RE: H.B. 1013; RELATING TO STATEWIDE TRAFFIC CODE; AND RE: H.B. 1308; RELATING TO STATEWIDE TRAFFIC CODE.

Chair Aquino, Chair Yamane, and members of the House Committee on Public Safety and House Committee on Transportation, the Department of the Prosecuting Attorney of the City and County of Honolulu submits the following testimony in support of H.B. 1013 and H.B. 1308.

The purpose of these bills is to include the state civil defense vehicles, county emergency management vehicles, and public safety law enforcement vehicles in the definition of "emergency vehicle" under the requirement that a driver of a vehicle that is approaching an emergency vehicle that is stopped for an emergency, investigation of a possible traffic violation, rendering assistance to a police officer, or other official duties, as indicated by the flashing emergency lights of the stopped emergency vehicle, shall:

- (1) Slow down to a reasonable and prudent speed that is safe under the circumstances of an emergency road situation ahead. Reasonableness and prudence shall take into account weather conditions, road conditions, and vehicular and pedestrian traffic in the immediate area. If necessary, the driver shall come to a complete stop before making a lane change under paragraph (2); and
- (2) Make a lane change into the adjacent lane if necessary and if it is safe to do so, or if possible, to two lanes over which leaves one lane between the driver and the emergency vehicle.

A violation of this law is a petty misdemeanor. The intent of this legislation is to provide safety for persons who provide emergency roadside assistance from vehicles traveling by on highways and roads that are often busy and have little area on the side of the traveling lanes to provide assistance. For the following reasons, we <u>strongly support the passage of H.B. 1013 and H.B. 1308</u>. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

I am Arkie Koehl, offering testimony on behalf of the Hawaii members of Mothers Against Drunk Driving in support of House Bill 1013, relating to the Statewide Traffic Code. HB 1013 brings sheriff's vehicles under the protection of HRS 291c-27, which is fitting and proper.

We further encourage the Committees to amend the bill by including the charge of manslaughter as a possible offense when a driver does not move over and kills a first responder. Suggested wording follows (change in bold type):

If a death or injury occurs and is attributable to the driver of the vehicle for a violation of subsection (a), then the driver shall instead be charged under **section 707-702 for manslaughter**, section 707-702.5 for negligent homicide in the first degree; section 707-703 for negligent homicide in the second degree; section 707-704 for negligent homicide in the third degree; section 707-705 for negligent injury in the first degree; or section 707-706 for negligent injury in the second degree, as applicable.

As in past testimony, MADD Hawaii strongly supports this commonly termed "move over" measure to provide greater protection for law enforcement officers and other first responders who are engaged in providing assistance to vehicles or individuals on Hawaii's roads and highways. MADD has had direct contact with families of law enforcement officers who have been killed after being hit by another vehicle and our organization has adopted the position that more needs to be done to prevent these tragedies. Most other states have already taken action to adopt laws requiring drivers to "move over" when first responders are providing assistance to others on the road.

We encourage the committee to pass House Bill 1013.

Subject: House Bill No. 1013, Relating to the Statewide Traffic Code

I am Kurt Kendro, Major of the Traffic Division of the Honolulu Police Department (HPD), City and County of Honolulu.

The HPD strongly supports the passage of House Bill No. 1013, Relating to the Statewide Traffic Code. Passage of this bill would include sheriff's vehicles in the definition of "emergency vehicle" in section 291C-27, Hawaii Revised Statutes, commonly known as the "move-over" law.

This law was designed for all emergency responders who provide services to our community, and the sheriffs should be included in this law.

The HPD would also recommend some additional language be added to the existing language as section 707-702 was inadvertently omitted from the original bill. The suggested additional language is as highlighted:

If a death or injury occurs and is attributable to the driver of the vehicle for a violation of subsection (a), then the driver shall instead be charged under section 707-702 for manslaughter, section 707-702.5 for negligent homicide in the first degree; section 707-703 for negligent homicide in the second degree; section 707-704 for negligent homicide in the third degree; section 707-705 for negligent injury in the first degree; or section 707-706 for negligent injury in the second degree, as applicable.

TESTIMONY ON HB1013 RELATING TO THE STATEWIDE TRAFFIC CODE

My name is Dayton M. Nakanelua and I am the State Director of the United Public Workers, AFSCME, Local 646, AFL-CIO (UPW). The UPW is the exclusive representative for approximately 14,000 public employees, which include blue collar, non-supervisory employees in Bargaining Unit 1 and institutional, health and correctional employees in Bargaining Unit 10, in the State of Hawaii and various counties. The UPW also represents about 1,500 members of the private sector.

The UPW supports HB 1013, which includes the sheriff's vehicles in the definition of "emergency vehicle" requiring that motorists "move over" when passing a stationary vehicle on the highway.

Safety is a top priority of UPW for all state and county workers. For safety reasons, sheriff's vehicles should be included under this definition. If a sheriff's vehicle is involved in assisting or exclusively handling a roadside emergency, motorists should offer the same courtesy as they do other emergency vehicles. This will help to keep both drivers and emergency responders safe while they go about their business.
