cast my vote today.

"There's one good thing that came about it is, it got the public really engaged in our civil process and it's not just certain people that usually come out. There were people from every island that came out to give testimony, every demographic, every age group really. So I'd like to also recognize all the constituents of mine who submitted hundreds of emails, and community leader Mahina Martin who came out and gave very compelling testimony in multiple hearings.

"I think it's a great step, as my colleague from Kona said, to restore public trust in our government, which is really crucial. So if one thing good came out of all this, it's getting the public involved and this is a true victory for them. *Mahalo*."

Representative Wooley rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I would like to thank the Speaker, Vice Speaker and Majority Leader in particular. *Mahalo*."

Representative Fale rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. Mr. Speaker, with many measures, with many things in history, we shouldn't just ask what, but why things happen. Now this measure, the Public Land Development Corporation, is something that's very interesting and I've actually looked into the issue a lot because this was an attempt at an innovative way to raise money to address a number of the issues that not only my community faces, but the entire state as a whole faces, Mr. Speaker.

"So I hope this measure, the repeal of the PLDC, doesn't deter further innovative ways at looking to raise revenue to address a number of the issues that we have throughout here in the state, Mr. Speaker.

"But I think if we look at the underlying issues of why the PLDC was pushed forward in the first place, Mr. Speaker, we will understand that there are tens of thousands of people throughout the State of Hawaii that have been left behind in regards to economic and educational opportunity. We need to address these issues, Mr. Speaker, immediately, and also in a way that isn't as detrimental to the environment as the PLDC could have been.

"So I hope that the repeal of this measure doesn't wash over the need to address the underlying issues of why it came into existence. We have aging educational infrastructure, we have aging economic infrastructure, and those problems haven't gone away. So through the repeal of this, Mr. Speaker, I hope innovative measures and ideas continue to come forward in a way which we can help address the underlying cause, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1133, SD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LAND," passed Final Reading by a vote of 48 ayes, with Representatives McKelvey, Oshiro and Takai being excused.

The barbarians will not win. Thank you."
