Department's Position: The Department of Health strongly supports the nomination and confirmation 1 of Elizabeth Cool (G.M.547) and Jamal Wasan, Ph.D. (G.M.548) to serve on the Mental Health and 2 Substance Abuse, Hawaii Service Area Board (HSAB) for terms to expire on June 30, 2016. 3 4 Fiscal Implications: None. **Purpose and Justification:** The purpose is for the consideration and confirmation to the HSAB, 5 Gubernatorial Nominee, Elizabeth Cool and Jamal Wasan, Ph.D. representing the consumer and 6 7 provider segments of the community. To Senator Josh Green and the Senate Committee on Health, and Boardmembers:

I would first like to take this opportunity to say thank you for your consideration of my nomination to the Hawaii State Area Board for Mental Health and Substance Abuse. I have long been interested in being involved in helping in some small area of the menta I health community where I live.

I have been around mental illness since I was a small child. As I grew older and more curious, I realized that mental health had blazed a roadmap through my entire family. M y grandfather, my uncle, my mother, my oldest brother, the middle brother, and myself. Even the next generation, my son. I never realized when I was young, but of course as I aged, all the signs and symptoms were all there. In my parent's home, these diagnoses were complimented more by alchohol abuse and drug use. Needless to say, th is was a very toxic stew. I left when I was seventeen, and moved to Alaska when I was 25.

I was formally diagnosed with a dual diagnosis approximately 14 years ago in Montana. I attended a day program in Livingston, MT for about 4 years. I was active in helping to start a NAMI chapter in our small town, up until the time that I moved to Hawaii. I was an active group member in DBT (dialectic behavioral training) classes. We were also tr ying to expand mental health services to include a home-like environment that would in clude psychiatrists, psychologists, nurses, etc., for consumers that needed short-term in patient treatment in a nearby town, instead of the psychiatric ward at a hospital, 150 mil es away from home and family. I understand that it has succeeded, and has become a wo nderful addition to services in Montana.

I moved here in 2006, and got an appointment with the mental health office fairly quickl y. Getting help from the satellite office in Na'alehu was a great experience. I got to see h ow a very small office works. I also started volunteering to help at the office, and started by weeding the flowerbeds in front of the building. My case manager quickly learned t hat I had office skills, and I was soon asked to do miscellaneous clerical jobs. I was thril led! I found that I loved volunteering.

I moved closer to town, and soon found myself getting services at the Kealakekua office

Then approximately 4 years ago there were cutbacks on the state level, and I found mys

elf volunteering once more. This time I helped out about 3 1/2 years. I still receive

services at the Kealakekua office, but spend my time at the Kona Paradise Club as a ver y happy member, where I can enjoy a busy, but very fun day.

I would like to believe that I can help my community by being involved with the Hawaii State Area Board, Commission on Mental Health/Substance Abuse. At the age of 54, I really believe that we all need to take stock of ourselves and our lives, and we need to fi nd what it is out there in our world that is our true passion. Mental health (the clients) ju st happened to become my true passion.

Once again, thank you for allowing me to apply for this position, and for your considera tion of this matter.
